

PAT MEGO, FORMER LOCAL POLICEMAN, DIES IN SOUTH

Pat Mego, a former well known Medford policeman of years ago, died suddenly last Saturday night at New Orleans, La., where he had been residing for some time past, according to a telegram received here Sunday from the authorities of that city to J. F. Perry, chancellor commander of the local Knights of Pythias lodge of which the dead man was a member. He was also a member of the Redmen lodge of this city.

This telegram after telling that the death had occurred in that city during Saturday night stated that the body was being held at the undertaker's there and requested Mr. Perry to get in touch with the relatives and wire instructions for burial.

Mr. Perry and other K. of P. lodge officials and Chief of Police Adams after diligent inquiry yesterday and today were unable to find out where Mego's relatives lived. He has no relatives here.

All that is known in Medford is that Mego and his first wife separated and that he married again in Medford, his second wife, who died some time ago, being a sister of Mrs. J. Kent of this city. Mego had two sons, but Mrs. Kent does not know what became of them after removal from Medford.

When he left Medford years ago Mego first located in Philadelphia, Pa., then in Boston, Mass., and next resided at Galveston, Texas. From the latter place he removed to New Orleans, where his death occurred. All these years he had been a private detective in the employ of a well known agency.

BOY SCOUTS MEET TUESDAY, 7 P. M. TO REORGANIZE

A meeting of all boys nearing twelve years and over who are interested in scouting, is called by Rev. J. B. Coan, acting scout commissioner, to meet at the Presbyterian church Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock sharp for one hour. At this meeting a definite plan of organization and program of work will be outlined and the campaign for good boy material will be launched.

Details and plans essential to organization are being worked out and the personnel of the local scout council consisting of representative citizens of the community to the number of ten or more are being selected to head the organization with the scout commissioner.

Mr. Coan reports that he is more than pleased with the response which he has received from citizens and organizations throughout the community, and predicts that Medford will have one of the best and most effective scout organizations in the state.

An additional scout master has been enlisted and added to the staff. He is P. S. Frazer, recently from Los Angeles, and now with the Patton & Robinson Co. His services were secured by Rev. Lawrence of the Presbyterian church. Other leaders with or without training in boy work are being sought.

"The success of scouting in any community depends largely upon the interest and enthusiasm manifested by the local council," stated Mr. Coan. "It is a fine thing to know that men are available who have a large interest in the boys of Medford. It will put real punch and effectiveness into the movement."

At tomorrow evening's meeting the boys registering in will be temporarily assigned to patrols and troops with which they will begin their training. With permanent assignments to be made later as the work progresses and the boys advance. That there are a number of boys who have had scout training coming in will greatly aid the organization and training.

The parents of all boys who enter scout training will be pleased to know that the times of meeting will be definite in duration, and a strict discipline required of each lad who attends. Remember the hour, seven sharp, Tuesday.
