OLD PIONEER OF SOUTHERN OREGON PASSES TO REWARD

D. J. S. Pearce, one of Jackson county's oldest and best known pioneers passed away at his home in Medford yesterday at the age of 88 years.

D. J. S. Pearce was born in Mansfield, Ohio, February 19, 1835.

He crossed the plains in 1856, coming to the gold fields of California and from there to Jacksonville, Ore., in 1857, where he engaged in mining on Jackson creek.

In 1862 he went in company with a party of men to the mines in Boise Basin, Idaho. He discovered gold on McClellan creek, Montana, in 1864.

A party of miners of which he was a member, whipsawed out lumber and built boats that were bullet proof and embarked on the perilous journey down the Yellowstone river from Boise.

man's Crossing to St. Joe, Mo. The danger encountered from hostile Indians together with rough current of the stream, made their voyage very perilous. However the journey was safely made.

He was married to Sarah Alice Watts at Memphis, Mo., in February, 1866, later moving to Kansas, where he engaged in farming. In 1880 he came to southern Oregon, with his family.

He passed to his rest November 26th at 8:40 a. m. at Medford, Ore., where he has resided the past four years. Death was due to paralysis. In September, 1915, he became a member of the Seventh Day Adventist church of Medford, Ore., embracing the third angel's message of Rev. 14:6-9.

He passed away with the full hope and assurance of hearing that voice which shall call forth the sleeping saints to that life of joy and peace which shall measure with eternity. INSULIN TREATMENT SUBJECT OF ADDRESS LOCAL ROTARY CLUB

A very interesting talk on "Insulin," the new treatment for diabetes, was given before the Rotary club today by Dr. R. W. Clancy, vice president of the organization.

Dr. Clancy explained that while the Insulin treatment is not a cure, experiments are now being carried on in London, England, which it is believed will soon result in a cure.

The treatment however, in its present state is the epoch making medical discovery of the present generation. Dr. Banting, the discoverer, a young Canadian war veteran and medical student, graduated at Toronto University, where Dr. Clancy also graduated and lived in the Canadian town where Dr. Clancy lived before coming to Medford. The speaker gave a very interesting review of the experiments which led to the discovery.

Insulin today promises to save hundreds of thousands of lives for though it does not effect a permanent cure, it does effectually check the disease and if the sufferer takes the treatment in ample time, there is no reason why he or she should not live to a ripe old age.

Insulin treatments are now being given in Portland and Dr. Clancy declared it would soon be possible no doubt to give them in Medford.

COAST LIMITED WRECKED, CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—Two persons were seriously injured and scores of passengers were shaken when the Columbian, crack train from Seattle on the C. M. and St. P. railway, ran into an open switch and crashed into the rear of an empty train in the central part of Chicago today.

BANDIT SUSPECTS IN FLORIDA TO BE CHECKED UP

BUSHNELL, Fla., Nov. 27.—Three men believed by the sheriff to be the D'Aurmont brothers, Roy, Ray and Hugh, wanted in connection with the holdup and robbery of Southern Pacific passenger train No. 13, in the Siskiyou on the California-Oregon line on October 11 last are being held in the county jail here, it became known here today.

Although the sheriff would not go into details of their capture, he admitted that the three suspects were taken into custody near here late last week and the western authorities had been requested to furnish photographs and more detailed descriptions of the persons wanted.

A reward of \$14,000 was offered jointly by the railroad, the American Railway Express company and the federal government for the arrest and conviction of each person implicated in the crime. At least three persons participated, according to the authorities who broadcasted photographs of the suspects and advised the men to be held incommunicado.

According to the sheriff's office, there are several discrepancies in the telegraphic descriptions received on the Florida suspects, the chief one being in the matter of height. The smallest of the men held at Bushnell is five feet, nine inches tall, one being six feet high, and the other six feet one inch. The D'Aurmont twins—Ray and Roy—are listed on the published descriptions as five feet six inches, and Hugh as five feet seven inches tall.

The Southern Pacific and postal department, however have sent agents conversant with the situation, to interview the men, and wired fertilization measurement of Ray, who served a term in the Monroe, Wash., reformatory.

MORE RED BOMB THROWING FEARED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Philadelphia police investigating the recent bombing of the Italian and Spanish consulates in that city were said in a report to the state department to be working on the theory that the attack was a threat of more serious activities to come.

A meeting in Philadelphia of supposed anarchists held about a week ago, is being investigated. The police however were said to believe that the perpetrators of the Philadelphia bombing came from some other city.
