

4 TRUE BILLS ARE RETURNED BY GRAND JURY

The grand jury which has been in session since Monday morning returned three true bills and four not true bills this forenoon. The grand jury is still in session and probably will be all next week, as there are a number of other criminal cases for its consideration.

True bills were returned against the following: Harry Zangirly, breaking into a store; Vernon Norris, stealing an automobile; and J. Moore, assault to kill. Zangirly was one of the men who recently escaped from the county jail. J. Moore is the wandering laborer who in an altercation with another man, A. A. Moore, who resides in Medford, at a local packing establishment some time ago is accused of stabbing him seriously in several places, from which wounds he recovered.

One of the not true bills returned exonerated Wm. Dusenbury, who had been accused of stealing an auto.

U. S. A. PLANS SPURNED

Both the state department and the embassy were without official advice regarding the statement given out today by the foreign office.

After he left the White House Secretary Hughes took immediate steps to ascertain the purport of the pronouncement.

After the return of Secretary Hughes to the state department after today's cabinet meeting a conference between him and Ambassador Jusserand was arranged for 4 p. m. It also was announced that Mr. Hughes would receive the newspaper correspondents at a special conference at 5 p. m.

It was learned that the cabinet had discussed at length today the reparations situation including the French attitude in demanding a limited expert inquiry and the American position that such an inquiry would be useless.

The view was maintained by Secretary Hughes in the cabinet discussions that it would be merely attempting to do a futile thing for this government to approve any plan for participation by American nationals in an expert inquiry to be held under the French limitations.

The Hughes declaration referred by Paris today was an announcement, which, according to dispatches, Secretary Hughes was expected to make to the newspapermen at Washington at three o'clock yesterday, but was delayed until today at the request of the French ambassador.

ization and that the coup was confined almost wholly to the Munich brew house, where it was staged.

The intense activity in Berlin which followed the first news of the outbreak, has died down, according to direct dispatches from the capital, and the situation at midnight and forenoon was such that police guards were withdrawn from the government buildings.

Authoritative information from Munich is scarce, direct telegraph communication having been suspended, railway traffic stopped and an edict issued by War Minister Gessler forbidding publication of other than official reports regarding events in Bavaria.

The French government which yesterday gave official warning to Berlin that it would not tolerate establishment of a nationalist military dictatorship, is watching developments closely, and Premier Poincare this morning was in conference with his war minister, while the inter-allied council of ambassadors, representing all the allied powers, has been summoned to meet at five o'clock this afternoon to consider the situation.

The revolt had a depressing effect on foreign exchanges in New York, new low records for the year being established by demand sterling, Spanish pesetas, Norwegian and Danish kronen and Dutch guilders. French and Belgian francs also declined sharply. Cotton prices fell off.

"Victory Or Death!"

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—(By the Associated Press)—The Wolff agency today gave out the text of the speech made at Munich yesterday by Adolf Hitler.

"The government of criminals sitting at Berlin," Hitler said, "is deprived of office as well as Ebert."

"I propose to take the direction of the provisional government of the German empire until the moment when the treaty which is precipitating Germany into ruin today has been abolished."

"His excellency, General Ludendorff, takes supreme command of the German national army. General von Lossow is appointed German minister of the reichswehr (national defense)."

"We wish to build up an ultra-nationalist confederate state in which Bavaria will have the place due it."

"Tomorrow will see the constitution of a nationalist government in Germany or it will see us dead. There is no middle course."

After Dr. Von Kahr, the Bavarian dictator, had declared that he was taking a hand in the direction of the state and that he considered himself administrator of the monarchy which the "criminals" had overturned five years ago, General Ludendorff said: "I am going to re-raise the black, white and red flag throughout Germany, including on the Rhine."

ter of the Interior von Schweyer, who were present at the patriotic meeting which was broken up by Hitler's proclamation, were arrested by Hitler's followers and conducted to the police station.

The minister had been invited to the meeting by Dr. Von Kahr.

Berlin Acts Quickly

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—(By the Associated Press)—The fifth birthday of the German republic finds the forces of reaction in control of the government of Bavaria with General Ludendorff as commander in chief of the army and Adolf Hitler, who proclaimed the overthrow of the state regime, established as his political adviser. Several of the Bavarian ministers, including Premier Von Knilling, are reported to be under arrest.

The first fragmentary advices from Munich were to the effect that the rebellion was only against the Von Knilling government, but as other reports were received the impression grew that the revolt was also aimed at the central government and that the leaders of the coup had proclaimed the overthrow of the Ebert-Stresmann regime.

The impression gained strength when a proclamation to the German people was issued in which the government, announcing that steps to restore order had been taken and would be carried out "with the utmost vigor," asserted that "an armed band" in Munich has arrogated to itself the right to institute a government of the reich, "has made Ludendorff commander in chief of the German army and has established Hitler as arbiter of the destinies of Germany."

Dr. Von Kahr, who several weeks ago was made military dictator of Bavaria, has accepted the governorship of the state "as a representative of the monarchy." General Von Lossow, commander of the Bavarian reichswehr, has been named minister of war, while Herr Von Poehner, former chief of police of Munich, has been made administrator.

When word of the revolt reached Berlin, the central government severed all relations with Bavaria, appointed General Von Zeck as commander in chief of the national army and announced the withdrawal of all federal support from the rebellious state until constitutional conditions should be resumed.

The government also addressed the following manifesto to the German people: "At this moment of great tension in the foreign and domestic situation, some foolish people are endeavoring to break up the German reich."

An armed band has overthrown the government in Munich, arrested Premier Von Knilling and arrogated to itself the right to institute a government of the reich. It has made Ludendorff commander in chief of the German army and has made Hitler, who was naturalized only some days ago, arbiter of the destinies of Germany.

"There is no need to say that this decision to carry a coup d'etat can have no effect. Whoever supports this movement will be guilty of high treason. Instead of helping in the Rhineland and the Ruhr, our brethren who are fighting in Germany's cause, such persons are plunging the reich into a catastrophe, threatening its food supply. They are exposing it to an enemy invasion and they are destroying all chances of economic improvement."

"The recent measures of the reich in the monetary domain have had the effect of notably improving the position of the mark abroad within the last 24 hours. This will be lost if the attempt made in Munich succeeds."

"We exhort all patriots to defend the unity, order and liberty of the reich. All steps to combat the coup d'etat and to restore order have been taken and will be carried out with the utmost vigor."

Hungary in Plot

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 9.—Telephone messages from various parts of Germany received by the Exchange Telegraph company here assert that the Bavarian coup is doomed to failure.

Dr. Kahr, Von Lossow and Herr Effer, who agreed last night under the compulsion of Adolf Hitler's army to become members of the new cabinet, have withdrawn, the advices declare. The three of them then ordered the reichswehr to arrest Ludendorff and Hitler.

It is rumored that the principal leaders of the nationalist troops in the headquarters at Munich already have been disarmed and arrested.

Interesting reports have also been received concerning the arrest of a member of the Hungarian parliament, named Ulain, who is said to have concluded a secret agreement with Hitler and Ludendorff regarding joint action at Munich and Budapest. A formal treaty has been found. It is stated, stipulating the measures to be taken on the outbreak of the revolution.

A list of the members of the projected Bavarian and Hungarian governments also was discovered.

The outbreak is therefore not regarded here as a separate movement as seems to have been expected on the part of many.
