

FORD SUPPORTERS NOW CLAIM HANK WILL CARRY STATE

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 22.—The results of the South Dakota proposal meetings in which William G. McAdoo is leading Henry Ford as a democratic presidential possibility were discussed here today by Mr. McAdoo as "certainly very gratifying."

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Nov. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—W. G. McAdoo leaders said today they were undisturbed by claims of Henry Ford leaders that they had carried the state and reiterated that McAdoo had been an easy victor in the county proposal meetings November 20.

Instead of having at least two to one majority, as indicated by early returns, McAdoo has at least four to one now, according to U. S. G. Cherry of Sioux Falls, one of the leaders of the McAdoo movement in South Dakota.

Mr. Cherry predicted that an even larger majority of the Pierce county proposal convention would be found voting for McAdoo. He stated that incomplete returns show at least 30,000 votes for McAdoo, as against a possible 5000 or 6000 for Ford, and that when complete returns have been received the McAdoo vote will swell to 35,000 or 40,000 out of a total possible convention vote of 50,000. The actual convention vote will probably not exceed 45,000 owing to failure of some outlying counties to hold meetings.

CLAIM 200 KOREANS BURNED IN OIL

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Protest was filed with Secretary Hughes today by the friends of Korea in America against what the society asserted was the massacre of some 500 Koreans and the imprisonment of 5000 others during the recent earthquake and fire in Japan.

Dr. Floyd W. Tompkins, secretary, who signed the protest, declared an eye witness whom he named as Captain Headstrom, assistant dock superintendent at Yokohama and an American citizen, saw 250 Koreans, "bound hand and foot in groups of five, piled in an old junk, covered with oil and burned alive."

**Starts With \$1.03
Ends With \$2100;
Also Ends in Jail**

TACOMA, Nov. 22.—Starting with a capital of \$1.03, Pablo Sarmento, a 23-year-old Filipino student now in the Pierce county Jail, defrauded the United States government and numerous banks of \$2100 during the three months he had been in the country, he confessed today.

He purchased money orders for \$1, he said and raised them to \$100. He was arrested in San Francisco last week.

"I'm going to plead guilty," he said, "and I want to get it over with as soon as possible."

WHEAT FARMERS FOR TARIFF RAISE

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—Declaring that as long as high prices of necessities prevail as a result of duties for protection of American manufactured goods, it is right to raise or equalize the tariff on farm products, delegates to the annual convention of the farmers' union asked in a resolution adopted late today that the tariff on wheat be increased fifty cents a bushel.

Repeal of the "draw back" cause in the wheat schedule, which permits our mills to import, manufacture and reexport great quantities of Canadian wheat in direct competition with American products was demanded in the same resolution.

DUBLIN, Nov. 22.—The Irish free state government announced that six more republican prisoners have ended their hunger strike after fasting for 32 days. One hundred and thirty-seven are still going without food, the statement adds.

TABLE RESOLUTION SUPPORTING HIRAM

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 22.—Resolutions protesting against a reduction in the number of delegates from the south to the republican convention and authorizing the chairman of the convention to appoint a committee to go before the national committee at its meeting in Washington to seek to adjust the situation among the republicans in Georgia were adopted at a meeting yesterday of white men and negroes who described themselves as the regular committee of Georgia.

A resolution which sought to endorse Senator Hiram Johnson, candidate for the republican nomination for president, was tabled.
