

'WANDERING BOY' ELUDES SANDIFER AND FOOLS POLICE

Somewhere in Medford or elsewhere in the valley a 14-year-old boy with an unusual penchant for getting into trouble and fooling the authorities, is wandering around in his underclothes keeping out of the way of the police officers, unless perchance he has been able to borrow a suit of clothes and get away.

The youth first appeared here the first of the week from the Rogue River vicinity, and seemed so nice and forlorn that he elicited the sympathy of the police force with his tale of leaving home because of a step father etc. He lived as best he could on a limited or mythical financial capital. In fact the big heart of Joe Cave, night policeman, was so touched that he let the boy sleep in his auto one night. The boy kindly refrained, probably thru a lapse of memory, from taking the car or garage away.

However, the boy himself decided to go into the touching business, by next appearing at a local second hand store where he pawned his cheap watch for a dollar or two, "worked" the dealer for a new pair of shoes which he said he would pay for when some mythical wad of money coming to him arrived and then stole the watch he had just pawned and disappeared.

Of course, the police were informed, soon captured him and took him before County Judge George A. Gardner in juvenile court. The judge's heart expanded so with compassion last Thursday that he gave the young culprit a lecture and paroled him into the custody of County Probation Enforcement Officer S. B. Sandifer, who thereupon installed his glib charge as a member of his own household.

That night when the household retired, Mr. Sandifer, in line with his second nature of prohibiting, was seized with a brilliant idea to prohibit the boy from disappearing from the house during the night, so he thoughtfully took the boy's outer clothes with him and concealed them leaving the apparently grateful urchin innocently snoozing away. Next morning the boy was gone and nothing has been seen or heard of him since.

So far as can be learned Judge Gardner and Sandifer have their watches and other valuables, and neither is anything missing from juvenile court or the Sandifer home except the fourteen year old kid, and the court house is still at the old stand.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION IN SCHOOLS IS VITAL PART OF CURRICULUM

Thirty-two states have adopted a physical education program and others are preparing to do so. This is not a new wrinkle or fad, since physical education is the survivor of many centuries.

The ancient Greeks divided their subjects of study into music and gymnastics. Each youth was trained in the gymnasium. The heroes of Greek literature were those who received the olive crown as the winner of some event in the Olympic games. The passage of time was even marked by these games, every fourth year being an Olympiad.

Physical education is necessarily an integral part of general education. The whole child goes to school, both body and mind. The American public school has until recently tried to develop the mind of the individual without thought of the body. The modern physical education program calls for games for all—for games which call into play the fundamental muscle groups involved in running, jumping, throwing and climbing; all form a great part of the program. Story plays, rhythmic-action plays, and running games for the very tiny tots; folk dancing, competitive athletics, organized games and stimulating mass drills for the older children are the tools with which the teacher has to work.

Physical education also concerns itself with those muscle groups which hold the body in an erect position. The close relation between self-respect and posture is familiar to all of us. Physical education through games makes for the social and moral development of the child. The playground knows no race, class or social distinction. The best man for the position is the one chosen. Recognition and acknowledgment of the rights of others must be observed in all teamwork. Co-operation and teamwork are synonymous. Where but on the play field does the child learn the elements of true sportsmanship? The successful team is the one in which all the members are working together in close co-operation.

Furthermore, the physical education program concerns itself with the health of the child. It centers the attention on positive health habits. Physical activity focuses the attention of the child on physical conditions from the constructive standpoint rather than from the morbid side. Thus health education becomes an ever-present element in physical education.

Physical education is then that phase of education which concerns itself with the growth and development of the child. It aims to promote good health and those social and moral qualities that make for good citizenship.

Today is physical education day in the national education week.

SCHOOL CENSUS IS EXPECTED TO REACH TOTAL OVER 2000

The school census is about to be completed in the Medford school district, No. 49 of Jackson county.

It appears that there will be some increase over last year, probably considerably over 2200. Last year's figure was 2167. The school enumeration includes all children in the district who are from 4 to 20 years of age.

The total enrollment for this year including both high school and grades, to the date of the last report, November 3rd, was 1648. Indications are that the enrollment this year will exceed 1800 before the close of school in the spring.

The average number of pupils belonging each day this term was 1576. The average daily attendance was 1541. The per cent of attendance of those belonging was 97.7. This is a high average of 95 per cent.
