

DEDICATION FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH IS HELD SUNDAY

\$9180 Contributed Towards Cost—Pipe Organ to Be Dedicated Tuesday — Dr. Snape of Oakland, Cal., Delivers Sermons.

The new and beautiful First Baptist church building was dedicated Sunday with two appropriate and impressive services. \$9180 was contributed at these services to apply on the cost of the building. It is expected that considerable more will be added to this in the near future.

Sunshine and great crowds characterized the day. The church was not able to take care of the great throngs desiring to participate in the dedicatory services. The day began with a largely increased attendance in the Sunday school. All classes showed a marked increase. The charming and beautiful primary assembly room was filled with happy children, while the Golden Link class had to use the church parlors to care for their numbers. Aside from the two adult classes, who prefer the first floor for their work, every class in the school had a separate class room, and two other rooms can be utilized for additional classes. No doubt many will be attracted to the fine facilities for class work, also the unusual social and recreational opportunities which come to all in the school.

The young people are enthused over the great recreational room, which will be the center of their social life to a large degree. Few churches have anything to compare with what is found in this church.

The church was beautifully decorated, and the charm and harmony of color scheme of the fine auditorium with the splendid music of the choir and the rich tones of the new pipe organ will contribute to produce a worshipful atmosphere.

Beautiful twelve-page dedicatory programs were given to all who attended the services. A splendid cut of the new church faced the first page and a cut of the pastor, Rev. F. R. Leach, another page with a full description of the organ and responsive services, and a complete list of the committees.

Dr. John Snape of Oakland, Cal., delivered two great and inspiring sermons, which pleased and delighted all who had the pleasure of hearing them.

Dr. Snape has a pleasing personality and entered into the services of the day in such a way as to win all. The church officials were much pleased with his services rendered. Mrs. Snape accompanied him. They returned by car this morning. Mr. Wm. Davis in a formal way presented the keys of the church to the board of trustees, and Mr. Aubrey G. Smith accepted them for the church in a fitting way. The service of dedication was read by the pastor and people and Dr. O. C. Wright of Portland offered the prayer of dedication. Mr. Scott presided at the organ, while the new strong church quartet sang a very appropriate and fine selection at the evening service.

Mrs. Scott, at the morning service, rendered a solo of great power. The pastors of the city participated in the evening; their services being omitted for the purpose of helping celebrate the day, which meant no much not only to the Baptist church but to the entire city.

OFF YEAR VOTE TOMORROW FAILS TO STIR LAND

Principal National Election in Vermont, Where Cousin of President Runs for Congress — San Francisco to Elect Mayor.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Off year elections to be held in scattering states tomorrow have aroused but little interest.

The principal election from a national viewpoint is in Vermont, where Porter H. Dale, republican, and Park H. Pollard, democrat, are candidates to succeed the late Senator Dillingham.

Vermont also will choose one representative in congress, while New York will select four representatives to fill vacancies. Maryland, Kentucky and Mississippi will elect governors.

Election of members of state legislatures will be held in New York, New Jersey and Maryland. New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio will hold referendums on state measures. The only election of consequence in the west is in Oregon, a referendum on a state income tax measure similar to the federal income tax law.

A number of states will vote for minor officers and many cities in eastern states and San Francisco will elect mayors.

MILE A MINUTE IS NOW SLOW TIME

MITCHELL FIELD, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Battling for speed supremacy in the air, Lieutenant Alfred J. Williams and Lieutenant Harold J. Brown, navy aviators, all but flew five miles a minute yesterday. Williams, setting a new world's record, won the contest with an average speed of 266.6 miles an hour over a three kilometer course, although Brown on one leg of the flight traveled faster than ever man flew before, racing with the wind at the rate of 274.2 miles an hour.

NEW PROSECUTOR IN OFFICE, GRAND JURY CONVENES

Governor Pierce Announces No Change in Status of O. C. Boggs, Special Prosecutor—Grand Jury Convenes—Moore Resumes Practice.

The grand jury for the fall term of circuit court convened at Jacksonville this morning to take under consideration a large number of cases, and with a new county prosecutor, Newton W. Borden, who was only appointed last Saturday by Governor Pierce to fill out the unexpired term of Rawles Moore, who voluntarily resigned the office the forepart of last week.

The new prosecuting attorney and the retiring official conferred all day Sunday at which time Mr. Moore explained the pending cases and gave all information necessary for the new official to become as much familiarized with the office as possible in a short time.

Mr. Borden assumed the reins this morning and Mr. Moore retired to private life after three years' service in the office of district attorney. Mr. Moore will at once resume private legal practice and will retain his old offices in the Medford building. To enable the new district attorney to get more firmly in the saddle Mr. Moore has volunteered to aid that official in any way asked.

In connection with Mr. Borden's appointment by Governor Pierce, the Portland Journal in the following special dispatch from Salem, says: "The appointment will have no effect on the position of O. C. Boggs as special prohibition prosecutor in that county. Governor Pierce explained this afternoon. Borden is said to have promised his co-operation to Boggs in the prosecution of liquor cases."

"Between the two we hope to clean up the liquor evil in that county," the governor explained.

The new grand jury which convened this morning has 18 criminal cases for consideration, a number of which are of importance, including burglary and auto stealing cases and the like. The grand jury will be in session all this week at least, and next Monday the trial term of circuit court begins. There are 125 witnesses to be heard before the grand jury.

H. E. MARSH HOME LOOTED BY BURGLAR

The H. E. Marsh residence at 43 North Peach street was entered by burglars Saturday night and a diamond bracelet belonging to Mrs. Charles Hazelrigg and a new suitcase and contents of Charles Hazelrigg's were stolen. A jewelry box belonging to Mrs. Marsh's mother was opened, but nothing was taken. The Marsh and Hazelrigg families had been out calling and on returning and entering the house heard the back door slam and discovered their losses. They must have frightened the burglar away. The police were notified and are now working on the case.

The eight girls at work at noon today were busy every second and answered over 1000 calls during the hour.

The club decided to set aside 10 per cent of the cash in the treasury for benevolent work.

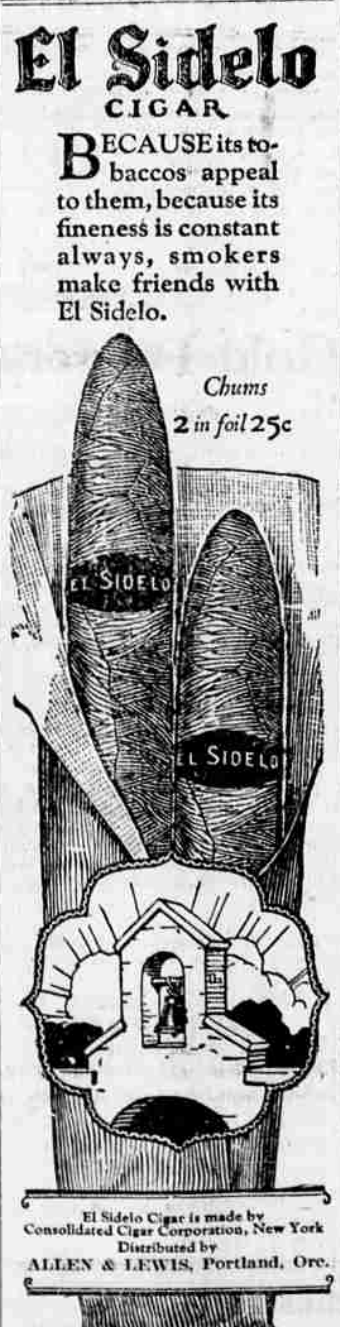
