

WATER PROBLEM STILL PERPLEXING ASHLAND CITIZENS

ASHLAND, Ore., Nov. 12.—Some of the Ashland citizens are not quite satisfied with the decision of the city council to buy sufficient water from the Talent Irrigation company to supply the irrigation needs for the summer months. For this reason some Ashland citizens have hired an engineer to investigate the feasibility of constructing a dam up Ashland creek for storage purposes. This engineer reported that it was possible to construct a dam that would supply two hundred and seventy-five acre feet of water at a cost of about five hundred dollars per acre. The citizens generally seem to feel that the cost is entirely too high and are opposed to the construction of a dam for storage purposes up Ashland creek.

Frank Moore, local high school boy, was thrown from his horse on the Pacific highway, Friday. It is not known whether he was really thrown from his horse or not, as no one saw the accident. duets, inasmuch as the interstate commerce commission has instituted an inquiry to determine whether such rates can be lowered. The present immigration law expires next June, and Mr. Coolidge has let it be known that he will look to Congress to maintain at least the present restrictions. International affairs, excepting the reference to the Mexico conventions, seem to those close to the president, to be destined to occupy a secondary place in the message. The greatest interest will be in the manner in which Mr. Coolidge treats the proposal made by President Harding to the last senate that the United States accept membership in the permanent court of international justice. So far as has been revealed, Mr. Coolidge still expects to make mention that the proposal is before the senate for action, and let the matter go at that.

PRESIDENT NAMES DIRECTOR OF MINT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Robert J. Grant, superintendent of the Denver mint was appointed by President Coolidge today to be director of the mint. He will succeed F. S. Cobey, who resigned recently.

Mr. Grant's name had not been mentioned among the more than half a dozen candidates for the place. He was recommended by Secretary Mellon and also had the endorsement of Secretary Work.

Melville Gillett of Las Vegas, N. M., and Frank G. Matson of Salt Lake City, now deputy commissioners of internal revenue, had been the outstanding candidates. Mr. Grant has been superintendent of the Denver mint since 1921.

DENVER, Nov. 12.—Robert J. Grant, superintendent of the Denver mint, who today was appointed by President Coolidge to be director of the mint, was a mining engineer and took part in the mining activities of the west, particularly in Colorado and parts of Mexico during the early days of development.

Born in Nova Scotia 61 years ago, Mr. Grant was educated in Canada. During the war he was executive manager of the Colorado food board. He has been superintendent of the mint here since 1921.

JAIL ESCAPE IS PAROLED BY JUDGE

Vern Norris, age 17 years, who escaped from the county jail October 14th with three others, was sentenced to eight years in the state prison Saturday upon a plea of guilty. He was then paroled to the court, with orders to report the first of every month. Norris was charged with auto theft, and after his escape was brought back to the county jail by a brother. The extreme youth of the offender, his promises to reform, and other mitigating circumstances, prompted the court to extend leniency. Norris was given a lecture, and informed that one misstep would mean the serving of the long term, and he will be on probation for the next eight years—the longest period of grace ever administered to an offender in this county.

Cotton Prices Soar Again. NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Following an excited and very strong Liverpool market this morning cotton prices on the New York cotton exchange jumped fully a bale in the first half hour of trading. January advanced to 33.32; March 33.62 and May 33.65, with both Liverpool and mill interests heavy buyers.

4 MINERS KILLED IN BIRMINGHAM

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 12.—One negro miner was killed and six others were badly burned, according to reports reaching the bureau of mines today, in an explosion in the side entrance of the Moffatt Coal mine company at Moffatt Spur early today.

Later reports reaching C. H. Nesbit, state mine inspector, said nine men were injured and that four of these probably would die. One hundred other men escaped unhurt. The blast was said to have been caused by the explosion of a pocket of gas.

TOKIO CELEBRATES ARMISTICE DAY

TOKIO, Nov. 12.—(By the Associated Press).—Residents of Tokio yesterday celebrated Armistice day with a big mass meeting. Resolutions were passed expressing gratitude for the profound sympathy and prompt relief work of friendly powers in the recent earthquake and fire.

Mr. Wilson spoke exactly five minutes into a radio instrument at his home here and his message was broadcast to every section of the country. "The anniversary of Armistice day," he said, "should stir us to great exaltation of spirit because of the proud recollection that it was our day, a day above those early days of that never-to-be-forgotten November which lifted the world to the high levels of vision and achievement upon which the great war for democracy and right was fought and won, although the stimulating memories of that happy time of triumph are forever marred and embittered for us by the shameful fact that when the victory was won—won, be it remembered, chiefly by the indomitable spirit and valiant sacrifices of our own unconquerable soldiers—we turned our backs upon our associates and refused to bear any responsible part in the administration of peace, or the firm and permanent establishment of the results of the war—won at so terrible a cost of life and treasure—and withdrew into a sullen and selfish isolation which is deeply ignoble, because manifestly cowardly and dishonorable.

"This must always be a source of deep mortification to us, and we shall inevitably be forced by the moral obligations of freedom and honor to retrieve that fatal error and assume once more the role of courage, self-respect and helpfulness which every true American must wish and believe to be our true part in the affairs of the world.

"That we should have done a great wrong to civilization and at one of the most critical turning points in the history of mankind is the more to be deplored because every anxious year that has followed has made the exceeding need for such assistance as we might have rendered more and more manifest and more pressing, as demoralizing circumstances which we might have controlled have gone from bad to worse until now—as if to furnish a sort of sinister climax, France and Italy between them, have made waste paper of the treaty of Versailles, and the whole field of international relationships is in perilous confusion.
