Losses aggregating \$1,037.75 were suffered in the 37 fires in Oregon outside of Portland during October, according to the state fire marshal. Destruction of Mill B of the Oregon Pulp and Paper company at Oregon City accounts for \$400,000 of the total. Twelve of the 37 fires were dwelling houses, five in prune dryers and warehouses, four in schools and halls. Six of the 37 fires were of incendiary origin. 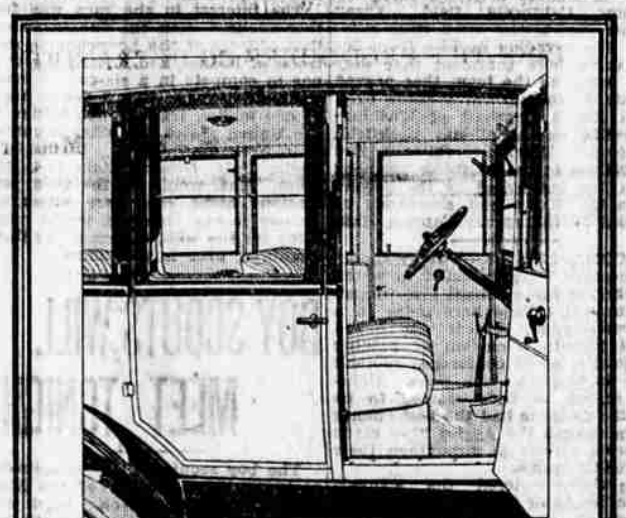
