

NEW FINANCIAL MEASURES GIVE BERLIN NO HOPE

BERLIN, Nov. 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—Chancellor Stresemann's hastily proclaimed measures, intended to bring relief in the nation's financial and food situation, meet with varying degrees of approval among the financial critics. They view the government's decrees as primarily possessing psychological importance in that they assure the public that the paper mark is not altogether worthless and that it will be shortly traded in against the new coinage.

The government now is making final appraisal of the paper mark contingent upon its ability to halt the money press and obtain sufficient new revenues through the commandeering of foreign currencies and levying of new taxes. The foreign money is to be placed with the new German gold currencies.

In releasing 200,000 tons of sugar for export, the government hopes to coax 80,000,000 gold marks into its exchequer, although the Versailles treaty imposes an import embargo on saccharine products. This feature of the chancellor's emergency program also is provoking distrust, on the ground that the elimination of this amount of sugar from the local supply in all probability will result in driving up retail prices on the home market. The government hopes to have its issues of "rentenmarks" as its new currency is christened, ready for circulation November 15. It is proposed later to arrive at an estimate of the total value of paper marks in circulation throughout the world, in order to fix a rate for the redeemed price for the new currency, being conceived as a blotter for absorbing the unnamed trillion trillions of unnumbered paper notes of varying denominations.

MR. HAMILTON HOLT DOESN'T WANT MUCH

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 8.—Someone to control the foreign affairs of the United States "with the courage of Roosevelt, the humanity of Taft and the vision of Wilson," is needed, at present, Hamilton Holt declared in a luncheon address before the city club today. Mr. Holt is vice chairman of the executive committee of the League of Nations Non-Partisan association.

Burglars Get Nothing
SPOKANE, Nov. 8.—Burglars who tore their way through the roof of the bank at Thornton, Wash., some time last night burned their way into the vault but left without being able to burn off the combination of the safe, according to information received here today. They obtained nothing.

ARTHUR COVELL TO GO ON STAND IN OWN DEFENSE

COQUILLE, Ore., Nov. 8.—A jury was completed at noon today for trial of Arthur Covell, crippled astrologer, who was indicted for first degree murder for inspiring his 16-year-old nephew, Alton Covell to slay the latter's step mother. Two women, two ranchers and eight business men constitute the jury.

The accused man first pleaded guilty when arraigned recently, but later pleaded not guilty. Claude Giles, defending Covell, announced today that Covell would go on the stand in his own defense. Giles also said that no alienists would be called in by the defense.

"The client is without funds and we have no money to employ expert witnesses so there will be none," said Giles. "We will have few witnesses but expect to cross examine those who are put on the stand by the state. Arthur Covell will himself testify. If Alton Covell is called, it will be by the state. The case should be concluded possibly by Saturday night." The court room was crowded today, about half the audience being women.

VIRGINIA RAILROAD STRIKE DECLARED

ROANOKE, Va., Nov. 8.—Engineers and firemen on the Virginia railroad walked out today in protest against the discharge of several of their number about a month ago. General Manager E. H. Birchfield declared he had sufficient men to man all trains from this city. The strike was called all along the line, despite instructions from the railroad labor board that action be delayed until November 14. Mr. Birchfield announced.

FEAR BOAT SEIZED BY CHINK PIRATES

HONG KONG, Nov. 8.—(By Associated Press.) Armed officers in a police boat are searching the waters of the China sea and the Canton river in the vicinity of Hong Kong harbor for the missing ferry launch Lee Fook which left Dumbell Island near here at seven o'clock last night, and has not been heard from since. It is feared that pirates may have seized the vessel, which was carrying Chinese passengers who were bringing \$10,000 to Hong Kong. There were no foreigners aboard the launch. The Lee Fook plies between Dumbell Island, a resort popular with American missionaries and Hong Kong.

BIGGEST GROWER OF WHEAT IS FOR TARIFF INCREASE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Introduced to President Coolidge by Managing Director Meyer of the war finance corporation as "the biggest wheat grower in the world," Thomas D. Campbell, Hardin, Mont., today told the chief executive there should be increased tariff on wheat, either through action by congress or through the operation of the flexible provisions of the Fordney-McCumber act.

"Price fixing as applied to wheat would be absurd," Mr. Campbell said. "Buying up of the surplus by the government is a wrong method of meeting the problem. Co-operative marketing will take a year and a half to be put into effective operation, although the recent tour of Directors Meyer and Mondell of the finance corporation has greatly encouraged the farmer by putting the brand of the government on the co-operative marketing movement."

"An increase of fifteen cents a bushel in the tariff would do a lot of good as that amount represents the approximate difference between the Winnipeg and Minneapolis markets. Such an increase could be obtained through operation of the flexible provision of the tariff act."

Mr. Campbell asked the president if he found it unfeasible to utilize the flexible provisions of the act to urge congress to raise the wheat and wheat products schedule upward.

R. R.'S TO ESTABLISH A R. R. CHAIR AT YALE

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The Association of Railway Executives, meeting today, voted to establish by voluntary contribution, a chair of transportation at Yale in memory of the late Thomas DeWitt Cuyler, president of the association. Sir Henry W. Thornton, president of the Canadian National railways and J. J. Bennett, president of the Nickel Plate were elected members of the executive committee.

PRESIDENT BUYS A RED CROSS BUTTON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—President Coolidge was duly enrolled today as a member of the American Red Cross for the year 1924. He paid \$1 as dues to Miss Janet Moffett, daughter of Rear Admiral William A. Moffett and she pinned on his coat the Red Cross button which will be given to all members enrolled during the annual roll call starting Armistice day.

IDAHO UNIVERSITY STAR DISQUALIFIED

MOSCOW, Idaho, Nov. 8.—Facing the hardest trip in store for any coast conference team the University of Idaho will, for the remainder of the season be without the services of Wayne Davis, halfback who has been declared ineligible by the university faculty because of low grades. Idaho has yet to meet Oregon Agricultural College, Stanford and the University of Southern California.
