U. S. COAST GUARD REPORT SHOWS BIG BOOZE BUSINESS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—Chasing rum runners is not the only excitement in the life of a member of the United States coast guard, the activities of which, made public today in the annual report of the service, embrace a line of endeavor in numerous directions in saving life and property at sea.

Some of the achievements of the coast guard during the last fiscal year were listed in this way:

Lives saved, or persons rescued from peril, 2792.

Persons on board vessels assisted, 1253.

Persons in distress cared for 648.

Vessels boarded and papers examined, 31,553.

Fines and penalties incurred by vessels reported \$267,701.

Derelicts and other obstructions to navigation removed 46.

Value of derelicts recovered and delivered to owners \$110,000.

The number of vessels seized or reported for law violations during the year was 2104 against 596 for the preceding year. No explanation was made in the report as to how many of these craft were rum runners.

Valuable work has done by the ice patrol squadron, the report said, in warning vessels of the dangers of icebergs in ocean travel lanes.

Forty-three coast guard men lost their lives in performing their duty during the year, and there were 23 medals of honor awarded for life saving.

The report recommended the retirement of the famous cutter Bear, the central figure in numerous thrilling rescues in the Arctic. The Bear is nearly fifty years old and it is desired to replace her with a more modern ship.

As indicating the increased activities caused by the liquor smuggling problem the report also indicated that three times as many vessels were boarded and examined than for the year before, the figures being 31,653 against 10,067.

SENATOR WATSON, INDIANA, MAY RUN

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 23.—First guns in the battle for control of the Indiana delegation of the republican national convention were fired last night when it was announced that James E. Watson may become a candidate for president, and would make a bid for the support of the delegation in opposition to Senator Hiram Johnson.

Senator Watson made it clear that he would take no action before consulting party leaders in Washington. He said it was unlikely that President Coolidge if he becomes a candidate would care to make a fight in the state primaries.

BIG PACKING PLANT FOR PENDLETON, ORE.

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 23.—The Pendleton Packing and Provision company has been taken over by the Rainier corporation of Seattle, a three million dollar concern, recently formed with E. L. C. Barton of Seattle, president and Fred Phillips of Baker, Ore., vice president. The plant here will be greatly enlarged and will be a buying, selling and feeding center for the main plant which will occupy the large plant of the Rainier Brewing company in Seattle.

Meat will be smoked and dressed here for shipment to Seattle and other points. Fred W. Falconer of Pendleton and J. A. Russell of La Grande re on the board of trustees.

Discovery Ancient City of David in H. Land Confirmed

LONDON, Nov. 23.—Discovery of traces of the ancient City of David, reported from Jerusalem some time ago is confirmed in a dispatch from Professor Robert A. McAllister, leader of the joint expedition sent to the holy land by the Palestine exploration fund and the Daily Telegraph.

Professor MacAllister says he has every reason to believe that by a fortunate coincidence, the expedition has discovered the remains of the mysterious "Millo," mentioned in the biblical description of David's fortifications in the Jebusite citadel he captured. The statement that the king built "round about from Millo," has always puzzled commentators.

It has been conjectured that "Millo" was a tower or dam, but it has been agreed that only an excavation could reveal its true identity.

GERMANS EAGERLY RESUME BUYING FRENCH LUXRIES

BERLIN, Nov.—French wines, French perfumes and French food supplies of various sorts came back into the German market with a rush immediately after the announcement of Chancellor Stresemann that the passive resistance in the Ruhr was at an end. Bills of fare in prominent cafes and restaurants again are being written in French, and all the signs declaring French and Belgians would not be served have been removed.

Most of the larger German hotels and cafes had extensive cellars filled with French wines. Much of this has been sold as Italian or Spanish wine during the passive resistance period, but the Spanish and Italian labels have now been replaced by French labels, and customers who have been clamoring for French wine are happy.
