OREGON FARMER COMMENTS UPON GATES RETIRING

The recent resignation of C. C. Cate, agricultural agent in Jackson county, is not added commentary on the fact, long recognized by heads of the extension service and other agricultural leaders, that neither financial inducements nor prospects for the future of the service are strong enough to draw into its ranks enough young men of the character and training desired," says the Oregon Farmer.

Cate was the senior agent, in point of service, in this state, having been a county agent for almost ten years. For years, also, he was the highest paid county agent in eleven western states. He occupied a position of influence in Jackson county. He was recognized even at home as one of the top-notchers among county agents in the west, and while naturally he had enemies, even they could scarcely deny that his work was worth tens and perhaps hundreds of thousands of dollars to Southern Oregon orchardists.

"But there, in a sphere which is touched by many of our joys as well as the tribulations of the missionary, his ambition was bounded. His salary equaled that of any member of the Oregon Agricultural college staff, there was no incentive for him to aspire to a teaching position, even had he desired to exchange a life of county agent activity for one of professional dignity. Generally recognized by college and commerce as one of the best posted horticulturists in the northwest, a man trained in both the technique and the practice of every phase of the profession, undoubtedly he could command more money outside of the extension service or practically any other college department than in it. Nevertheless he stuck for ten years, probably largely for love of the work and because he had acquired interests parallel to those of the men with whom he worked.

"Though he now outwardly severs his connection with the service and enters for the time being a line of business more lucrative and entirely unlike the line he has been following, it is our guess that his thought of and his inclination toward agricultural practice will not so easily be drowned. For there is a lure, be the spirit of him who enters it that of the missionary, the adventurer or (at first) the mere seeker after a livelihood, in county agent work. The pity of it is that it is not well enough paid to attract more stalwarts like those already engaged in it."

COUNTY CLERKS AT PORTLAND MEETING

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15.—Sam A. Kozar, secretary of state, and Frank O. Northrup, receiver of the United States land office here, were principal speakers at the opening session here today of the annual meeting of the County Clerk's association of Oregon. Discussions relating to work of county clerks occupied much of the time of today's sessions.

At the afternoon session there will be papers by Miss I. F. Bunch of Coquille and Floyd, Moore of Dallas, Joseph W. Beveridge, clerk of Multnomah county, will give a report on activities of the legislative committee. The final feature will be a round table discussion led by J. W. Hunt of St. Helens.

OREGON GAIN IN TAX VALUATIONS IS \$15,000,000

SALEM, Nov. 15.—The assessed valuation for Oregon, not including public utilities, shows a gain of approximately \$15,000,000 over the valuation for 1922, according to reports filed with Earl Fisher, state tax commissioner, by the county assessors of Oregon's 26 counties. The reports for 23 of the 36 counties in the state show gains in valuations, while the 13 counties show decreases, in several instances, in both cases the differences being but a few thousand dollars.

The greatest increase in valuations is shown in Tillamook, with a gain of approximately \$5,700,000 over last year's figures. Multnomah county shows a healthy gain of nearly \$5,000,000 over the valuations of 1922. The total valuation for the state, on which the taxes for 1923 will be based amounts to \$900,444,131.33, as compared to \$885,792,095.84 for 1922. FLEXIBLE TARIFF IS CALLED IN ON U. S. WHEAT DUTY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Investigation of the tariff duty on wheat was ordered by the tariff commission yesterday under the flexible provisions of the Fordney-McCumber act. The commission fixed November 15 as the date for a preliminary hearing with respect to the propriety of the present rates. In the meantime, a committee of experts to be composed of representatives of the department of agriculture, already have begun a thorough study of the whole wheat situation.

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—(By Associated Press.) An agricultural export commission, designed to restore farm purchasing power by withdrawing exportable surpluses from the domestic market, "is receiving the very careful consideration of the department of agriculture," Secretary Henry C. Wallace said yesterday in an address before the Chicago Association of Commerce.

While the proposal "is not put forward as a policy of the administration," the secretary said, it had the support and approval of many officials who are in a position to influence legislation on the commission.

Mails Letter in Fire Alarm Box
SPOKANE, Nov. 14.—The ancient jest about mailing a letter in a fire alarm box was enacted here this morning when downtown apparatus turned out in response to a call received from a close-in quarter.
