

ASHLAND LITHIA MINSTREL SHOW TO BE A WINNER

ASHLAND, Nov. 24.—The Lithians will give a minstrel show December third which will be termed the Lithian Cabaret Minstrel show. This show promises to be one of the best entertainments given this season and costumes are on the way for the event. Mr. Loveland is the director of this show and reports that these costumes have been ordered from New York. Rehearsals are being held daily and all in the entertainment have been working very hard to make this a success. The show will be given one night only, contrary to a previous announcement that it would be given two successive nights. The Lithian octette composed of Carl Loveland, first tenor; Andy McGee, first tenor; Wm. Briggs, second tenor; R. L. Burdick, second tenor; S. A. Peters, Jr., and V. D. Miller, first bass and Dr. Phetplace and Harry Tomlinson, second bass, will entertain the audience with a great many pep songs and other comedy skits being prepared by them. The tickets are selling very rapidly now and indications show that this entertainment will be a great success.
