

NEW RETORT IS RECEIVED BY OIL SYNDICATE, ASHL'D

ASHLAND, Nov. 7.—The Hartman Syndicate received the new retort which they have been expecting for quite a while, Tuesday, about 5:30. There are two cars in the shipment, weighing about sixty tons together. The machine will start moving to the holdings of the syndicate today. It is planned to work 24 hours every day as long as the good weather lasts, until they arrive there. A road is being prepared by sixty men to the holdings and it is expected that it will be in operation within sixty days. This retort will have a capacity of about 300 barrels of oil a day. Aside from this the machine will have a surplus of over a million cubic feet of gas. Plans are being shipped from Buffalo, New York to Ashland for the construction of one hundred other plants, which will be made in Ashland from the raw product, that is, from the iron to the finished retort. As these can be made here a great deal of money on freight is saved, and the machines will be ready and assembled right here in Ashland, as soon as they are finished. one hundred plants or retorts on their holdings, which will mean a product of about fifty thousand barrels a day of crude oil.

These plants will give one hundred million cubic feet of waste gas from the hundred plants, or one million cubic feet per plant. This waste gas will be used for commercial purposes such as heating, electric facilities or domestic purposes of any kind. They are under the impression that they can furnish gas to the consumer of Southern Oregon under a much lower cost than they are now being forced to pay. This would mean the opening up of large industries, such as mining, milling and manufacturing in this valley, which have been heretofore held back on account of the high cost of fuel. There will be enough of this waste gas to run large smelters, and also furnish the heating and lighting of many other large industries. At present a small city is being built on the Hartman property. Recently a school house was built and lumber for houses and other buildings has been used continually. They have also uncovered a great quantity of the shale rock in the many large shale beds, of which this vicinity is supposed to have among the largest in the world. The retort which has arrived here has been expected for some time by the Hartman people and is the main piece of machinery in the extracting of shale oil from the shale rock. The retort arrived in first class condition, ready to set up and move to the holdings, where work will start immediately upon its arrival.

The American Legion met at the Armory Tuesday night, for the regular business meeting and also to nominate officers, which must be done 30 days before they are voted upon. They will also arrange to attend the funeral of Mr. Hartley, a navy man whose body has been sent to Ashland for interment, to take place Thursday afternoon at 2:30 at the Mountain View cemetery. Owing to the fact that Mr. Hartley's death occurred during the war and that he was buried in that place with full naval ceremony, the local American Legion has been requested to dispense with any special ceremony.

Mr. Harry Silver, owner of the Pompadour Lithia Springs company was injured Tuesday afternoon at the Pompadour Springs. Mr. Silver was working with a drill, which is being used in one of the springs, and his clothing caught in a cog wheel, causing him to be caught in the machinery, which as it was rather weak, stopped at the pull of his body. Mr. Oscar Silver soon turned off the drill and was compelled to cut Mr. Silver's clothing from him in order to extricate him from the machinery. He was not badly hurt, but his shoulder was dislocated and he was bruised in one arm and around his face and neck. Mr. Silver considers himself quite lucky that the accident did not prove to be more serious.

Most of the damaged material has been sent to the office, but many parcel post packages were sent in this last shipment. The majority of the mail packages and letters have been handled through the Ashland postoffice, which has sent them to the San Francisco dead letter office, who try to find the owner of the material.

Sports GUS SCHNEIDAU THROWS VANCE IN 2 STRAIGHT FALLS

It took just 45 minutes for Gus Schneidau, southern Oregon's new wrestling protegee to pin the shoulders of Farmer Vance on the mat with a three-quarters nelson and a grape vine at the American Legion smoker in the armory last night. Gus repeated this performance again in 23 minutes with an arm-bar and wrist lock and took the main event match with two straight falls. About two hundred and fifty fans witnessed the card and seemed well pleased with the program the Legion boys had arranged for them. It was just a starter for the winter season smokers and the programs should improve each time.

Schneidau had the edge practically throughout the match with Vance although the husky little Chicago grappler had him in some pretty tight places. Although handicapped by weight, Vance showed a gameness that made a hit with the audience but Schneidau was just too husky and clever for him. Vance believed that he can give the local boy a hard run if Schneidau makes weight for him or allows a handicap, so promoters here will keep him lined up for some smoker later in the season. Schneidau in commenting on the match to a Tribune sport writer said "Vance is a mighty good man and made me work some at last night's smoker." Vance voiced the opinion that Schneidau was one of the hardest men he had ever met. "He had me all tied up like a knot practically most of the time and I couldn't do a thing," he said. "Schneidau is one of the toughest boys I have ever met and I would like to tackle him again if he would make weight." Schneidau had a bad cut in two fingers of his left hand which noticeably bothered him during the match.

In the preliminaries the two little Herald boys made a hit when they staged a fly-weight wrestling match, and Red Watson, in an exhibition bout with Kid Silliman, showed lots of class and will be a good candidate for a future smoker card.

Incidentally it is the first fight of importance either of the men have had for some time. It is Brennan's first appearance in the ring since he was knocked out and sent to the hospital by Luis Angel Firpo, several months ago. Miske has been ill for several months.
