OREGON MEN ARE GIVEN POSITIONS IN RECLAMATION

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 21.—With instruction from the executive committee of the western states reclamation association to give the fact-finding committee of the bureau of reclamation all available facts concerning the results of reclamation work in the west, E. F. Blaine of Seattle, chairman of the committee on education, is scheduled to leave for Washington today. Mr. Blaine was given authority to proceed as he saw fit in Washington.

The work of the fact-finding commission was heartily endorsed by the association during its two-day conference here.

The adoption of a series of resolutions pertaining to the problems of reclamation projects, the election of officers and changing the by-laws to permit the executive committee to choose the place for the next meeting were the main achievements of the meeting.

R. E. Sheppard, manager of the South Side project at Twin Falls, Idaho, was chosen president to succeed W. B. Davis, who resigned to take up his duties as head of the bureau of reclamation in Washington. Whitney Boise, of Portland, Ore., was chosen vice president. The treasurer and secretary were chosen by the executive committee who selected the present officers, W. W. Armstrong of Salt Lake City and E. W. Brown of Boise, Idaho, to succeed themselves as treasurer and secretary respectively.

The executive committee is as follows: Utah, R. E. Caldwell; Salt Lake City, Idaho, W. G. Swenson; Boise, Oregon, W. E. Mencham; Baker, Texas, O. H. Pease; Washington, D. H. Scott; Olympia, California, Albert Lindley; Stockton, Nebraska, R. A. Smith, Omaha.

\$100,000 FURNITURE FIRE IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21.—A furniture factory and sixteen dwellings occupied by Mexicans were destroyed early today in a fire at Sixteenth and McGarry streets in the industrial district here. The loss was estimated at upwards of \$100,000. The flames apparently originated in the independent furniture factory. Police investigated a report that the watchman of the factory was missing.
