

ASHLAND BEATEN BY MEDFORD IN SPLENDID GAME

Seventeen to 0 was the score of the Medford-Ashland football game yesterday. Medford got the 17 and Ashland the 0, which means that local supporters are basking in the sunshine of victory. The Medford team, outwitted by the husky Ashlanders, had to work hard for every point but left no doubt in the minds of 3500 spectators who crowded the Holly street field as to their general superiority over the Granite City aggregation. Costly fumbles, however, kept the Ashland team from what looked like a score on several occasions.

Coach "Prink" Callison's game little proteges were all that Medford fans could ask and every man on the team put all he had into yesterday's



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game. It was a team of eleven men who started for Medford and all should share equally in the victory. Some stars, especially brilliant, however, were Williams who brought Medford's first score and who in spite of injuries was invaluable to his team. Daily, Medford's hard hitting little half, and Senn who was a bear on defensive work. Caldwell did some mighty good kicking for Ashland, Bryant was strong on the center smashes and long end runs, while Dix at guard was a mainstay in the line. The "dope" on yesterday's game tells the story of Medford's victory. The home team piled up 229 yards from scrimmage to Ashland's 113. Eight times the Medford team smashed thru for first downs while Ashland made yardage six times. In the first half the Ashlanders plowed thru the Medford defense to within striking distance of the Medford goal and lost the ball on fumbles. This first half was nip and tuck between the two teams and Williams' field goal only gave Medford III a 3 to 0 lead shortly before the whistle blew.

Ashland Wins Toss

It was twenty minutes to one when the teams faced each other for the fray. Ashland won the toss and chose to defend the north goal. A Medford back caught Chapman's kick and was downed on the ten yard line. After a 5 yard gain thru tackle, Medford punted and Ashland took the ball in the middle of the field, only to return it to Medford the next minute on a fumble. After exchanging punts with their adversaries, the local team bucked thru the line for yardage twice and finished their march on Ashland's 15 yard line where they surrendered the ball on downs and Ashland kicked. Medford then began the march for the north goal but when they tried to kick their punt was blocked. Ashland took the ball on their 40 yard line but again fumbled and Medford kicked to Ashland's 15 yard line. After a short exchange of punts, Daily took the ball to Ashland's 30 yard line on a fake kick and Williams booted the ball neatly between the posts scoring the first points of the game for Medford.

Long Run by Butterfield

Medford then kicked off and Caldwell returned the ball to Ashland's 25 yard line where Medford was twice penalized 5 yards for off-side. Butterfield of Ashland, then carried the ball 30 yards on a center buck, the longest single run of the game. After a blocked pass and failure to gain, Ashland tried for a goal but the kick was blocked. Ashland then smashed thru

twice for yardage to Medford's 15 yard line where they again lost the ball on a fumble. Medford punted to the middle of the field and Bryant, who took Moffatt's place in the Ashland backfield, bucked thru for 12 yards. Ashland was then held for downs and Medford booted the ball to Ashland's 45 yard line when the whistle blew for the half.

Medford Strong 2nd Half

Medford came back strong in the second half, annexing two touchdowns. She started this period by kicking off to Ashland and both teams exchanged kicks which gave Medford the ball on her adversaries' 47 yard line. Daily made a twenty-five yard buck but Medford lost 19 yards on a long end run. It was the third down with 18 yards to go when Medford kicked over the Ashland line and the Red and White took the ball on their 20 yard line. Ashland kicked and Medford returned. A fake kick netted Ashland 8 yards and their next plunge made yardage. Ashland tried for a field goal but her kick was blocked and Medford took the ball on the visitors' 45 yard line. A neat pass brought 8 yards and Williams tried for a field goal but missed. Ashland kicked and Medford advanced the ball to within twenty yards of the Ashland line where, after another five yard gain, Daily circled the end for a touchdown on a crisp cross. Williams kicked the goal. Medford then kicked off and Caldwell returned the ball 28 yards to Ashland's 45 yard line. Ashland took 20 yards on a pass to Butterfield. The visitors here threatened the home goal. But Medford once more recovered the ball on a fumble and kicked to safety. Ashland failed on three passes and Medford took the ball on downs. Senn plowed thru for yardage and, when held, Medford kicked over the Ashland line. Medford caught Ashland's third attempted pass and Fabrick and Daily plowed through for good gains, placing the Medford team in scoring distance of Ashland's goal. Williams then smashed thru the Ashland line for the second touchdown and his sure boot netted the extra point. Conrad who went in for Fabrick kicked off and the ball sear-sawed back and forth in the middle of the field till the whistle blew. In the last few minutes of play Butterfield got away on a pass and with a clear field reeled off about thirty yards before Medford's secondary defense swung into action and nailed him. The game ended with the ball near the middle of the field. H. Woods and Bob Crang, who were the officials of the game, were impartial in their handling of the game and their decisions were satisfactory to both Medford and Ashland. I. D. others, or charged against me by the counsel of this committee."

Didn't Want Job

"I do not mean that my administration was blameless; I do not deny it's imperfections; I do not seek to shift any responsibilities to others, dead or alive; but I do assert that I have not consciously been guilty of any wrong doing, either by act or neglect.

"I feel it is only proper to state that I did not seek this position. I am frank to say that while I have never been particularly active as a politician, though always a republican, yet when the present administration came into office I was ambitious, on account of my experience, to become a member of the shipping board, which ambition I communicated to the late president, who had been my political and personal friend for many years.

"President Harding frankly advised me that it was impossible for him to gratify my ambition; and he ultimately tendered to me the position of director of war-risk insurance. I accepted the position with much misgiving with the expressed desire on my part that I might retire from the office at the end of a year.



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CHICK HAWK IS AN EASY WINNER OF AUTO RACES

Chick Hawk, driving his Dodge Special, was winner of the first place in the six-lap, ten-lap, and twenty-lap races at the Jackson County fair grounds, Monday afternoon. "Chick" took the lead in the first round in every race and held it steadily till the end, while most of the other cars that might have given him a run dropped out through mishaps, one by one.

In the six-lap race, Clark Walker, in his Essex, won second, and "Dusty" Rhodes third. This was the only race that the Essex ran clear through as a punctured tire stopped it in the second and engine trouble in the third. In the ten-lap race, Dusty Rhodes in his Ford, was second, and George Smith, in the Templar, won third. Only three cars finished in the twenty-lap race, out of six that started, and they finished, Chick Hawk first, George Smith second in the Templar, and McDonald third, in a Ford Special.

There were two motorcycle races, a four-lap and a six-lap race. In these Yale Smith was first in the four-lap race, E. Vaughn, second, and Cecil Brown third. In the six-lap race, Cecil Brown was first, "Yale" Smith second, and E. Vaughn third. There were two slight casualties in the motorcycle races. In the first one, Elmer Smith left the track at the north turn in the first lap and was scratched and torn and badly shaken up, and Earl Vaughn, who rode with his foot resting on the exhaust pipe, had his foot badly burned. A doctor was called from the grandstand to attend to them.

Cecil Brown, in the motorcycle race for time, broke the track record, going one lap in 49 1-5. The next best time was made by Yale Smith, 50 seconds.

The weather was very good in the afternoon and the track in splendid condition, and the attendance was large. There were not as many people in the grandstand as there were at the time of the races at the Jackson County fair, but there were more automobiles parked around the track. The Fair Association made about \$500 clear, according to first estimates.
