LARGE CROWD AT LAYING OF CORNER STONE WIMER S.

WIMER, Nov. 8.—On the 2nd of June, 1923, four school districts, Wimer, Pine Grove, Mayes Creek, and Bybee Springs, were joined to form the new Wimer Consolidated School District. This is the fifth consolidated district in Jackson county, the seventy-eighth in the state, and the forty-first in the state to offer transportation to school children.

A tract comprising eight acres has been purchased for the building and grounds. The site is ideal, and accordingly both pasture and air have joined in making the surroundings attractive.

A modern building, costing \$10,000, is in course of construction, and when completed, it will be one of the show places of the county, and a monument to the farseeing, progressive spirit of the community.

The cornerstone of the new building was laid, with appropriate ceremony, at 10 a. m., Saturday, Nov. 3d. A large crowd gathered for the occasion, and an interesting literary and musical program was rendered. Principal V. A. Davis gave a brief survey of the characteristics of the American system of education, and added much historical data concerning the rise and progress of education in this state.

Mrs. S. H. Carter, county superintendent of schools spoke interestingly of the significance of the cornerstone, and in a pleasing manner alluded to the history of corner stones of various notable buildings and monuments throughout the state and nation.

Rev. Wm. H. Amos of Ashland, gave a forcible address, emphasizing the necessity of harmony of action, in order to accomplish anything of value in the life of the community. Rev. W. R. Gray, of Rogue River, delivered an eloquent address, making a strong plea for moral education, and the development of a higher type of Christian citizenship.

The stone was set in place by W. R. Patterson, one of the contractors and builders; and it was proclaimed square and true by E. E. Dimmick, chairman of the board of directors.

Numerous relics, appropriate to the occasion, were deposited in the stone, and the exercises closed on an event that erects a new milestone in the history of the community—one that will long be remembered by all those who were present.

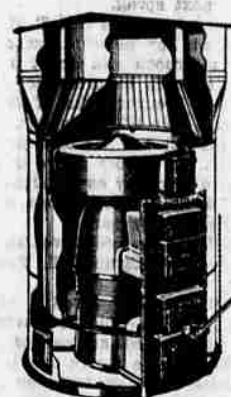
