LOCAL ROTARIANS TO SPONSOR BOY SCOUT MOVEMENT

The boy scout organization in Medford took tangible and actual form at the gathering of boys and leaders at the Presbyterian church last night. More than 125 enthusiastic youths were on hand to enroll in the organization at this opening meeting. Three scout masters and six young men qualified for assistant leadership were also present. In addition to Scout Commissioner Coan and Scout Master Frazier, Rev. F. W. Black, local priest of the Catholic parish, has been added to the staff of leaders and will take a scout master's position in the leadership of the boys of his parish. A large troop from his church was assured. The six older boys who will accept positions on the staff are: Philip Lounsbury, Lawrence, DeRyke, Clifford Smith, "Connie" Conrad, Willis Zimmerman and Roy Hewitt. Other older boys who have had good training in scoutcraft will be assigned to responsible positions soon.

From the number present seven half-strength troops were formed by tentative assignment. Permanent organization will be made later. In his brief general statement Mr. Coan announced a number of plans and features which were received by the boys with great enthusiasm.

The formation of the scout council from the representations of local organizations is almost completed. This council is in substance a board of directors with the scout commissioner of the entire scouting activities. Exceptionally well qualified and enthusiastic citizens are being selected by the various organizations to fill positions with this council. The following have received and accepted appointment:

During the inauguration of the movement the Rotarians of the city were also busy and the scout commissioner while discussing the plans of the organization with Dr. Clancy, acting president of the local club, assured him that his organization was ready to sponsor the financial program of the new scout enterprise. It goes without saying that the council when organized will gladly accept this proffer. This offer removes the last shadow of doubt as to the success of scoutcraft in Medford. Their action is in keeping with the international practice of boy work activities which Rotary promotes. A committee of Rotarians attended the meeting last night.

The time of regular meeting of the scout council is definitely set, which will be from seven to eight thirty every Saturday evening. It was the decision of the leaders that regular meeting times should not in any way interfere with the school work of the boys and plans of the school authorities. The place of the first regular meeting Saturday night will be announced later in the week. State armories are open to all scout organizations and doubtless tentative and permanent quarters will be established in the new armory.

WATER PERMITS IN JACKSON COUNTY

During the months of August, September and October, one hundred and thirty permits were issued by Rhea Luper, state engineer, for the appropriation of water from various streams throughout the state. These permits cover the irrigation of a total area of 4010 acres of land, development of 243 horsepower, and the use of water for mining, municipal, domestic, manufacturing and various other purposes. The estimated cost of the construction work contemplated under the various permits amounts to \$76,830. Permits were issued during this period for the construction of seven reservoirs in different parts of the state, for the storage of a total of 4450 acre feet of water, at an estimated construction cost of \$11,900.

Among the important permits issued in Jackson county are the following: To Mrs. E. L. Childers of Trall, for the appropriation of 2.8 second feet of water from Clarks creek for irrigation and supplemental supply for 230 acres in Jackson county, at an estimated cost of \$1500 for the proposed construction.

To M. and M. L. Ray of Ruch, covering the appropriation of water from Big Applegate river for irrigating 40 acres. The construction is estimated at \$1200.

To R. M. Conley of Butte Falls, covering the appropriation of water from Dog creek and Clarks creek for irrigating 175 acres. The construction cost is estimated at \$1000.

To Winfield L. Davis and School District No. 60 of Ashland, covering the appropriation of water from School house spring for domestic supply and irrigating two acres.

To Ella J. Patterson of Talent, covering the appropriation of water from a spring developed by tilling for irrigating 5 acres and domestic purposes, including stock water.

To Mrs. Eugene Carles and George M. Smith of Rogue river, covering the appropriation of water from Pleasant creek for irrigating 34.5 acres. The construction cost is estimated at \$200.

To Mrs. E. L. Childers of Trall, covering the appropriation of water from Clarks creek for irrigation and supplemental supply of 230 acres. The construction cost is estimated at \$1500.

To George Colvin of Holland, covering the appropriation of seepage water from basin headwaters of Indian creek for placer mining. The cost is estimated at \$1000.

To Chester W. Wood of Oakland, California, covering the appropriation of water from Red Blanket creek for irrigating 23 acres. The cost is estimated at \$200.

To Ed A. and Silas A. Smith of Ruch, covering the appropriation of water from Little Applegate river and Forest creek for irrigating 84 acres. The cost is estimated at \$500.

To C. W. Horton of Rogue river, covering the appropriation of water from Rogue river for irrigating 10 acres. The construction cost is estimated at \$500.

To Mark Ray Koontz of Butte Falls, covering the appropriation of water from Four Bit creek and Whiskey creek for irrigating 60 acres. The construction cost is estimated at \$300.

CHAIRMAN HULL CALL SELECTION SMASHING VICTORY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—A statement was issued today by Chairman Cordell Hull of the democratic national committee regarding yesterday's elections.

"The overwhelmingly smashing victory in Kentucky, Maryland, downstate New York and the relatively minor and local democratic victories elsewhere furnish additional proof that the voters of the country are against the reactionary-controlled republican national administration in particular and against the republican party in sections where the reactionaries are in control of that party," he declared.

"The Kentucky state-wide election was a fair and decisive test between democratic and republican policies and, between the people and the republican national administration. Local issues were disposed of in the primaries. The campaign was fought almost entirely upon national issues."

The result was a change of between 70,000 and 80,000 votes in favor of the democratic candidate as compared with the gubernatorial election of 1919, when the republican candidate for governor had a majority of 40,000.

"Both national and local issues figured in the Maryland election and the big increase in the democratic majority and the triumphant election of the whole ticket in the state and the city ticket in Baltimore shows the growth of democratic sympathy typical to the country at large and confirms all evidence that the country is democratic, where the race is between major candidates."

"The desertion of republican voters is confirmed also by the reduction of the republican majority in Vermont by approximately 10,000 compared with the senatorial election of 1922."
