ADVISES ATTORNEY TO RESIGN (Continued From Page One)

lection upon him as district attorney. In view of the fact that he accepted the office of district attorney when there was a special prosecutor and accepted it from the governor who also appointed the special prosecutor, Mr. Borden has a remedy and that is to tender his resignation to the governor, which is what he ought to do and not attack the appointment of the same official who tendered him his office and from whom he accepted the office of district attorney.

"In other words, courtesy, equity and justice demand that Mr. Borden do not attempt to exercise the functions of the governor of the state of Oregon or to one of the appointees of the governor of the state of Oregon what either of them ought to do. To state it differently it does not come within the jurisdiction of Mr. Borden's office to dictate to the governor of the state of Oregon that he should revoke my commission as special prosecutor or to dictate to me that I should resign. If Mr. Borden is not satisfied with the situation he has his remedy and that is to tender his resignation to the governor."

"If Mr. Borden really has the interests of the county and state at heart, relative to expense he knows or ought to know that the most expensive method of enforcing the law that can be followed is to have an inexperienced prosecutor and he further knows or ought to know that if the prohibition law is enforced as it should be, more than half of the work of the prosecutor lies in the enforcement of this law, and he knows or ought to know that the expense of employing a special prosecutor would be just as great if he acted as a deputy district attorney as if he acted as a special prosecutor. The difference would be that as a deputy district attorney, one would be under the dictation of Mr. Borden and as a special prosecutor, Mr. Borden has absolutely nothing whatever to say as to the procedure of the special prosecutor, or what he shall do or how he

shall proceed to secure the enforcement of the law."

"Finally, the governor appointed a special prosecutor. I presume at the instance of those persons living in Jackson county, Oregon, who desired the prohibition law enforced, certainly not at the instance of the special prosecutor. Governor Pierce in an address at Ashland, stated such to be the fact. This being the case, it would not be proper for me to tender my resignation as a special prosecutor unless it was requested by the governor at the instance of those persons residing in Jackson county who desire the prohibition law enforced."

"In regard to the constitutionality of the act providing for the office of a special prosecutor, Mr. Moore, former district attorney, brought a suit in the supreme court to test the constitutionality of the act providing for the office of special prosecutor, and of his own motion, dismissed the suit. It must be that both Mr. Moore and his attorneys became convinced that the law was constitutional or they would not have dismissed the suit. Furthermore, Mr. Borden has done nothing since assuming the office of district attorney to secure a judicial opinion upon the constitutionality of the act in question. He could have requested to have his name substituted as plaintiff in the suit brought by Mr. Moore in the supreme court or he could make a test case in the circuit court neither of which he has done. Therefore, I am not in any way concerned with the opinion of Mr. Borden as to whether the act is constitutional or whether it is not. That question can only be determined by the judgment of either the circuit court or the supreme court of the state of Oregon."

The Noted Dead

HONOLULU, T. H., Nov. 23.—(By the Associated Press.)—Rear Admiral M. C. Wise, U. S. N., retired, died today at Fort Kamehameha. Rear Admiral Wise came to Honolulu last July. He was 81 years old. His naval career began in the Civil war.

He became a rear admiral June 14, 1902 and retired November 8, 1904.
