

BONAR LAW, MODEST GREAT MAN, SLEEPS IN HISTORIC ABBEY

LONDON, Nov. 9.—The ashes of Bonar Law, who was for seven months prime minister of Great Britain and perhaps the most modest man upon whom that honor ever was conferred, were entombed Monday in Westminster Abbey.

In this shrine wherein the nation holds its most sacred rituals, both solemn and happy—coronations, weddings and funerals, were assembled a distinguished company of nearly 3000 persons representing all who are prominent and important in the British world. There were members of the royal family, several hundred men from the houses of parliament, the members of the British dominions beyond the seas, and chiefs of the army, navy, judiciary and civil service.

Bearing the casket were four non-commissioned officers of the King's Own Scottish Borderers and four from the royal air service, they represented the organizations to which belonged two sons of Mr. Bonar Law who lost their lives in the world war.

Ten pall bearers walked behind the casket. They were the Prince of Wales, representing King George; Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin, the speaker of the house of commons, former Premier Balfour and Asquith Viscount Fitzalan, former lord lieutenant and lord general of Ireland; Lord Carson and Beaverbrook and Ramsay MacDonald.

The authorities of Westminster have decided to reserve the south bay where Mr. Bonar Law was buried, for the interment of statesmen and the corresponding bay on the north side of the abbey for men of science and letters.

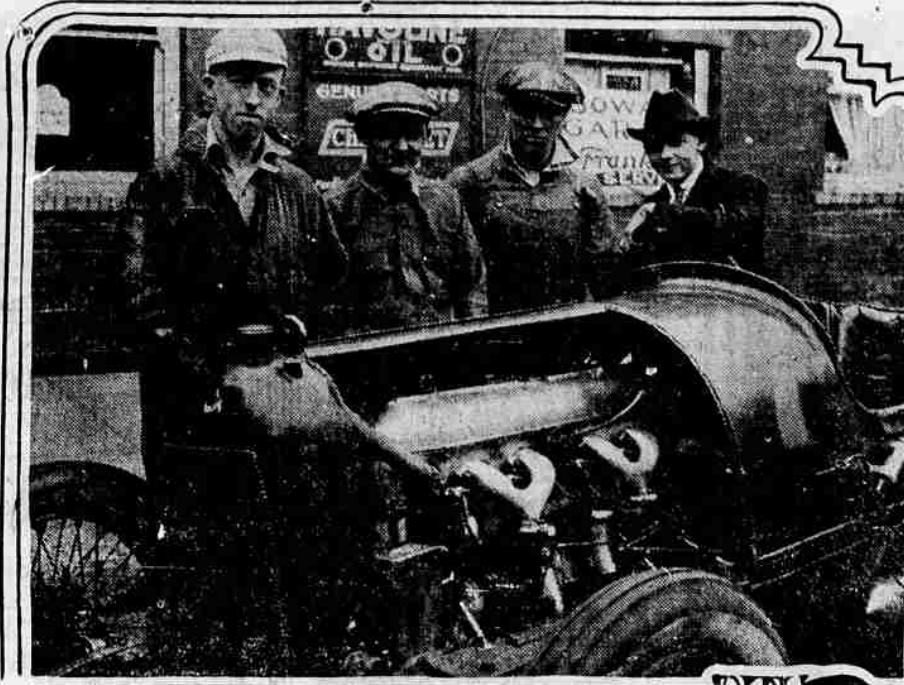
The silent crowd were packed so heavily along the route from the palace to the abbey that several women were removed in a fainting condition.

SWISS MURDERER GOES ON TRIAL

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Nov. 9.—The trial of Maurice Alexander Conrad, the Swiss engineer charged with killing Vladimir Vorovsky, soviet Russia's unofficial delegate at the second Lausanne conference began today.

To obtain conviction at least six out of the nine jurymen must vote guilty. One point in the defense of Conrad is expected, will be that the Bolsheviks have perpetrated many assassinations.

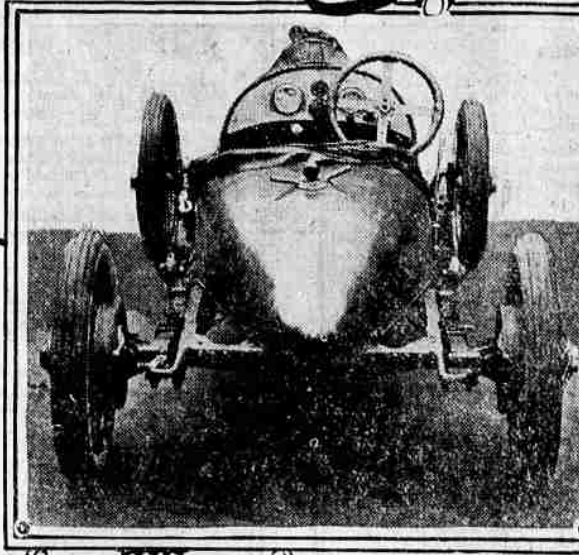
Big Speed Program, Fair Grounds, Armistice Day, Nov. 12



If the weather man continues in his present good humor three days longer the Rogue River valley will have the distinction of being able to stage automobile races as late in the season as November 12. Several weeks of rain, followed by the present spell of sunshine has put the Jackson county fairgrounds speedway in lightning fast condition and according to Chick Hawk, well known Medford race driver, the Armistice day speed carnival will be run off on one of the fastest dirt tracks in the northwest by machines as fast as any in the country.

Three races of six, ten and twenty laps respectively have been scheduled, the first two being restricted to cars not exceeding 220 cubic inches piston displacement and the last race, the feature event of the day, for cars of 220 inches or over. Over twelve entries have been lined up for these contests and most of them are cars which have proved their ability to bring home the money.

One of the "speed wagons" which is causing considerable comment is the Duesenberg straight-eight owned by Paul Reddy and Chick Hawk. This car was built by Eddie O'Donnell for the famous race driver, Cliff Durant and set a world's record on the Indianapolis speedway, of 125.2 miles per hour for a 183-inch motor. Another car of known ability is the Stutz special which has turned up 110 miles per hour on the Tacoma speedway. Clark Walker's Essex will make a bid for place along with Dodge and Templar specials and the Fronty Ford built by George Barnum. A sixteen-valve Dodge special owned by Muir-

head of Gold Hill will compete as well also a Ford special and a Maxwell special owned by Bill Dozier of Portland.

Heavy purses have been hung up for each of the three races for Armistice day and according to the drivers Gold Hill, and Pope Nienegar, Ashland, will occupy the judges' stand.

RUSSIAN REVOLT IS ONLY FIRST SAYS RADICAL EDITOR

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 9.—Russia's revolution and establishment of the soviet government is but the first of a series, the fore-runner of the fall of capitalism and the organization of the United Soviet Republics of the World. William P. Dunne, Butte, Mont., editor, quoted by the American Federation of Labor convention at Portland for alleged radicalism, declared in an address here last night at a meeting celebrating the sixth anniversary of the Russian soviet.

"Russia today is the only country in Europe where conditions for the workers are getting better instead of worse," Dunne asserted. "England is urging its millions of unemployed to emigrate. German workers are in the mire, the slaves of capitalists. France is living on a volcano and will be forced to make another war of conquest to keep its workers from bringing a revolution at home."

Dunne criticized officials of the American Federation of Labor for "crying for denunciation of the revolution."

BRAZILIAN REBELS RESUME WARFARE

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Nov. 9.—Advices received here today are to the effect that the armistice signed by the president of the state of Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil, and the revolutionary forces had been broken and hostilities resumed. The armistice was to have run until November 7, peace negotiation to have been carried on meanwhile.

The revolutionary forces attacked the government forces commanded by Marco Lopez, Uruguayan territory and were disarmed and interned. At last accounts the fighting was continuing.

NEW PROJECT FOR MUSCLE SHOALS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Outline of a new proposal for disposition of the Muscle Shoals project, contemplating a duplication of the Gorgas steam plant, recently sold to the Alabama Power company, and its inclusion in the properties, was presented to President Coolidge today by Chairman Madden of the house appropriations committee.

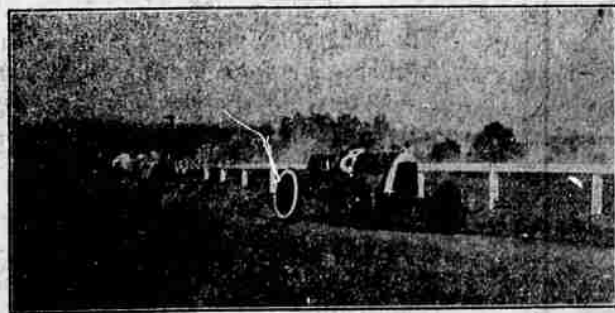
