My Favorite Recipes



For Thanksgiving Mary Blake

1/2 tsp. ginger
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 tsp. cornstarch
3/4 cups cooked and strained pumpkin

2 eggs
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup water
1 tsp. cinnamon

1/2 cup flour
1/4 cup shortening
1/2 tsp. salt

Cold water to moisten. Sift salt with flour. Cut shortening into flour with a knife or work in quickly with tips of fingers. Use enough cold water to make the particles of the mixture adhere together. Turn on a lightly floured board and roll thin, handling as little as possible. This recipe makes one pie crust.
