MINNESOTA MAN VICE-PRESIDENT FIRST NATIONAL

W. W. Walker, for seven years a resident of Austin, six of which he spent as president of the Farmers & Merchants State bank and one associated with H. W. Hurlbut in promoting the First Mortgage Investment company, has purchased a substantial interest in the First National Bank of Medford, Ore., and will move to that city with his family about November 1. He will fill the position of vice president.

Mr. Walker recently returned from a three weeks trip to Medford and touring through Oregon and has definitely decided to make the westward move. For several years, he declared, he had been viewing the prospects in Oregon with the idea of some day locating in that state.

Medford is a city of about 9000 population located in the southern portion of the state in the heart of a large fruit district, the chief crop of which is pears. Up to the time of Mr. Walker's visit 473 cars of pears had been loaded at Medford this year and it is expected that shipments will reach 2000 carloads before the year closes. Medford is the central shipping point and trading city for the Rogue River valley, one of the most fertile and productive in the state.

Due to the large amount of real estate and other property owned by Mr. Walker in Austin and vicinity it will be considerable time before he can make the change and move to his new home, he pointed out, but a big hotel sale to be held at the Fair grounds October 18 and 19 will provide for dispersal of the Clover Lea farm herd as well as offer to the public several head of cattle from the Brookholm Farm, Minnesota Holstein company and the Pine Grove Farm.

Pictures of the bank at Medford in which Mr. Walker has purchased an interest were shown by him today and indicate the institution is one of the first rank with an interior that is difficult to equal in this section of Minnesota. Its deposits are well over one and a half million dollars, Mr. Walker said, despite the fact that there are three other banks in the city.

During the six years that Mr. Walker served as president of the Farmers & Merchants State bank here the deposits of that institution increased four times over the amount at which they stood when he took charge and we are confident Mr. Walker will make an equally favorable record in Medford.

Farm and livestock circles will also suffer a loss in Mr. Walker's removal from this community for he has always taken an active interest in these projects, being one of the leaders in placing pure bred livestock on Mower county farms.—Austin, Minnesota, Daily Herald.

Mr. Walker, after looking over the

count cities for some time decided to locate in Medford. He is enroute to Medford by auto now with his family and will be directly connected with the First National bank upon their arrival.

NEW TYPE ANCIENT MAN SHOWN BY CALIFORNIA FIND

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Nov. 6.—John P. Harrington, Smithsonian institute investigator who recently announced his discovery of primitive remains which belonged, he said to the Neanderthal period or earlier, is convinced that the forerunner of the American Indian did not live at such a remote period.

In a statement appearing this morning under his signature, Dr. Harrington asserts that more recent investigations have led him to believe that the owners of the skulls unearthed by him roamed the coast of California at a period probably eight thousand years ago and not as early as 25,000 years ago, as his first statement stated.

Characteristics not possessed by the Neanderthal have been found in the skulls of the Santa Barbara man, after closer study. Dr. Harrington said.

Dr. Harrington asserts, however, and his statement is confirmed by scientists who have flocked to Santa Barbara during the last few days, that the remains do form a connecting link between the modern Indian and his original ancestor in North America. The bones and the strata of earth in which they were imbedded were of a type not known before to the scientists.

The two skulls will be forwarded to New York, probably today, Dr. Harrington said, for examination by ethnologists connected with the museum of the American Indian. The results of this examination will be sent as an official report to the Smithsonian institute.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 6.—(By the Associated Press)—A meeting of the chief executives of the sixteen standard railroad labor unions "for the purpose of agreeing upon a definite legislative policy in connection with matters to come before the next congress has been called by W. S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers to meet in Washington November 14, Mr. Stone announced today.

Indian Slayer Caught. LETHBRIDGE, Alta., Nov. 6.—Joe Blackhorse, alias Two Stab, an Indian Winnie Tolstrop, at Raymond last Friday, charged with slaying 16 year old day, was captured today near his mine on St. Mary's river, fifteen miles northwest of Raymond.

30 MINERS DOOMED BY MINE BLAST

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 6.—Twelve bodies have been taken from the shaft mine of the Raleigh, Wyoming Coal company at Glen Rogers, Wyoming county, in which an explosion occurred today, and little hope is entertained for thirty men still within the workings the state department of mines reported at noon today.

Sixty-five men were in the mine at the time of the explosion and 23 were brought out uninjured, in addition to the 12 bodies found by the rescue squads the officials of the department said. Their report, they declared, came from company officers at the mine.

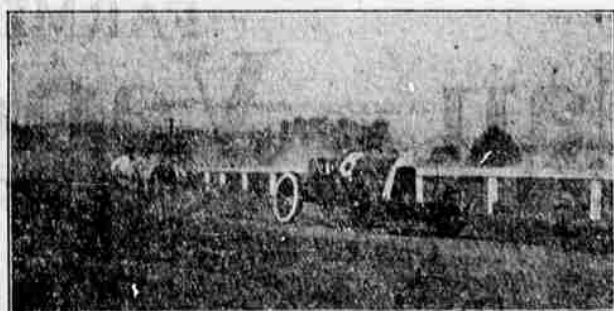
