BROADEN SCOPE OF PROBE INTO VETERAN BUREAU

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—The scope of the Senate inquiry into the veteran bureau problem will be broadened as a result of statements made yesterday by its chairman, "at certain" employees of the bureau have sought in every way to hinder the work of obtaining records and papers for the presentation of the inquiry.

R. O. Routsong, who was assigned by Director Frank C. Hines to assist committee counsel was named as one of the employees and the committee asked that it be furnished a list of the others. Specifically, Routsong was charged with withholding papers relating to payments to Matthew O'Brien, a San Francisco architect for unpaid plans for a hospital at Livermore, Cal.

One letter showed that O'Brien had presented a claim for only \$12,000 in addition to the \$64,000 paid him for the original plans, and committee members indicated that this letter would have been of much importance in its investigation into the payment of \$33,000 to O'Brien by the general accounting office of the bureau.

The committee was in recess today until next Monday. Routsong and some of the other employees may be called next week. The committee also will be prepared then to hear Charles R. Forbes, former director of the bureau and some of his witnesses.

GRANTS PASS BULL IS PRIZE WINNER AT PORTLAND SHOW

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 8.—J. L. Smith of the Hazelwood farms, Spokane, took from the Carnation stock farms today the \$1000 trophy of the eastern Holstein Breeders association at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition. Carnation carried the trophy away last year. The trophy must be won twice to be held.

Smith's herd also won the Staples silver tea set for breeders' young herd. Another famous trophy awarded yesterday for the second time became the permanent property of the winner, Dr. A. MacLae Smith of the Fircrest Guernsey farm of Bellingham. This trophy for the four best females with the stipulation that it must be won twice to be held, was taken for the first time by Dr. Smith's herd last year. His Guernsey's also won twelve first prizes, and a grand, a senior, and a junior championship. The grand and senior championship cow was La France of Brulee and the junior was Pierette French Maiden. In the bull classes in Guernseys the junior and grand championship went to May Rose Cherin of W. J. Page of Riverside, Cal., and junior championship to Sunrisefield's Victor, owned by the Hines farms of Grants Pass.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—The final match for the world's championship 15.2 ball line billiards between William Hoppe and Welker Cochran will be held at Orchestra hall here December 17, 18 and 19, according to announcement by H. E. Hensinger, who directed the New York tournament. The match will be for 1500 points and will be played in blocks of 500, it was stated.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 8.—Billy Brennan, New York heavyweight, was not only knocked out by Billy Miske of St. Paul in the fourth round of their scheduled ten round fight here last night but early today was suspended by the Nebraska state boxing commission. Harry Summers of Los Angeles, welterweight, who was knocked out by Marrie Schiaffer of Omaha, likewise was suspended for not trying. Purposes of both fighters, said to be in excess of \$2350, are being held up by the commission and probably will be given to charity after a hearing, State Boxing Commissioner William Kavan said.

Leo P. Flynn, manager of the New York boxer, was blamed for the poor showing of Brennan, who according to the commission, was in poor condition.

Stribling Given Chance
NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Regulations of the New York boxing commission are to be broken. It was understood today, to allow Young Stribling, the Georgia high school fighter, to engage in bouts within its jurisdiction scheduled to go over six rounds. The regulations prohibit those under 21 going more than six rounds, but because of Stribling's pugilistic precocity an exception is to be made. He is 18. If a license is granted him he probably will meet either Johnny Wilson of Boston, former world's middle-weight champion, Mike McTigue or Gene Tunney, American light heavyweight champion, at Madison Square Garden December 10.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 8.—Play for the president's cup in the tournament now under way at Waverly country club here is down to the finals. C. H. Davis, Jr., and George Warren are the finalists. There also is in progress at Waverly a contest for the captain's cup. Both events will be brought to completion this week end.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 8.—Advance sale of tickets for the Stanford-Oregon game here next Saturday are much heavier than they were for the California-Washington State game played two weeks ago. Six hundred seats for Stanford followers which were reserved here have been practically all taken. Seats in the Oregon alumni section are likewise heavy. Stanford players are due here tonight and plans have been made by Stanford men here to give them a hearty welcome. The Oregon team is expected Friday.

VANCOUVER PLANS BIG CELEBRATION IN 1925

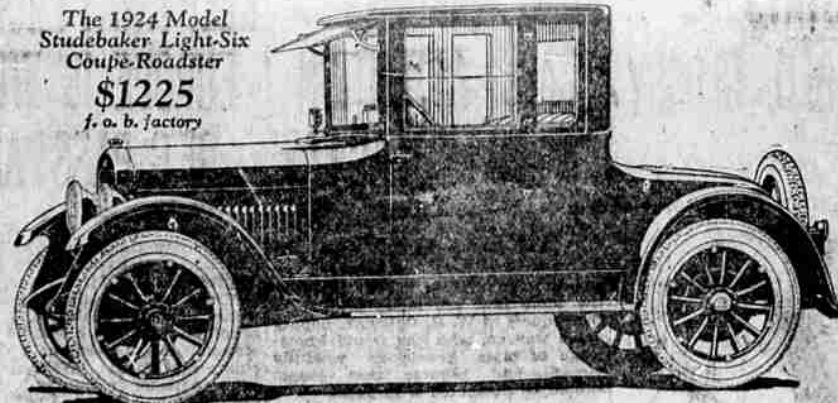

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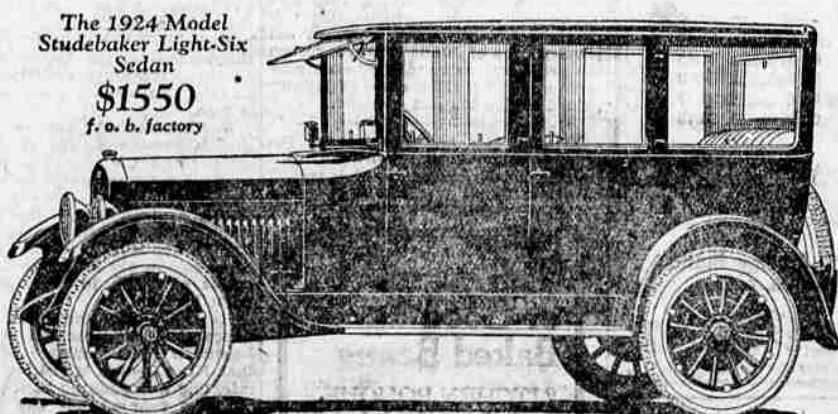

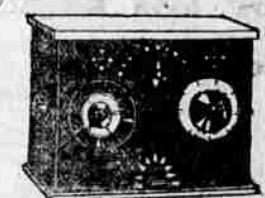
