

LEPROSY A TYPE OF SIN, DECLARES REV'D L. B. QUICK

MARTIAL LAW IS DECLARED CHINA RESULT OF KILLING

SHANGHAI, Nov. 13.—(By Associated Press). Hsu Kuo-Liang, chief constabulary officer for Shanghai and the neighboring city of Woo Sung, who was shot Sunday by Lida Sun, an adherent of the Kuo Ming Tang, a political organization, died today.

Anticipating the possibility of other attacks on Chinese officials, General Ho Feng Ling, military governor of Shanghai and Sun Kiang, has proclaimed martial law in Chinese territory.

Li, who was captured after a pistol fight, was sentenced to death Sunday as Hsu hovered between life and death with a bullet wound in the abdomen. He charged that Hsu has persecuted and killed many followers of the Kuo Ming Tang, of which Li is a member, instigated an unsuccessful attack to overthrow the north China government in 1912 and was proscribed as a peddler of organization by Li Yuan Hung when he was president.

2 JAIL ESCAPES ARE INDICTED

Robert Bull and Eugene Kidder, two of the quartette who escaped from the county jail on the morning of October 14th by poking a hole through the roof of the building with a stick of wood, have been indicted by the grand jury on a charge of larceny, to-wit: the theft of a Chevrolet car belonging to Miss Patton, nurse at Dr. Dow's hospital, for use in their flight. They were in jail for the same offense.

L. A. Neslor was indicted on a charge of pointing a gun at another.

R. R. Wages Increased
CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—An increase of two cents an hour for the 12,000 employees in the mechanical crafts of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy has been granted by the management E. P. Bracken, vice president, announced today. He estimated that the aggregate increase would be \$450,000 a year.

LYDD GEORGE AND ASQUITH UNITE TO OVERTHROW BALDWIN

LONDON, Nov. 13.—(By Associated Press). The British parliament will be dissolved Thursday and a general election held Wednesday, December 5.

The Asquith and Lloyd George factions of the liberal party sank their differences this morning and are united to present a solid front against the conservative protectionists as well as the labor party in the election.

The reconciliation was made at a meeting of former Premiers Asquith and Lloyd George, Sir Alfred Mond and Sir John Simon. Arrangements were made for a united campaign by all the liberals. There has been a great element of doubt as to whether the two bitter political antagonists, Asquith and Lloyd George could be brought together. Therefore the announcement of the reunion furnished a sensation.

Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the laborite opposition, told a meeting of the parliamentary labor party and national labor executives today that Prime Minister Baldwin had informed him of his intention of appealing to the country on a policy of unadulterated protection.

The Evening News states that Mr. Asquith will lead the re-united party. It is recalled that Mr. Lloyd George in answering interviewers when he landed at Southampton from his American visit last week said: "He would favor anybody who would serve the country faithfully."

Amundsen Trying to Finance Plane Trip to North Pole

CHRISTIANIA, Nov. 13.—Captain Roald Amundsen arrived here yesterday to make preparations for his plane expedition to the north pole next July.

Discussing the flight and his acceptance of the assistance of an American naval officer Captain Amundsen said he hoped to defray the cost of his trip partially at least thru a special issue of Norwegian stamps. He also hoped to get some American money but would not ask the Christiania government for money. He said if he was unable to raise the money he must abandon the expedition as he had no more to invest himself.
