CONTRACTORS ARE
HELD GUILTY IN
OPEN SHOP CASE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—A group of prominent building contractors of San Francisco, Oakland and San Jose, Calif., were held guilty of a violation of the Sherman anti-trust act in their operation of a permit system for the obtaining of supplies from points outside of the state in a decision handed down by United States District Judge Maurice T. Doelling today in a civil action to dissolve the alleged builders' combine and enjoin the permit system.

The decision held that the combination of builders was not illegal and that the court had no jurisdiction over the permit system within the state. It held however, that no restrictions could be imposed by permit or otherwise on the purchase of materials outside the state, either by members of the combination or by independent contractors.

The court provided that if its decree of today is not fully complied with, the question of the illegality of the combine could be raised and it could be proceeded against with a view to dissolution.

The combine referred to is known as the Industrial Association of San Francisco. It was formed in an endeavor to bring about a general utilization of the open shop, or "American plan," in San Francisco and the bay region, after building had been tied up here and elsewhere by a number of strikes.

FRANCE BLAMED
FOR U.S. A. ACTION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—The British-American plan for an expert inquiry into Germany's capacity to pay reparations in the opinion of the Washington government, has been frustrated and defeated by the attitude of France.

This view was made known officially at the state department late today after Secretary Hughes and Ambassador Jusserand of France had conferred again and after it had been announced at the White House that President Coolidge believed the restricted inquiry desired by France would be useless.

The ambassador is understood to have informed Secretary Hughes during his visit to the state department that the French premier was prepared to insist that the powers of the proposed expert committee should be broad enough to permit only of an inquiry of Germany's capacity to pay during the period ending with 1930.

GASOLINE PRICE IS
REDUCED ONE CENT

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 9.—Effective tomorrow the Standard Oil company of Ohio announced that the sale price of gasoline at filling stations will be reduced one cent throughout Ohio. The new price will be 18 cents a gallon. The reduction was caused by recent reductions in the price of crude oil, company officials said.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Colonel George Harvey, retiring ambassador to the court of St. James, reached home today on the Aquitania, declaring that like Benjamin Franklin, he was leaving the public service to join the masses.

He described himself as an optimist regarding conditions in Europe and expressed confidence that Secretary Hughes with his reparations proposal would be able to be of service in the present situation.
