PAUL DEMMER IS FINED \$2.50 FOR POSSESSING WINE

Because Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Owing of the Evans creek section were arrested in Gold Hill last Tuesday night on charges of intoxication by the marshal of that city, Paul Demmer of Medford was heavily fined by Judge Taylor here today on his plea of guilty to having seventy gallons of home made wine, which was fermenting, at his home on West Fourth street.

Following the arrest of the Owings Tuesday night they were brought to this city where Owing was placed in jail over night, and Mrs. Owing was placed in custody at a local hotel as there are no accommodations for women prisoners at the city prison. She disappeared from the hotel over night.

On Thursday, County Probation Officer Sandefer learned that Mrs. Owing was at the Paul Demmer home which fact together with other evidence Sandefer claims to have collected about Demmer, led him to make a search of the Demmer home where the seventy gallons of wine was found. Following this he placed under arrest Demmer and Mrs. Owing.

In Judge Taylor's court here today Demmer was fined \$2.50 on his plea of guilty to having the wine in his possession. O. C. Boggs prosecuted the case as special prohibition enforcement attorney. Owing and his wife pleaded guilty to intoxication charges before County Judge Gardner yesterday, and Mrs. Owing was fined \$25. Sentence has not yet been passed on Owing.

The county court has assessed \$14.75 for fines to date of this month, and eleven months of jail sentences have been passed.

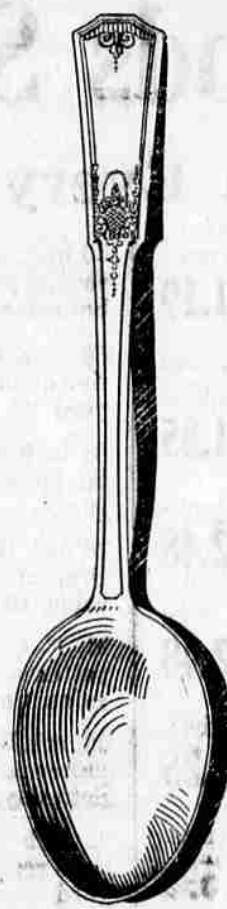
