CITY TREASURER'S NOTICE of semi-annual assessments due

ORDER OF CASES IN CIRCUIT COURT ARE GIVEN OUT

The calendar for the circuit court for the present term, contains a dozen cases—five civil actions and seven criminal cases, and will be taken up as fast as the preceding case is finished.

Criminal matters are now being aired, the case of C. L. Carter, charged with a statutory crime being on trial today.

Next on the list is that of Jack Winkie, accused of forgery, followed by that of Mrs. Florence Milligan, former proprietor of a local rooming house charged with possession of intoxicating liquor. Upon the completion of this case L. A. Nestor will be tried on a charge of pointing a gun at another.

This will be followed by the trial of George Tucker, former Jackson county "special agent," with possession of liquor. A second indictment against Tucker charges sale of liquor, and the alleged involving of high school boys in the transaction. Tucker was injured in the auto races at Salem last fall and is still suffering therefrom. He is represented by Attorney Porter J. Neff.

The next criminal action is that of C. E. Lloyd, charged with forgery. The following civil actions will then be taken up in the order of their completion:

Citizens Bank of Ashland vs. Hewett.

American Soda Fountain Co. vs. Medford Grocery Co.

J. P. Pratt vs. Mrs. C. A. Calhoun.

W. R. Patterson vs. John Cogan.

W. J. Smith vs. Samuel Bertleson.

The last case is that of the state vs. J. Moore, charged with assault upon A. A. Moore (Blackie) Moore, following an altercation in a local packing house last month, in which J. Moore is alleged to have poked a knife with near-fatal effects upon A. A. Moore.

R. R. BROTHERHOOD WILL CELEBRATE

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—Fifty years of development will reach a climax for the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers on Sunday with celebrations in the principal cities of the country. It is announced here.

Started half a century ago by eleven employees of the Erie railroad, the brotherhood has grown until now, according to President D. B. Robertson, every fireman and engineer in the service of railroads in the United States and Canada is a member. The roll totals 118,000.

The proud boast of the organization is that during its fifty years of existence, it has never violated a contract with its employees.

Among well known men to address the meetings on the anniversary occasion will be William G. McAdoo, William E. Sweet, governor of Colorado and Louis P. Hart, governor of Washington.

One Church Gives Property to Another Church in Chicago!

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—Believed unprecedented in American church history, announcement has been made of a gift of property by a theological seminary of one denomination to another denomination for the site of its theological seminary.

The Garrett Biblical Institute, the Methodist Episcopal Theological seminary of Evanston and Northwestern university have decided property valued at \$150,000 to the Episcopal church with the only condition that the ground be used for the training of clergy of the Episcopal church, the Right Rev. Charles P. Anderson, bishop of Chicago of the Episcopal church has announced.

MEXICAN YOUTH ACQUITTED ON FORGERY CHARGE

Francisco Vega, a Mexican youth far from his native Sonora, charged with forging the name of Marcos Campos, a countryman, to a Southern Pacific pay check for \$35.49, was acquitted by a jury in the circuit court Monday afternoon. Two ballots were taken. Vega was defended by Attorney H. A. Canaday, and the state was represented by District Attorney Newton Borden and Attorney Gaylord.

Vega, characterized by the state "as a higher than ordinary type of Mexican," was accused of securing Campos' pay check, and cashing it on Dobbin lawn of Ashland, one Saturday night last May. Afterwards accompanied by Chief of Police McNab of Ashland, Irwin journeyed to Steinman where Vega was working and induced him to pay \$15 and sign a paper to remit the rest on pay day. Vega was also identified as the man who got the pay check at the depot.

In his defense, Vega denied that he had cashed the check, and his efforts at settlement had been made through fear, and unfamiliarity with American customs, and proved his whereabouts on the afternoon and evening of the crime.

Sid I. Brown, a juror, at the close of the testimony, stood up and requested that the defendant write his name, so the jury could compare it with the signature on the check. Vega did this, under instructions from the court.

It developed during the testimony of the defendant that he had been in the county jail for six months, during which time he had learned to read English, and write it.

There were three women on the jury, Mrs. Kate Young and Mrs. O. C. Boggs of this city, and Miss Iglie McCully of Jacksonville.

PORTLAND CHAMBER FOR PRUNE CAMPAIGN

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27.—With approximately 33,000,000 pounds of prunes still unsold in Oregon and Clarke county, Washington, the trade and commerce committee of the chamber of commerce has issued a statement that it would sponsor a prune selling campaign during the next month.

MULTNOMAH CLAMPS DOWN ON CARING FOR JACKSON VIOLATORS

County commissioners of Multnomah county have placed restrictions upon the receipt of prisoners from other counties, the main one being contained in the paragraph reading: "Any prisoner of any other county transferred to this county must be delivered here by the sheriff, or duly appointed sheriff of such other county or else will not be received by this county."

"No prisoner of any other county shall be received by this county who in the opinion of the sheriff of this county is not suitable. In respect to age, his or her health, condition or any other matter to be received or detained in this county. The sheriff of this county is hereby vested with authority to decide as to whether any such prisoner is suitable to be received or detained in this county."

The two above clauses govern conditions prevailing in Jackson county, and have been the source of controversy and divided authority between the sheriff's office and the prohibition enforcement force. The last prisoners from this county were taken to Portland by Prohibition Enforcement Officer Sam Sandifer and J. H. Leiggett.

The resolution further provides that the committing county shall pay the federal fee for keep of all prisoners and be responsible for all other expenses.
