

MANY WITNESSES GIVE EVIDENCE ON SISKIYOU HOLD-UP

Unfolding of the story of the Siskiyou tunnel attempted train robbery and quadruple murders of October 11, last, as collected by postal inspectors, department of justice agents, Southern Pacific special agents, private detectives, and county officials, began before the grand jury Monday was only half finished at noon today. Fifteen of the 25 witnesses subpoenaed to testify were still to be heard when the inquisitorial body reconvened this afternoon.

Daniel O'Connell, chief of the Southern Pacific special agents, in charge of the case, spent most of Monday afternoon telling of the evidence collected against the three DeAutremont brothers.

Other witnesses called were W. R. Wilson, superintendent of the Southern Pacific with headquarters at Dunsmuir, Calif.; C. B. Welter, a postal inspector with headquarters at Portland, J. O. Merritt of Ashland, conductor of the ill fated train and one of the first to reach the engine after the mail car had been blown up; O. H. J. Benjamin, rear end brakeman of the passenger train, Hugh Haffey of San Francisco, express messenger, who looked out of the express car door when the train stopped, and saw Fireman Seng standing by the engine steps with hands in the air, and afterwards saw two men running from the tunnel. Coroner John A. Perl, Dr. W. W. P. Holt of this city, who performed an autopsy on the murdered victims; H. B. Carter of Ashland, nephew of E. V. Carter, pioneer banker, who was in the express car; V. L. Argaga of Sacramento, foreman of the section crew near Siskiyou on the day of the crime; T. O'Connors of San Francisco, a special agent; Maurice Corturi, special agent of the Southern Pacific; L. D. Forcurock, deputy sheriff of Jackson county; Mrs. Deter of Deter, Ore., and Mrs. F. J. Ernster of Gregory, Ore., Frank

As soon as the above list of witnesses have been examined the grand jury will inspect the wrecked mail car, now sidetracked near the Main street crossing.

CRATERS TO SELL 1000 TICKETS TO ASHLAND F. B. GAME

The Medford high school football team, its coach, Prince Callison, and Superintendent Aubrey G. Smith and Principal O. R. Campbell were honor guests of the Craters club at that organization's regular meeting Monday night at the Medford Hotel.

The motto of the evening was "1000 at Ashland Thanksgiving," and the grand eruption announced that the Craters had agreed to sell 1000 tickets for the football game. It was also stated that the Craters would carry students in their cars to the game.

Colonel E. E. Kelly was the principal speaker of the evening, and addressed his remarks to the football players.

"As long as you boys put up the same game uphill fight, you put up last Saturday, the Craters will be back of you," said the colonel. "I would rather see you go down to defeat playing the way you did Saturday, than to win unfairly."

Colonel Kelley mildly rebuked the high school officials for allowing incompetent officials to function at a game, and declared it "was disheartening to encounter a head linesman like the one that held forth in the Salem game."

B. E. Harder, representing the Chamber of Commerce compared the gridiron game to the battle of business, and urged the football players to play both in the same spirit.

Both speakers paid tribute to the ability of Coach Callison, and that gentleman replied in a few words that it was the intention of the team to "fight fair and square in every game."

Seeley Hall made a few remarks in which he took some digs at coach and players, and closed by saying the present team was the best in the history of the city.

Superintendent Smith delivered a short talk, and was prevented from launching into an oration on "Education Week." Principal Campbell spoke a few words.

Captain Harley Dressler speaking for the team, thanked the Craters for their hospitality, and promised "all we have in the Ashland game."

Millan (Mike) Jacobs, yell king of the school, spoke briefly, and led the yelling at the close of each speech. The session closed with a debate between O. O. Alenderfer and George Gates and E. C. Jerome and Vernon Vawter, on calling off athletic relations with Ashland, which was a facious affair, and was declared a tie.

BAN SUNDAY DANCES SEATTLE, WASHINGTON

SEATTLE, Nov. 20.—Public dances on Sundays will be stopped in Seattle under an ordinance unanimously passed by the city council. The council considered such action last spring but forebore when organizations of war veterans pleaded they needed receipts from Sunday dances. Mrs. Henry Landis, councilwoman, whose husband is a dean in the University of Washington, introduced an ordinance which passed yesterday, ending the Sunday dances.

MEDFORD ROTARY DONATES \$250 TO BOY SCOUTS

The Medford Rotary club at their regular meeting today not only presented the local Boy Scout organization with a check for \$250 to aid in the work of local organization but pledged the united support of the organization to the success of the campaign to raise a total of \$1,000.

The principal talk was given by Professor Harold Tuttle, of the department of education of Pacific University at Forest Grove, his university being one of 42 in the country which and like Harvard and Yale was organized to promote the Puritan ideal of education.

Professor Tuttle particularly emphasized the necessity of making education something more than a mere repetition of Fourth of July speeches and phrases. He said the great aim is to translate idealism into action and service, so that patriotism will be a thing of the spirit, and he embodied in constructive action. The Boy Scout movement he declared to be an ideal vehicle for such a work.

The speaker gave as an example, the phrase, "America, My Country, may she ever be right, but right or wrong, My Country! Here," said he "is an example of the necessity of knowing the meaning behind the words. Education would reveal the weakness of this phrase without the qualifying clause but 'Let me make her the right kind of America.'"

Rev. "Barney" Oldfield of Ashland preceded Professor Tuttle and made a great hit with a Scandinavian dialect poem imported from Minneapolis.

PACKERS ORDERED TO OPEN UP BOOKS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Secretary Wallace announced today that he had made a demand on Swift and company, Chicago meat packers, last week to permit auditors of the packers and stockyards administration full access to the company's books, accounts, records and memoranda. A similar demand is being made on Wilson and company and the Cudahy Packing company. The packing companies are given until November 23 to decide whether they will grant the permission, which is required under the packers and stockyards act.

The companies for more than a year, it is declared, have been withholding permission for examination of their records. Secretary Wallace, it is added, has been endeavoring to reach an amicable understanding with their officials but has been unable to do so.
