REORGANIZE BOY SCOUT TROOPS AT MEETING SATURDAY

At the meeting of the Boy Scouts Saturday evening at the Main street Methodist church, seven scout troops came into being. Assignments were made as far as possible according to church affiliation or preference. Each troop will be attached to a church as soon as leadership and sufficient boys are secured to promote them. The new troops drew for numbers by which they will be designated hereafter. They are attached as follows: Troop No. 1, Catholic church; Troop No. 2, Main Street Methodist; Troop No. 3, Christian church; Troop No. 4 and Troop No. 5, Presbyterian church; Troop No. 6, First Methodist church; Troop No. 7, Baptist church.

Mr. Charles A. Wing of the First National bank, has been added to the staff of Scout Masters. At the regular meeting time Saturday night the troops will meet at the churches to which they are attached for troop organization and training, with the exception of Troop 7, which will meet this week with Troop 2. The Troops will be under the leadership of the following scout masters or assistants: No. 1, Rev. F. W. Black; No. 2, Rev. J. B. Coan; No. 3, C. A. Wing; No. 4, F. J. Frazier; No. 5, F. J. Frazier with assistants: No. 6, George Kunzman; No. 7, Phillip Lounsbury.

The new troops were not given their full strength of 32 boys in order that new recruits may have a chance. On Saturday morning at 10 o'clock all the qualified first class, second class and tenderfoot scouts will meet at the Main street Methodist church for registering their credits and a review of their previous training. At this meeting a ceremonial and initiation class will be organized. The meeting Saturday night was a very enthusiastic one and before leaving the new troops gave rousing cheers and yells for their organizations. The annual registration fee for each scout which goes to national headquarters is fifty cents. These fees should be paid as soon as possible to scout masters, according to a statement by Mr. Coan. Any boys who are unable to pay this fee should see him and arrangements will be made for them to work out their fifty cents. The boys who desire to become scouts and will qualify as to morals, will not be shut out because of lack of funds. There is a chance for every one who wants to get in and make good.

LITHIANS FAVOR MAKING PARK YEAR ROUND AUTO CAMP

ASHLAND, Nov. 19.—Owing to the fact that the Lithia Park camp ground continues to be filled daily, and many are staying several days at a time, and also owing to the fact that quite mobile registration continues quite heavily, the Lithians have taken the matter under consideration and have adopted the following resolutions: Be it resolved: That the Ashland auto camp ground has heretofore been considered the leading camp on the Pacific coast, if not in the entire country, and has been the greatest advertising and business asset of Ashland.

That it is now positively necessary that immediate additional improvement and expansion be provided in order that Lithia park grounds be kept in the fore front and made an all the year round camp, and be it further

Resolved, that we urge the city council and city park board to take such steps as are necessary to carry out the plan of improvement and enlargement.

Mr. Miller states that the Lithians are practically unanimous in wishing to adopt a program which will keep Ashland's camp far in the lead of other camps, and that this organization endorses a club house for the use of the campers in which a radio may be installed.

PRESBYTERIANS TO HOLD SERVICES ALL THIS WEEK

The large audiences at each service at the Presbyterian church Sunday, testified to the deep interest being manifested in the earnest Bible teaching messages being given by Rev. L. B. Quick of Roseburg, who is the special speaker during the two weeks' service being held there.

The Sunday school almost reached the 300 mark set, there being 295 present, several of them being new scholars brought in through the scout movement.

In the morning and evening messages, Rev. Mr. Quick by his detailed analysis of scripture passages, vivid word pictures, thorough knowledge of Old Testament symbols so often referred to in the New Testament and occasional use of vivid, personal experiences, gripped his audiences and sent them home with the conviction that they wanted to know more of that book of scripture and more of the fullness of the Christian life open to them.

The value and privilege and duty of winning souls for Christ was emphasized in the morning message on Christian Workmanship, in the evening from the story of the woman touching the hem of Christ's garment. He taught that the faith that brings salvation is the same faith that brings physical healing. It is a God given faith in both instances, not something to be worked up, but something to be obtained through yielding the life to Christ and the influences of His Holy Spirit. Several striking instances of salvation and healing were given in the evening messages.

Tonight, the theme will be "The Christian's Prize" and tomorrow, Tuesday night, many of the objections often urged against Divine healing will be answered. There will also be a prayer service for the sick. Those wishing to be prayed for should speak to the pastor.

Afternoon studies on "The Victorious Christian Life" which were such a blessing to many, will be continued every afternoon this week. Every one is welcome to any and all of the meetings. Remember the hour 2:30 p. m. and 7:30 p. m.

There will be special music each night.
