What Education Week Committee Did in Medford

The following features were carried out in accordance with plans of the committee on the observance of American Education Week in Medford, November 18-24. The committee was composed of Col. W. H. Paine for the American Legion and Supt. Aubrey G. Smith for the schools. The week was sponsored by the American Legion, the U. S. bureau of education and the National Education association.

A proclamation was issued by the mayor of the city calling attention to the week and the importance of the subject with invitation to citizens to assist in an appropriate observance. An editorial was prepared and published by the editor of The Medford Mail Tribune during the week.

Special issue of the Medford Mail Tribune for the week of November 18-24 was given wide distribution in Medford and Jackson county.

Letters were sent to clubs and fraternal organizations of Medford, requesting observance of the subject of education at meetings during the week.

Slides prepared and shown by the moving picture theatres of Medford containing appropriate information and slogans.

The Medford Retail Merchants' association requested merchants to mention the week in their newspaper advertising.

For Sunday, November 18th. For God and Country. Letters were addressed to clergymen of Medford, Jacksonville, Phoenix and Central Point requesting them to preach sermons on education.

For Monday, November 19th. American Constitution Day. Address to Medford high school on the constitution of the United States by Mr. Porter J. Neff, a member of the local bar. Notes from this address and additional matter on the same subject were published in The Medford Mail Tribune of that date.

The Craters' club of Medford scheduled a brief talk on the subject of Education Week at a dinner held on that evening. At this dinner the Craters also entertained the members of the high school football team and some members of the school faculty.

A short address on the subject was delivered before the Kiwanis club of Medford on that date by Professor Harold S. Tuttle of Pacific university Forest Grove.
