2 COUNTY JAIL ESCAPES GIVEN 10 YEARS IN PEN

Robert Bull and Eugene Kidder, two county jail prisoners, held for auto thefts, who escaped from the jail on the morning of October 14 by punching a hole through the roof with a stick of wood and a case knife, were sentenced to ten years in state prison Monday afternoon by Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas. Bull and Kidder were captured in Lane county ten days after their flight and according to the sheriff's office have prison records.

Verne Norris, a third member of the jailbreaking party, was sentenced last week to eight years in state prison, and the sentence suspended pending good behavior, Norris being on parole to the court, with orders to report in full the first of each month. This action was taken on account of the youth of Norris. He was returned to the jail after his escape by a relative.

Harry Zangley, the fourth member of the party, charged with breaking into the Economy Groceries, is still at large.

DRY ENFORCEMENT EXPENSES NEARLY \$1000 A MONTH

Expenditures for prohibition enforcement in this county for 1923 up to November 16 total \$992.99, with fines collected for violations of the law aggregating \$4,489.10, according to the official records of the county clerk's and county treasurer's offices.

October leads the list with a grand total of \$1479.25, this amount including a payment of \$50 to Enforcement Officer Sandefer for work on the Siskiyou tunnel robbery and murders. The October bills, the highest in the records of local enforcement are as follows:

The purchase of advertising space by some of the merchants in publications that did not have the endorsement of the bureau was severely condemned and merchants are to be requested to more closely follow the schedule adopted by the bureau in the purchasing of advertising.

Although no definite action was taken, the merchants agreed that during the county fair next year they would be willing to close their shops in the afternoon on several of the days instead of just on Medford day. It was decided that the next meeting of the bureau be held in the early part of December and that a certain business topic be presented by one authoritatively advised on same.
