

## G. O. P. CHAIRMAN SEES BRIGHT SPOT IN N. Y. ELECTION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—John T. Adams, chairman of the republican national committee today issued the following statement in reference to yesterday's elections:

"Tuesday's election decided one United States senatorship and six members of the house of representatives in northern states. Of these six congressional contests, one in Illinois and two in New York state, were in districts hopelessly democratic. One New York district and Vermont district are normally republican."

"The one district in which there was a real contest was the 24th New York, embracing part of New York City and Westchester county. The democrats carried this district in 1918 by 1600 and again in 1922 by 3400. They confidently expected to carry it this year. The republican candidate, Benjamin F. Felt, was elected by a very substantial majority in a contest in which national issues were stressed."

## NO BRANCH BANKS EXCEPT IN CITY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The federal reserve board announcing its decision in the branch banking controversy today, adopted a resolution providing as a condition of membership in the reserve system of state banks that they agreed to establish no branches except within the city where the parent bank is located. The new policy is effective, Nov. 1, 1924. A resolution adopted by the board declared that establishment of banks by state banks produced an inequitable situation for national banks which cannot establish branches without permission of the comptroller of the currency.

### DEMOCRATS WIN STATES

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The two administration candidates for commissioner were also re-elected over their American party opponents. **Klan Wins and Loses.**

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 7.—(By the Associated Press)—Ohio's first election in which the Ku Klux Klan figured as an issue shows the organization to have been generally victorious, although in some instances it met defeat. The greatest victory scored yesterday at the polls probably was in Youngstown, where the Klan candidate for Mayor, Charles E. Schuele, apparently rolled up a majority over the combined vote of his five opponents.

Two other important victories going to the klansmen were in Newark and Portsmouth.

In the former, W. Stevens probably was elected mayor over E. D. Lach and in the latter Ralph Calvert defeated Mayor William N. Gableman for re-election. Mayor Gableman caused the arrest of more than 200 members of the Klan when they attempted to hold a parade less than two weeks ago.

Probably the most important Klan defeat was in Steubenville, where Frank Hawkins, republican, defeated Herman Passavant, independent, who had the Klan endorsement.

Another Klan defeat apparently was registered in the adoption of the elective franchise amendment to the state constitution. The amendment proposed to strike out the words "white male" in the qualification of voters in order to make the state constitution conform to the federal constitution enfranchising women and negroes.

**Democrat Wins, Kentucky.**  
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 7.—Any doubt as to the outcome of the race between Charles I. Dawson, republican, and William J. Fields, democrat, for governor Kentucky, was removed early today when republican state headquarters here announced Mr. Dawson had conceded victory in Tuesday's state-wide election, to his opponent. Mr. Fields apparently had led the entire democratic state ticket to victory.

Incomplete and unofficial returns compiled by the Courier Journal from 118 of the 120 counties in Kentucky with 451 precincts missing, show a lead for Mr. Fields of 53,904 votes. That control of the general assembly would remain in the hands of the democrats was indicated on the face of incomplete, unofficial returns.

**Woman Elected Judge.**  
CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Miss Mary M. Bartelme was elected yesterday as judge of the circuit court of Cook county—the first time in the history of Illinois that a woman has been elected to a court of such high distinction. Unofficial returns today gave Miss Bartelme a plurality of 14,048 votes over D. J. Normoyle, her democratic opponent.

**Woods Worker Drowned.**  
HOQUIAM, Wash., Nov. 7.—Victor Mokie, a woods worker, was drowned in the Hoquiam river here late last night when he fell from a tug boat. Police said that Mokie and a man known as Vic had fallen into the river while Vic was robbing the Mokie and that Vic after striking Mokie got out of the water.

**Flood New Coal Fields.**  
SEATTLE, Nov. 7.—New coal fields have been discovered in Alaska by Ernest M. Patty, a University of Washington graduate, according to information given out today by Dean M. Roberts of the University College of Mines.
