The unusually long peach season which Medford and vicinity has enjoyed came to an end recently, and adds another bit of corroborative evidence for the excellence of Medford's climate. This season was reviewed this forenoon by E. J. Runyard, superintendent of the public market.

"Peaches are now gone for this year," said Mr. Runyard. "They started coming in on July 10 and ended November 10. Thus you see we had peaches for four months in succession on sale every market day, three days a week. Thousands of boxes were sold during this time, both at home and in surrounding territory. "Now the public is asked to respond similarly by purchasing the Rogue river valley apples, which are very choice this year."

KLAN WITHDREW ROSEBURG PARADE

The News-Review has been requested to make the following statement regarding the failure of the Ku Klux Klan to appear in the Armistice Day parade, as it was previously announced that they would do. The Klan was prepared to march and went to considerable expense in preparing a beautiful float. Several hundred of its members were robed and ready for the parade in which they had planned to participate. When it was announced that the Klan expected to appear, some of its opponents made a vigorous protest. The Legion post refused to consider the protest, holding that the legion is a neutral organization and that an invitation had been extended to all organizations regardless of beliefs and creeds to participate. Shortly before the parade, however, the Klan heard of the protest that had been made, and rather than cause any possible embarrassment to the legion post voluntarily withdrew, in spite of the expense to which it had gone.—Roseburg News Review.

OUTSIDE JUDGE TO HEAR FUSON VS. KNAPP CASE

District Attorney Newton W. Borden has announced that there will be no criminal cases tried at the present term of the circuit court, until the session of the new grand jury, convened Tuesday, is completed. This is expected to take a week or ten days. All the old matters before the grand jury have been disposed of, and the work is now with new matters.

The district attorney said that the evidence gathered in the Southern Pacific train robbery and murders at Siskiyou tunnel, October 11th, would probably, according to present plans, be taken up the latter part of next week.

Civil suits of varying degrees of importance are occupying the attention of the circuit court. There was no session of the court today. Among the suits slated for hearing at this term is that of T. J. Fuson against Karl K. Knapp for damages alleged to have been sustained in an alley conflict about a year ago. Knapp is now a resident of Fresno, Calif. An affidavit of prejudice was filed in this case by the defense and granted by the court. An outside judge will be called in to hear the case.
