

NAVAL CAPTAIN WANTS CONVICTION ON RIGHT CHARGE

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Nov. 8.—Captain Edward H. Watson is "ready and anxious to take his medicine for the good of the navy."

During the first few minutes after the naval court martial which heard the Honda disaster case of Captain Watson, commander of destroyer squadron eleven went into executive session to deliberate upon the finding, the accused officer, fresh from the ordeal of the witness stand, made a statement both surprising and significant, a statement declared by his brother officers to be worthy a man with a record of 32 years excellent service in the United States navy. Asked if he expected release from arrest within a short time which would mean acquittal of the charges of culpable inefficiency with which he was charged, the captain looked up quickly from the paper which he was reading.

"I don't want an acquittal; no sir, I don't want it," was the reply of the destroyer force officer. "For me to be completely acquitted by this court would be bad for the naval service, to which both my father and myself have devoted our lives. I believe that no man in charge of vessels of the navy at sea should get clear away when vessels are wrecked and lives are lost. All I want here is proper punishment and by that I mean punishment for the actual offense committed. If I had been charged with 'inefficiency,' I would not have entered the plea I did. I would have pleaded guilty and taken my punishment at once. But I could not plead guilty to 'culpable inefficiency.' It was that charge that I am fighting. I made a seaman's decision and I was in error. I am ready to abide by the consequences of that error. I want punishment—must have it for the morale of the service—but I want punishment for the offense committed. I long ago on the witness stand in the court of inquiry took responsibility for the crash and I want that responsibility. But I must insist that the mistake was one of error in judgment based on misinformation and an incorrect estimation of conditions, not the mistake of culpable inefficiency."

TRIAL OF STUDENT FOR MURDER IN ALASKA STARTS

VALDEZ, Alaska, Nov. 8.—Selection of jurors continued here today in the trial of federal court of Robert E. Edwards, Seattle, and Ralph Wolfe, San Francisco, on a charge of murdering George Edwards of San Francisco August 17, while the trio were on a trip across the widest part of the Aleutian peninsula.

Robert Edwards, who was a student at the University of Washington when he came north last summer with George Edwards and Wolfe to work in a cannery at Libbyville, on Bristol Bay, Alaska, displayed no nervousness in court. His wife, who lived at Newport, Wash., and was a fellow student at the university, is here endeavoring to aid in establishing his innocence. The defendants and the dead man, all young men, were said to have quarreled about the choice of a trail. George Edwards, no relative of Robert, was said to have been shot as he lay in his blankets. Arrests followed return of the defendants to Libbyville with two rifles and other articles declared to have belonged to George Edwards.

A motion to reject as jurors all who had read news articles about the tragedy was denied.

2 LIQUOR VIOLATORS GET HEAVY FINES

Roy Hessonator, arrested for violating the prohibition law on two counts, the possessing and selling of liquor, was fined by Judge Glenn O. Taylor \$700 dollars this morning in justice court. The arrest was made by S. B. Sandefer, county prohibition officer. O. C. Boggs represented the state in the trial.

L. D. Harris was fined \$200 by Judge Glenn O. Taylor on the charge of transferring and possessing liquor. This was an old charge on which the trial was not held till this morning. County Prohibition Officer Sandefer made the arrest, and O. C. Boggs represented the state at the trial.
