FIRE CHIEF DIES RESULT OF SMASH

EVERETT, Wash., Nov. 10.—W. A. Taro, chief of the Everett fire department, died today at a hospital from injuries received the night of October 29 when his car collided with a fire truck at a street intersection when answering a fire alarm. His is the third death as a result of the accident. A fireman on the truck and a bystander on the sidewalk who was struck when the truck crashed into a cigar store were killed. Half a dozen were injured. Chief Taro's most serious injury was a punctured lung. He had been connected with the Everett fire department for 20 years. He is survived by his wife and three children.

ENGLAND MAY TAX AMERICAN APPLES

Guy W. Conner received the following announcement from Simons-Shuttleworth & French Co., fruit exporters of New York:

The English government announce a proposed tax on American apples of five shillings per cwt. This must be submitted to parliament and at worst cannot become a law for some months. Practically all fruit trade are organizing a protest. However, it is best to continue exporting until something definite has happened."

Miller and Silas Fleming for mayor, which resulted in Miller besting Fleming two to one. Miller was the reform candidate and Fleming the conservative. All the other candidates had no opposition, and the officers for the ensuing term of two years excepting the recorder and treasurer for one year are as follows: Wm. H. Miller, mayor; P. H. Myers, recorder; P. H. Bell, treasurer and G. W. Jacobs, R. E. Cook, Tony Ross, Frank Childers, Laura Pankey and E. T. Ham, councilmen.

PORT ANGELES, Wash., Nov. 10.—Funeral arrangements were being made today for Fred Williamson, worker in a pulp mill here, who lived six miles away with his sister, Mrs. Jack Marlette, on the lower Elwha river.

When Williamson arrived home afoot from work Thursday evening his sister was about to give birth to a child. Getting a doctor and seeing a neighbor woman installed as nurse he walked into this city and bought medicine and baby clothes.

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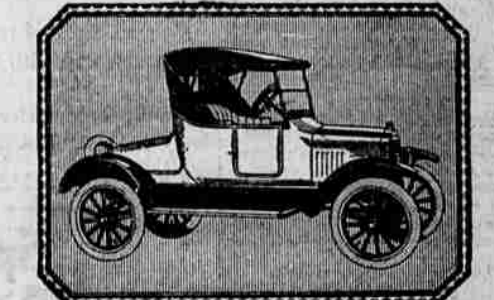
