

ONE JAP SAILOR IS DROWNED, OVER SCORE IN DANGER

COROVIA, Alaska, Nov. 27.—(By the Associated Press)—One member of the crew of the Shinkoku Maru, Japanese freighter which yesterday was impaled on the rocks at the north end of Montague Island, Prince William Sound, was drowned and the rest today were clinging to the vessel and the inhospitable margin of the island waiting for a waving tempest to permit the tug Humacoma to rescue them.

A gale which yesterday lashed the northern Pacific ocean with a speed of ninety miles, forcing the Shinkoku Maru to cut herself loose from the Humacoma, was moderating today, but it was considered uncertain whether the tug would be able to reach the imperiled men, numbering about 35, before night.

The Shinkoku, according to items on her condition, sent today when her wireless apparatus resumed after having gone out when she struck, will be a total loss. She is to be abandoned as soon as her human burden can be taken off. The Humacoma hoped to rescue the men with small boats.

The freighter was lying broadside on the rocks and had a list of eight degrees. In all her compartments was ten feet of water.

The Humacoma, it was learned today, had a narrow escape when the Shinkoku dropped the tow about a mile from the island, the two craft having run in from the open sea for safety while the Humacoma was attempting to tow the Shinkoku here en route to Esquimaux, B. C., for repairs.

The Humacoma, when the strain was taken off her, went over on her side. Her engine room was filled half full of water but it was kept from the fires.

It was expected that the Humacoma if she succeeds in getting off the Shinkoku's people will bring them here.

The drowned man was a fireman. Ten men succeeded in going yesterday from the Shinkoku to the island whence it was thought they would be unable to escape except by the Humacoma's boats.

G. O. P. DEFICIT IS WIPED OUT

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 27.—The 1920 deficit of the republican national committee amounting to approximately \$1,500,000, has been wiped out. It was announced today by C. H. Huston of Tennessee at a republican regional conference. All funds raised in the future for the party may be devoted exclusively to finance the 1924 campaign, Mr. Huston said.

Mr. Huston in his talk before the gathering, explained the methods to be employed in financing the forthcoming campaign and declared that each state would be given a quota to raise thus lifting some of the expense from a little group of men who had borne most of the burdens.

SHERIFF GUILTY DRY VIOLATION

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, Nov. 27.—Sheriff William Kirkpatrick of Bonner county was found guilty on two counts of an indictment charging conspiracy to violate the prohibition law by a jury in United States district court which returned a verdict early today. Henry Thompson, Sand Point, Idaho, charged jointly with the sheriff, was convicted on one count.

Matthew Lyons, charged with having been an accomplice of the other two, was discharged at the close of the government's case, but he was re-arrested on a charge of possessing liquor. The sheriff and his co-defendants were charged with having conspired to bring liquor into the country.

SEATTLE PHYSICIAN FREED OF CHARGE

SEATTLE, Nov. 27.—Prosecutor Malcolm Douglas announced that he would move in superior court today for dismissal of a charge that Dr. William A. Shannon, pioneer Seattle physician, violated the Heiler act, a state law against narcotics, when he let Walter Clausen, declared to have been an addict, have one and one-half grains of morphine sulphate.

Mr. Douglas said that his motion would set forth that all the evidence against Dr. Shannon had been presented to a jury that Sunday, after deliberating nineteen hours, voted ten to two for acquittal.

CHORUS GIRLS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR ARREST GUN MEN

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Morris Diamond and his younger brother, Joseph, early today were definitely charged with homicide in connection with the holdup and murder on November 14 of two employees of the West End bank in Brooklyn. After a grilling by police detectives which lasted far into the night the brothers were taken to Brooklyn police headquarters and booked on the homicide charges.

Morris was arrested in Cleveland Sunday night and Joseph surrendered here yesterday. After Morris Diamond was alleged to have been identified by a witness to the shooting and holdup as one of the bandits, attention shifted last night when an eye witness picked Joseph out of a lineup at police headquarters as the man who shot and killed William Barlow, one of the messengers.

One of the Diamonds was expected to be confronted today by a Philadelphia chorus girl to whom they are alleged to have boasted that they were "wanted for a stickup." It was thought that Morris was traced in Philadelphia.

District Attorney Dodd said last night he expected to start presentation of the case to the Brooklyn grand jury today. The police expressed their confidence in a speedy solution of the crime in which, in addition to the double murder, \$43,000 was stolen.

Knights of Pythias, or any other of the patriotic societies don't play ball, we will picket their halls and spot the klansmen who visit them and see to it that such klansmen are personally punished.

Major Luther I. Powell was one of the first, if not the first, klansman to come into Oregon. He in a letter sent out from his office in the Pittock block, announces that on December 1 he will commence the publication of the Klansman's Progress, "the unofficial klansman's monthly."

In his announcement he says: "We have no resentment toward our fellow citizens of whatever race, color or creed, and while we hold no brief for any opposing faction, we shall rigidly avoid expressions of hatred and vile accusations."

He also asks: Gifford Faces Cleaning

"If you are in sympathy with this policy . . . If you are one of those who desire to see these factions eliminated and perfect harmony reigning in the place of discord," for the klansmen to support his publication.

He closes by the significant statement that "According to the Western American, F. L. Gifford has put a ban on this publication. I know of no reason why he should do so unless he is afraid of the truth."

From all of which it is seemingly apparent that Gifford, grand dragon of Oregon klans, is going to "clean up" on somebody, or be "cleaned" himself.
