## KAISER'S SON ESCAPES FROM HOLLAND

## EX-CROWN PRINCE IS IN GERMANY

Frederick William With Permission of Holland and German Governments Flees From Doorn in Early Morning—France Registers Vigorous Protest.

UTRECHT, Holland, Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—Rumors are circulating here that ex-Crown Prince Frederick William who left Weirings early today for Germany, has gone to put himself at the head of a monarchist movement, but this is conjectured and there is no means of verifying it.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—The entente allies will insist vigorously at Berlin that former Crown Prince William, who entered Germany today from his exile in Holland, be expelled from German territory. It was said in official circles this afternoon.

## Bleachers Collapse at Football Game, 25 Spectators Hurt

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 10.—Twenty-five people were injured when temporary stands collapsed on the west side of the field at the Washington and Lee-West Virginia university football game here today.

Ambulances were rushed from every hospital in the city and under the direction of state and city police, spectators joined hands to form a ring around the injured as they lay on the ground to protect them from the curious crowds.

## INDICTMENTS OF 3 D'AUTREMONTS EXPECTED SOON

Evidence Collected in Siskiyou Hold-Up and Murder Case Will Be Presented to County and Federal Grand Juries for Indictments.

While during the past few days the investigators in charge of the search for the bandits who held up train 13 at the Siskiyou tunnel and murdered four trainmen some time ago have not been giving any information for publication it is known that they have been diligently at work gathering corroborative evidence against the suspects, who are named in the reward circulars as including the three De-Autremont brothers, and are now about ready to seek indictments against them in the courts.

In this connection, underground channel reports, which seem to lean toward authenticity, are that the present Jackson county grand jury, which was in session this week and will probably be all next week, will have all the investigating evidence laid before it during the coming week with a view to returning indictments.

And further these reports are to the effect that a special session of the grand jury in the United States court at Portland will be called in the near future, probably next week, with a view to obtaining indictments against the suspects on the charge of train robbery.

If such indictments were obtained and the suspects should be arrested anywhere in the United States or a foreign country they could be brought back to this state for trial with little legal red tape to go through.

Indictments will be sought in both the state and federal courts as a matter of precaution, so as to be able to hold and bring back for trial with little trouble the suspects when they are arrested.

## BEVERLY HILLS TRACK IS ON FIRE AGAIN

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 10.—The Beverly Hills automobile speedway today was the scene of the second fire within two weeks. Flames ate thru the east end of the track and several hundred feet of the track was burned before apparatus from Hollywood joined local fire fighters. The speedway is about ten miles from the business center here and located between Hollywood and Santa Monica.

## LUDENDORFF A SUICIDE IS REPORT

Unconfirmed Rumor Leader in Uprising Fizzle Kills Himself Following Arrest and Parole—Hitler Fleeting for Austrian Frontier—Munich Quiet.

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—It is rumored from Munich that General Ludendorff committed suicide immediately upon being paroled after his arrest in connection with the abortive putsch in Munich.

There is no verification of the rumor from any source but Ludendorff's friends here say they are prepared for such a sequel to his failure and that the action would be wholly in conformity with the military code of honor as understood by the general.

The question of Adolph Hitler's whereabouts also still remains to be cleared up. Some reports have it that he is heading for the Austrian frontier. Those familiar with the Bavarian dictator, Von Kahr, say they believe he would make short shrift of the fascist leader if he was captured.

The paroling of the general took place during the night after he had given Dr. Von Kahr, the Bavarian dictator, his word of honor that he would desist from future participation in reactionary machinations. Ludendorff returned to his villa.

Adolph Hitler, the fascist leader, was wounded in the hand during the street fighting yesterday in front of the ministry of war. His whereabouts is not known but it is assumed he is being concealed by his friends.

Dr. Von Knilling, the Bavarian premier and the other members of his cabinet, who were seized as hostages Thursday night by the Hitlerites, were released in the afternoon. The Hitler forces lost 10 killed and six wounded.

After the dispersal of Hitler's main force, Dr. Von Kahr proclaimed the establishment of military courts and advanced the curfew hour to 8 p. m., also prohibiting the opening of places of amusement.

Putsch Is Condemned  
The local press, regardless of its party affiliations, brands the "putsch" as a crime against Bavaria and the German people and expresses amazement that an army chief of Ludendorff's caliber should have permitted himself to be drawn into Hitler's fantastic plot.

Financial embarrassments are believed to have accelerated the outbreak, as Hitler's organization was without funds and had hoped that the coup d'etat would immediately result in its reimbursement.

Commander Ehrhardt, who has a nondescript force in northern Bavaria, also had tried to obtain funds in forming Hitler that his brigade was entirely without money.

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—General Ludendorff spent some time in the Munich police station after his arrest yesterday, according to dispatches from that city but was released after he had given his word of honor not to participate again in a coup d'etat.

It is believed possible that Adolph Hitler, who was reported to have escaped Bavarian authorities, to have sought refuge north of Munich with his nationalist followers.

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—The government of Premier Von Knilling is in complete control in Munich, according to latest reports from the Bavarian capital. Quiet has been restored in the city. A state of siege however has been proclaimed throughout Bavaria.

The Tagblatt says that a coup similar to that at Munich was attempted at Augsburg, Bavaria, but that the police arrested and disarmed all insurgents.

At Nuremberg also the police disarmed the nationalists. The burgo-master yesterday sent an urgent request to Berlin for troops but Chancellor Stresemann refused to comply.

## Big Court Battle Looms On Disposal of \$80,000,000 Estate of Late Jay Gould

NEW YORK—A long and hard legal contest, backed by the Gould millions, and marked by the intensity of feeling held by the children of the first Mrs. George Jay Gould for Mrs. Vera Sinclair Gould, their father's second wife, has opened in the courts here.

Demand for an accounting of the \$80,000,000 estate of the late Jay Gould was filed recently by his daughter, the Duchess de Talleyrand and her five children, and his son, Frank Jay Gould, and his two small daughters.

George Jay Gould was trustee of his father's estate. The objecting heirs claim he misused his father's estate of \$20,000,000, much of which was left in his will to his second wife and three children.

## TIGERS BEATEN BY HARVARD IN A FIERCE GAME

Stars On Both Teams Carried From Field As Crimson Vanquishes Princeton for First Time in Seven Years—Score 5-0.

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 10.—Harvard defeated Princeton today for the first time since 1915. The score was 5 to 0. Pfeiffer kicked a 25 yard drop in the third period after the opportunity to do so had been presented by a Princeton fumble. In the fourth period a safety by Princeton, when a poor pass caused Legendre to be tackled behind his own goal line, added two points for Harvard.

The first of the year's clashes in the Harvard-Yale-Princeton triangle was marked by a fierceness of play which caused several stars of each team to be carried from the field. Except when Harvard made its drop kick after having a first down on Princeton's 17 yard line, neither team had the ball inside the other's 25 yard line. Princeton made a spectacular advance to Harvard's 26 yard line when it stopped an intercepted forward pass as the game drew to a close.

## STATE INCOME TAX ADOPTION NOW CONCEDED

Measure Has Over 500 Majority—Records Show 116,628 Out of 333,017 Voters Attended the Polls—Two Precincts Missing.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 10.—A majority of 519 in favor of adoption of the state income tax was shown on returns today from all but two precincts in the state. The figures were: For tax 58,569; against 28,059. One precinct was missing from Curry and one from Lincoln county.

This tabulation included complete unofficial returns from Gilliam, Harney, Malheur, Marion, Morrow, Multnomah, Polk, Wheeler, and Yamhill counties and complete official returns from the rest of the 36 counties.

Portland newspapers, including those which opposed the income tax, concede its adoption.

Of a total of 33,017 citizens of the state qualified by registration to vote at the referendum election, the returns show approximately 116,628 exercised the privilege.

## LONDON NOT TO GIVE UP FIGHT YET

In Spite of Forcing of U. S. A. Out By France Great Britain Hopeful An Agreement Will Be Reached On Reparations Including the United States of America.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—Although the press reports from Washington regarding the prospect of a reparations inquiry conducted within a limited scope of the French proposal are by no means sanguine, British official circles in London do not consider the time as yet arrived to abandon hopes of an allied conference including America.

In competent quarters it is asserted that Great Britain will continue to apply herself to the problem of reaching a basis on which a conference satisfactory to the United States can be held.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Restrictions insisted upon by France on the proposed inquiry by experts into Germany's economic condition would render an effort to solve the reparations problem useless and futile, in the opinion of the Washington government.

This decision was reached yesterday after the situation had been discussed during the day by President Coolidge with his cabinet and Ambassador Jusserand, at a conference with Secretary Hughes had explained in detail the nature of the French limitations.

The result was that word was sent to Premier Poincare, through the ambassador, that his determination to restrict the scope of the inquiry, administration officials here believed would frustrate the object of the United States in offering the allies aid in bringing about an adjustment.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—The presentation of Great Britain's bill for her war advances to the French government is foreseen by political observers as one of the probable early results of the apparent collapse of the plan for an expert committee to examine Germany's capacity to pay reparations. It is understood Premier Poincare expects it to be one of the developments.

The reparations commission which will meet next Tuesday will have to decide the question whether the Germans shall be heard, according to their request, as to the capacity of Germany to pay. It is understood there will be no opposition by the French.

## Casualties of the Air Service

MITCHELL FIELD, N. Y., Nov. 10.—Private Aage Rasmussen was killed at the army and navy circus today when he clung to the drag lines of the dirigible TC-2 after she was released by her ground crew and lost his grip after being lifted 200 feet in the air.

Bank Reserves Increase.  
NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The actual condition of clearing house banks and trust companies for the week shows an excess in reserve of \$24,348,330. This is an increase in the reserve of \$37,698,000.

## BANK ROBBERS, FATHER AND SON, ARE SURROUNDED NEAR SPOKANE, WASH.

SPOKANE, Nov. 10.—Bandits who attempted last night to rob the Whitman county National bank in Rosalia, southwest of here, were believed to be surrounded in Squaw creek canyon near Rosalia and deputy sheriffs were waiting in the home west of Spokane of a man believed to have been involved in the affair.

A light automobile identified as that used by the robbers was found during the night, overturned on a curve of the road near Squaw canyon, and Sheriff Cole of Whitman county and a posse of 75 deputies and citizens were closing in on the supposed hiding place of the bandits. The machine had gone through a fence and turned over several times.

That the robbers are father and son was believed by some witnesses of the attempted robbery, who declare they heard the younger of the two men exclaim, "Dad, I'm hit," after they had been fired on by Sheriff Palmer, son of the cashier of the bank. Young Palmer was slightly wounded and Halford Higga, manager of the telephone exchange at Rosalia, was shot in the arm.

## WOODROW WILSON TO TALK TO COUNTRY TONIGHT ON ARMISTICE DAY, VIA RADIO

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Woodrow Wilson's voice will be heard tonight in the far corners of the country. From his study, the former president will address the nation by radio on "The significance of Armistice Day." He is expected to begin a ten minute talk at 8:28 p. m. eastern time.

Spoken into microphone, Mr. Wilson's words will be broadcast by the WCAP radio station here on a wave length of 463 meters. They also will be carried over a telephone wire to New York City, amplified there, and

distributed by WEAF on a 496 wave length. Radio experts believe the message will be heard through receiving sets in all sections of the United States.

Tonight's address will probably be followed tomorrow by another talk by Wilson to admirers who will make their annual Armistice day pilgrimage to his 8 street home. Delegations from a number of cities have made arrangements to march to the former president's residence during the afternoon.
