MANY TREATIES UP
FOR DECISION AT
COMING CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Added to the legislative burden of the coming session of congress is to be the presentation to the senate of several new treaties, for whose reception arrangements have been made by President Coolidge and Secretary Hughes with Chairman Lodge of the senate foreign relations committee.

With the Harding proposal for American participation in the world court already before the senate, the

ten treaties which are to be transmitted to the senate upon its reconvening include:

The treaty of Lausanne between the United States and Turkey, re-establishing relations with Turkey and containing capitulations governing commercial as well as diplomatic intercourse.

The Mexican treaty which paved the way for recognition by the United States of the Obregon government and provides for protection of American property rights in Mexico as negotiated by John Barton Payne and Charles R. Warren, special envoys of President Harding.

The Hughes-Curzon treaty extending the shore limits of American operations against rum runners and providing for entrance under seal of "ship stores" of liquor on British vessels.

In addition, the Canadian halibut fisheries treaty is to be resubmitted to the senate to meet Canadian objections.

GERMANY HOPES
FOR BIG ANGLO-
AMERICAN LOAN

BERLIN, Nov. 20.—(By Associate Press.) With regard to the reports of impending conclusion of an Anglo-American loan to Germany, the Boersen-Courier says today that negotiations are in progress between a well known Berlin bank and a group of American, British and Dutch financiers for a credit to Germany of 1,400,000,000 gold marks.

The granting of the credit, says the newspaper, is dependent upon the conditions that there be no change in the internal political situation in Germany and that the offer be made only to the Stresemann government.

The guarantee for the loan is to be assumed by the German government rather than by private industry, continues the paper adding that international capital probably will be invested in the gold note bank which it is proposed to establish.

RETURN LAND OR
AID RECLAMATION
IS WESTERN PLEA

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 20.—Problems involved in the task of reclaiming vast untillable areas were definitely delineated by Frank E. Brown, secretary of the Western States Reclamation association yesterday in his annual report, presented at the opening session of the third general conference.

The appointment of the fact finding commission for the bureau of reclamation was pointed out by Mr. Brown as being the first step in a solid business administration, which he declared the reclamation system has needed badly.

R. E. Shephard who was elected president to succeed D. W. Davis, resigned, reiterated the secretary's position in regard to the fact-finding commission and stated that he believed it was the duty of the western association to give the members of the commission all information within their power.

Whitney L. Boice, attorney of Portland, Ore., the new vice president, seconded Mr. Shephard's statements. Mr. Brown emphasized the fact that within the broad domain of the west and south there are thousands of acres of land, representing billions of dollars of wealth which is as yet untapped, and in answer to the arguments of over-production and to statements that further development of arid and swamp land would add to his over-production, it was pointed out that the population of the country was increasing at the rate of a million a year, or ten millions in ten years.

"When one considers the statement of two years ago made by Secretary Fall that there is one hundred fifty billions of dollars of unused and undeveloped wealth in the public lands of the United States and that the ultimate income to the government from these lands will be more than twelve billion dollars, it challenges to action," Mr. Brown's report said. "It would seem that there could be but little question, when the minds of legislators have been cleared of temporary delusions, that they will see the wisdom of appropriating \$250,000,000 for a revolving fund indicating an income almost fifty times the amount from their public lands. But if the government feels that such an expenditure is not wise, it may return to the several states the public domain within their borders and we can earnestly promise that no request will ever be made for financial aid."

MAY HARVEST
OREGON APPLES
IN THE SPRING

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 20.—Sutherland's fall apple crop will be harvested next spring, if the winter weather is not too cold. A spring crop of apples is something unusual even to the old residents of the Umpqua valley, but if the weather during the winter months is not too severe apple growers of the Sutherland vicinity will be picking ripe apples from their trees in April.

Last August a severe hail storm struck through the valley and the fall crop destroyed. Later the trees began to put forth new shoots. Fruit buds formed and swelled and now a good crop of apples appears to be well set, and the fruit has reached a good size.

NEXT WAR WILL BE
WON BY 'RESERVES'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—The next major war "will be won or lost on the sufficiency of munitions reserves," Major General Clarence C. Williams, chief of army ordinance, predicted in his annual report, made public today at the war department.

"I wish to emphasize the importance of adequate emergency reserve supplies," General Williams said, adding that in view of the isolated position, highly developed specialized industries and immense resources of the United States it seemed "fairly certain that no power or combination of powers now in existence" could successfully invade the country after American men, power and industry had been fully mobilized.

"The possible rate of mobilization will always be determined by the state of our reserves," he reported said, "since man power can be mobilized much more readily than industry."

Leaking Steamer in Tow.
SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 20.—The steamer Miraflores, reported in a leaking condition 500 miles off the Georgia coast, was in tow of the steamer Royal Star last night, bound for Norfolk, according to radio advice reaching the coast guard cutter Yamacraw.

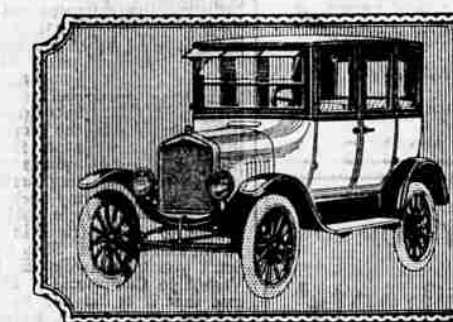
