

RED CROSS DRIVE MEETS WITH GOOD RESPONSE IN CITY

The annual Red Cross drive for national disaster relief and local county needs, started off in fine shape this morning at 8:30 a. m. The drive is in charge of the Kiwanis club, which most willingly and enthusiastically assumed its full oversight.

Mr. A. L. Hill acted as manager of the drive with headquarters at the First National bank, with E. P. Lawrence secretary of the local board of directors of the Red Cross acting as temporary secretary.

At 8:30 a. m. the bank was swarming with members of the Kiwanis club who turned out practically to a man excepting those who were out of the city. The team captains as appointed by Mr. Hill were O. A. Allenderfer, Louis Ulrich, Hamilton Patton and T. E. Daniels. Each of these had his men lined up in teams of two with assignments of territory from the manager and soon teams of men were canvassing business houses, mills, packing plants and residences from Main street to the limits of the city.

During the past year the local chapter through its office in the Sparta building under the secretaryship of Miss Mabel Heines has accomplished almost an incredible amount of work with ex-service men—and needy families all over the county as well as in the city. The county court has carried on practically all of its investigating work of needy families through the Red Cross as its agency and has followed the advice of its secretary in a large measure.

The office under the management of the new secretary, Miss Lillian Roberts, is as busy as ever with every imaginable social problem coming before it.

The Thrift Shop under the direction of Mrs. Card has had a successful year and given away in service more than it has taken in in cash and yet there has been not only self supporting but turned in a neat sum into the running expenses of the county work.

The local chapter closed the year with all bills paid which have been turned into the office while last year there was a deficit of over \$700 to meet.

If the budget of \$4000 is raised in the drive today and during the week over the county, it will put the chapter in excellent financial condition to care for the urgent calls that come to it unless some great disaster should overtake the city.

Out of every one dollar membership 50 cents will be sent to headquarters to be a reserve fund to meet the needs in great national disasters such as the Berkeley fire, Oklahoma flood, and Japanese relief to which a sum was contributed, although the need was so great there that a special fund was raised for that purpose amounting to over \$10,000,000.

Any one who has been missed by the canvass may leave their contribution with Mr. Hill or Mr. E. Harder at the First National bank or at the Red Cross office in the Sparta building.

BILL ISAACS IS PRIZE FISHERMAN

Invocation was pronounced by Mr. Franklin, after which Mrs. Scott sang one of her pleasing solos and responded to an encore. Mr. John Carlin brought the greetings from the city for Mayor Gaddis, who was out of the city. He paid high compliment to the church in giving to the city so magnificent a church and so well equipped. S. M. Scott responded to the toast "Our Organ and Public Worship." Mr. Scott explained the building of the organ, and how it supplies the music and the relation of the music to worship.

Mr. Carlton Jones played a violin selection, which called for an encore, after which Judge C. M. In the 52 years since the weather bureau was first established here, the total rainfall since September 1 is 2.75 inches. The percentage of possible sunshine for the period is 58 and the average temperature is 69.
