

## VALUE OF SANTA BARBARA INDIAN FIND CONFIRMED

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Nov. 14.—A collection of relics of the early California Indian will be forwarded to the museum of the American Indian in New York City at an early date as a result of excavations made during the week by Dr. J. P. Harrington, head of a joint expedition from the Smithsonian Institution.

According to Dr. Harrington, the ancient Indian capital at Point Macru has proved to be one of the best archaeological fields yet entered by scientists.

Among the articles unearthed are specimens of virtually every utensil and implement used by the early Indians.

New facts concerning the methods used by the Indians in laying out their villages were unearthed, say the investigators. The collection will form one of the most valuable yet gathered by students of early Indian life, it is believed.

**Would Prohibit Margins.**

## NATIONAL BANKS SHOW TREMENDOUS GAIN OVER 1922

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—The gigantic strength of the country's national banking system is reflected in a composite statement of the condition of the national banks as of September 14, made public last night by Comptroller Dawes of the currency. The statement disclosed that although there were 5,223 national banks in operation on that date, one fewer than a year ago, almost every item figured into their combined resources showed increases over the bank call of September 15 last year.

Total resources of \$21,712,876,000 included loans and discounts of \$11,324,564,000, or an increase of seven hundred million dollars in the latter item alone. Holding of government securities also were larger by two hundred million dollars than in September, 1922, although the entire volume of government securities outstanding has decreased materially in the year covered by the statistics.

There was, moreover, an increase of about one hundred million dollars in the value of securities, other than those issued by the government which were held by the banks.

The total deposits September 14 of \$17,040,530,000 represents an increase of nearly half a billion dollars over the deposits reported in the call of September 15, 1922.

Reserves of national banks held in the twelve federal reserve banks, however, had dropped off slightly from the amount a year ago. The latest figures show the reserve at \$1,162,900,000 while in September of last year they were reported above \$1,200,000,000.

**Lowden Denies Klan Claim.**  
CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, termed "absurd" the statement attributed to Ku Klux Klan leaders that he is now a candidate for the presidency on a platform suggested by a Klan publication. Mr. Lowden said that he was not a candidate for the presidency.

## PRISON AGREES WITH HERR KRUPP; DUMBBELLS ALSO

DUESSELDORF.—Now that he has room to swing his beloved dumbbells, the rights of prison life, so far as personal discipline is concerned, hold no terrors for Dr. Gustav Krupp von Bohlen and Halbach, president of the council of trustees of the Krupp firm at Essen, who is serving a term of 15 years imprisonment here, imposed by a French court-martial for co-responsibility for the rioting in the Krupp plants last Easter Saturday which resulted in the death of 13 Krupp workmen.

Prison life for Dr. Krupp von Bohlen, as well as for Dr. Rudolf Hartwig Dr. Bruno Bruhn and Dr. Otto Oesterlen, members of the Krupp board of directors, and for Franz Muller, chairman of the workmen's council, who are serving sentences under the same charge, has recently been considerably ameliorated. All five men have been removed from their individual cells, where they were first confined, to separate rooms in the home of the prison director, adjacent, where they enjoy a certain amount of personal freedom and freer contact with each other and with visitors who come to see them.

This leaves Dr. Krupp von Bohlen free to follow his habitual bent for apparatus gymnastics. None of the five prisoners is ever out of sight of a guard.

Winter, now creeping up insidiously may seem black to the majority of the prisoners, who look forward shudderingly toward cold, dark cells, but not to Herr Krupp. Lack of coal never did worry him. When the plumbers installed the heating system in his mansion at Essen, they had strict orders not to put any radiator in his study. He simply doesn't believe in heat.

Nor does his abominable stop with his aversion to being warmed. He has never been known to smoke, and his closest friends say he doesn't know what alcoholic liquor tastes like. They are not surprised, therefore, that Herr Krupp is thriving on prison life.

## FARM HOME IS HOPE OF BETTER U. S. CITIZENSHIP

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—The American farm home offers the unit from which may be developed a higher type of governing citizenship, Hubert Work, secretary of the interior, declared yesterday in an address before the association of land colleges, meeting here. He emphasized the prominent place of the farm woman and women in an city homes must take in shaping the character of this country's further citizenry.

Secretary Work prefaced his address with a statement that "in these days when many public men travel abroad to study problems of other nations, it may be profitable for us at home to discuss some of our fundamentals."

"One of the most advanced movements of this time," he said, "is the campaign to introduce motor driven labor saving machinery into the farm home for the relief of the woman there. Originating as an economic conception, just as prohibition did, the resulting conservation of women will also have a direct reflection on race improvement."

"Out of it should come the reading mother; the home teaching of children; a more hygienic environment; a better physique; a stronger mentality; and finally, the nation's greatest present need—contentment of mind and time for reflections."

"All national questions should be reduced to units and a policy adjucced from their study, the home and not the campus, the child and not the man would have first attention. The city home is rapidly merging into an apartment house—congregated community existence recalling the prehistoric cliff-dwellers' ruins of Colorado."

"Heretofore our nation's statesmen and builders of business monuments have been incubated on farms. Those now occupying positions of first place have been drawn from a generation when industry was necessary and respectable."

"The modern American home is not found in the cities. It must be cultivated and fostered in the country for from it must continue to come the men who will do the thinking of this great nation."

"If our social fabric is to be renewed, the necessary correcting must be done in the home and that too the farm homes of the United States where there are 7,700,000 children under ten years of age."

## SCRANTON MURDERER CAPTURED IN CANADA CONFESSES TO CRIME

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 14.—Dominate Delfino, also known as Kenneth Moore, alleged to be a convicted murderer, who, while under sentence of death, escaped in 1913 from jail in Scranton, Pa., was in custody here today, authorities asserted.

Arrest of Delfino in Nelson, B. C., was reported Monday night and he arrived here late last night. He was declared to have shot and wounded four guards in escaping in Scranton. It was asserted that his friends had bribed a policeman to smuggle a back saw and a pistol to him. The slaying for which he was sentenced was of D. Morabito in 1917 and was described as "a black hand murder." Police men will come from Scranton for Delfino. It was announced.

## South Dakota Governor Cuts Gasoline Again

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Nov. 14.—Gasoline went on sale at the state penitentiary here today at 16 cents a gallon, under instructions of Governor W. H. McMaster, who ordered the state highway depot at Mitchell to sell at the price.

Independents and the Standard Oil company are selling gasoline in South Dakota for 13 cents the gallon.

George Danforth, attorney for independent dealers, has started an investigation of the governor's action and will try to stop the state competition in retailing gasoline, he announced.
