FORM PROGRESSIVES INTO THIRD PARTY AIM OF COMMITTEE

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Formal action looking toward the amalgamation of progressive political organizations of a number of middle-western states into a third national political party, is expected at a meeting of representatives of state progressive organizations here today, according to W. A. H. Hopkins, chairman of the committee of forty-eight.

At a meeting here yesterday in response to a call by Mr. Hopkins, a number of progressives considered resolutions calling for united political action leading to a third party. The proposals recommended a platform embodying public ownership of railroads, control of money and credits by the people through government banks and co-operative banks, a public control of natural resources and preservation of civil rights guaranteed by the constitution and legislation to "prevent judicial abuses."

Those in attendance are said to have reflected the viewpoint of the general movement which they term "progressive."

EDUCATION WEEK TO BE FORUM TOPIC

The Medford Chamber of Commerce will observe "Educational Week" by having Prof. H. S. Tuttle of the Pacific Grove University speak on the value of an education at the forum on Wednesday at the Hotel Medford.

Educational week has the endorsement of the National Education association, the American Legion and the United States Bureau of Education. The local post of the American Legion and the school authorities of Medford are fostering the movement here and the chamber will be devoting this week's forum to the subject.

GRAND JURY IS INVESTIGATING TUNNEL HOLD-UP

This car is now standing on a railroad siding here.

The witnesses appearing before the grand jury include the investigators—special railroad agents and postoffice inspectors engaged in the case. It is understood that quite a number of railroad trainmen will also testify.
