

WHOLESALE SHOOTING WAS TO FORM PART OF MEXICAN ELECTIONS

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 14.—The charges and counter-charges of the political factions in Mexico City that appear almost daily received a further stimulus today when the newspapers carried what purported to be a sworn statement by two army officers who have gone to the United States to seek safety. The statements signed by Captain Roberto Marguitt and Captain Adelardo Cruz, said a plot had been afoot for the assassination of several cooperatista deputies on October 31.

The officers alleged that they had received orders from another army officer that with other captains of different regiments, they were to start shooting inside the chamber with Huertista deputies as their targets.

Captain Cruz in his statement said he had received orders to kill Jorge Prieto Laurens, leader of the cooperatista party.

Pacific Coast States to Discuss Exclusion

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—More drastic provisions for exclusion from the United States of aliens ineligible to citizenship will be urged upon congress at its coming session by senators and representatives from a number of western states.

Senator Shortridge, republican, California, and Representative Johnston of Washington, chairman of the house immigration committee, announced today a committee of western congressmen soon would be called to form a unit to get behind the legislation. Senator Shortridge said the supreme court decision this week holding constitutional Washington and California laws preventing aliens ineligible to citizenship from holding land undoubtedly would give impetus to the exclusion provision as a part of a general immigration bill.

DON'T TAMPER WITH ESCH-CUMMINS LAW, SAYS U. P. PRESIDENT

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 14.—The country cannot afford to tamper with the Esch-Cummins railroad law, which attempts to insure a fair return to railroads on their investment, Carl R. Gray, president of the Union Pacific system last night told members of the Omaha Grain club, in an address in which he discussed talk of a possible attempt to repeal the legislation.

"Those opposing the present law want government ownership," he said, "but it is only needful to point out two roads on this continent to show the effect of such ownership and its cost. The Canadian Pacific system under private operation is prosperous and paid ten per cent dividend on its stock besides adding to its surplus while the Canadian National, government owned, is barely able to earn its operating expenses under the same rates and conditions."

Mrs. Skeel, Former Medford Resident, Dies in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14.—Mrs. Kate M. Skeel died here Sunday night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George L. Baker, 945 East Twenty-eighth street. She was stricken with paralysis a week ago Saturday and it had been apparent for several days that she would not rally. She was 65 years old.

Mrs. Skeel and her husband, Myron W. Skeel, who survives her, came to Portland from Medford 13 years ago and since that time had made their home with Mayor and Mrs. Baker. Mrs. Skeel was a member of the Episcopal church and Medford circle, Woodmen of the World, and was a native of New York state. Besides Mrs. Baker she leaves another daughter, Mrs. Paul Scoggin, of Bend, Ore.

SENATOR McNARY REFUSES TO ASK FOR MORE MONEY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Senator McNary, republican, Oregon, one of the foremost advocates of reclamation legislation recommended today to President Coolidge that he make no request of congress at its coming session for enactment of reclamation bills.

Present laws under which the federal government is able to expend about \$9,000,000 annually for new reclamation work are adequate. In view of the agricultural depression, Senator McNary told the president.

"The chief aim of reclamation bills such as the Smith-McNary proposal in the past has been the extension of our agricultural area," the senator said. "Just now, however, one of the things we need most is restriction of farms."

The annual exhibit of nearly two hundred children's books is being held at the public library. The display includes new books of the last year and those titles which have taken their places in children's literature for all time. All are in the best editions, beautifully illustrated. story about the \$500 bills in the Drake hotel."

"It's a lie; it's false; it's absurd," the witness repeated time and again when he was questioned about other details of Mortimer's testimony.

Asked if Mortimer had loaned him \$1,000 or \$1,500 after the western trip, Forbes replied in the negative.

Lie Passed Second Time

Questioned about his relations with Mr. and Mrs. Mortimer, Forbes said he met Mrs. Mortimer first at the veterans' bureau and soon afterwards was introduced to Mortimer. He denied that Mrs. Mortimer was at the bureau on soldier welfare work, saying she was there to visit a woman employee.

He said he became "fairly intimate" with the Mortimers and found them "agreeable companions."

Coming then to the famous Pacific coast trip with them in the summer of 1922 Forbes said it was Mortimer who suggested that he and Mrs. Mortimer accompany the Forbes party to the west as Mrs. Mortimer had never been to that section.

"I stated there would be a lot of men in the party," the witness continued, "but that I did not see any objection to their going if they desired."

Forbes said there had been no conversation with Mortimer about the expenses of the trip.

"Why did you stop at Chicago?" asked Mr. Easby-Smith.

"To inspect the Speedway hospital and to visit patents in the marine hospital," was the reply.

The witness said he met J. W. Thompson at Chicago but not by prearrangement. Before that he had seen him in Washington, Thompson having called on him in connection with a claim against the government growing out of seizure of a ship.

Forbes testified as to the arrangement of the rooms of his official party at the Drake hotel where Mortimer claims he loaned Forbes \$500 in the form of ten \$50 bills.

Up to that time Forbes said, Mortimer had been talking about contracts. "But I never gave him any encouragement," he added.

Asked about the testimony of Mr. Mortimer that Forbes had stated that while he was in an official capacity in Hawaii, he had "fixed things so nobody lost money," Forbes exclaimed: "Again Mortimer lies."

"Try to restrain yourself," warned Easby-Smith.

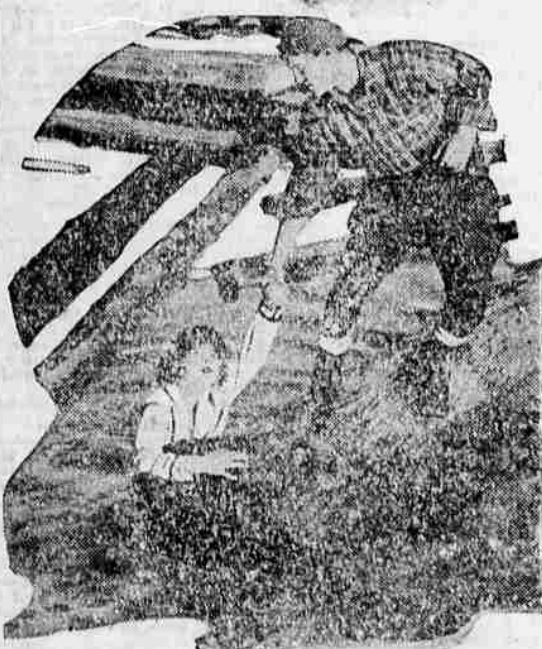
