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GAME WARDENS CALL ATTENTION TO THE TAG LAW

For the benefit of people not familiar with the state game laws of Oregon, the following articles taken from the same law, are being printed at the request of W. G. Coleman, deputy game warden, who has found knowledge of state provisions woefully lacking and believes that people should be presented with facts.

(d) A metal tag or seal, which has been approved and which shall be supplied by the state game commission, shall be attached to each game animal, game bird, game fish or part or parts thereof, offered by guests of any hotel, cafe, cafeteria, restaurant or boarding house or club, for storage or to be served to such guests, members of such club, or guest of such hotel or boarding house, which tag or seal so affixed shall remain attached to said game animal, game bird, game fish or part or parts thereof, until the same shall have been consumed; provided that such guest or member of any hotel, cafe, cafeteria, restaurant or boarding house or club, at the time such game animal, game bird, game fish or part or parts thereof, is or may be offered for storage or to be served to such guests or member, shall execute an affidavit setting forth the fact that such game animal, game bird, game fish or part or parts thereof, was lawfully killed and is now legally in the possession of such guest or member, and that the same and that no part or parts thereof have been purchased, or have been sold or will be sold or offered for sale, barter or exchange. Upon the presentation of such affidavit to any game warden or other person authorized to affix the metal tag or seal provided by this act, such game animal, game bird, game fish or part or parts thereof, shall be tagged as provided herein.

(e) A metal tag or seal, which has been approved and which shall be supplied by the state game commission, shall be affixed to each game animal, game bird, game fish or part or parts thereof, offered or accepted for cold storage or to be cleaned and dressed by any cold storage plant or public market within the state, and the absence of such tag or seal from any game animal, game bird, game fish or part or parts thereof shall be prima facie evidence that such animal, game bird, game fish or part or parts thereof, was unlawfully taken or killed and that it is unlawfully in the possession of the person or persons in whose possession it may be found. KEEP AWAY FROM EUROPE IS WORD OF G. PASS PASTOR

F. Gordon Hart, pastor of the Presbyterian church of Grants Pass, an Englishman by birth, who recently returned from a visit to that country where he made a thorough study of conditions, said, in closing a very interesting talk before the chamber of commerce forum Wednesday the average person in Europe is not ready for the United States to participate in the settlement of their affairs and would, no doubt, resent such action and that he personally believed it would be a mistake for this nation to enter any agreement with other nations along this line.

Europeans have not learned the lesson the people of this country thought they had and they meet with sneers and view with suspicion any suggestion that the United States entered the war from a purely unselfish or patriotic standpoint, said the speaker.

"Despite the belief to the contrary and the continued claims of the yellow journals of this country and Europe, the people of England are tremendously concerned about the debts they owe this country, do not want them cancelled and propose to pay in full," said Mr. Hart. "But when you consider the enormous debt of the nation, the fact that they now have to raise 4 billions of dollars tax per year, four and a half times more than before the war, you will realize the tremendous problem they have to deal with."

He said, further, England's very life depends on her export trade and that is exceedingly small in comparison to pre-war trade. Coal was by far the leading export prior to the war, but now it costs 3 1/2 times as much to mine a ton of coal as it did before the war. A ton of Pennsylvania anthracite can be mined and laid down in a Welsh harbor cheaper than England can furnish the coal in the same harbor. The big cost of mining this coal, said the speaker, is because the miners union will not allow the use of any machinery as it will rob men of employment.

The speaker's subject was, "England's Bloodless Revolution," which he declared now in progress is more far-reaching than Russia's bloody revolution.

Before the war there were three classes: The aristocratic class comprising the nobility, officers of army and navy and professions. Second or middle class, those engaged in trade, and third, the great laboring class representing more than half the population. Before the war the latter class was almost ignored, but during the conflict the need for this class became so necessary that they came into their own and are now forging ahead and must be reckoned with in the affairs of all England. Prior to the war, in 1908, only four labor representatives were in parliament. Now there are 414, the leaders of whom are very strangely conservative, and as long as they are, England's future is safe.

The economical phase of the situation is considered one of the most serious and the nation is staggering under the enormous burden of taxation. Incomes of \$1500 or more pay 25 per cent on every dollar as an income tax in addition to other taxes. The burden is so great that owners of large estates are selling them in small tracts, at a loss, to avoid bankruptcy from taxation.

He called attention as another evidence that the common classes are becoming more popular, to the fact that King George is visiting factories, mingling and shaking hands with the common people, that the queen is taking an interest in laboring classes and in welfare work for women and children, and that the Prince of Wales is visiting Canada and mingling with ordinary folks.

M'MILLAN DENIES PARTY IN DANGER

WINNIPEG, Nov. 8.—Every one of the Donald B. MacMillan party in the Arctic region is in good health and they are not in danger of their lives, according to a radio message picked up here yesterday from the expedition in the north.

"Reports that we have been in danger from icebergs are entirely wrong," stated the message. "We are perfectly safe, quite comfortable and all on board the Bowdoin are in good health."

HOPE HAMPTON ADMITS MARRIAGE IN AUGUST

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Hope Hampton, motion picture star, has been a bride since August, Broadway learned today. She was secretly married in Baltimore to her manager, Jules Brulatour, wealthy dealer in film used in the manufacture of motion pictures. In 1917 Mr. Brulatour was divorced from his first wife, to whom he had been married 22 years. He then married Dorothy Gibson, artist's model and the original "Harrison Fisher Girl." The second wife obtained a divorce in 1918.
