

SCHOOL RALLY AND BONFIRE TONIGHT FOR BIG GAME

The Medford high school and the town are in a great state of excitement about the annual Medford-Ashland football game to be played in Ashland Thanksgiving day. The game will be at the Ashland high school athletic field, behind the high school building, and will begin at two o'clock promptly so as to allow all those who have come from Medford to return in time for their Thanksgiving dinner. A large attendance is expected. The Craters have arranged to take the student body and faculty to Ashland in cars. The students will meet before the Medford high school at 1:15 o'clock tomorrow.

The lineup of the Medford team will be as follows: Perry and Singler, ends; Dressler and Maddox, tacklers; Pruitt and Perl, guards; Glusack, center; Senn, fullback; Dally and Van Schoyve, halfbacks; Williams, quarterback. The officials will be Cramer of Grants Pass, umpire and Dawson of Eugene, referee. The head line man has not been chosen yet.

A football rally to arouse the team and school to the final pitch of enthusiasm will take place tonight at 7:30. The students are to assemble before the high school at 7:30 and then, headed by the band, to serpentine up the Main street to the Hotel Medford and from there to the ground in front of the Southern Pacific station. Here the big bonfire that the students have worked all day to accumulate will be lighted and fireworks will be set off. After the school yells and songs have been given the following men will speak: C. E. Gates, the former mayor; Bob Boyle, Elmer Coleman, a former captain of the Medford team; Prince Callison, the coach; Aubrey G. Smith, the superintendent and Paul McDonald.

This is the second game of this year with Ashland and the last game of the season. The score of the last game was 17 to 0 in Medford's favor.

HARDING PENSION VETO TO BE PUT UP TO COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Pension legislation was discussed with President Coolidge yesterday by Representative Fulmer, republican, Illinois, who today said he would reintroduce a general pension bill similar to that passed by the last congress but vetoed by President Harding.

The bill will be drawn so as to eliminate some of the objectionable features, Mr. Fulmer said and will carry a general increase for Civil war veterans from the present \$50 per month to \$72 and for widows of Civil war veterans from the present \$30 to \$50. Proportional increases would be granted veterans and widows of veterans of the Mexican and Spanish-American wars.

RARE OLD TOMB IS UNEARTHED IN VALLEY OF KEDRON

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 28.—An undisturbed tomb, dating from the time of Christ, has been discovered in the valley of Kedron, near Jerusalem, according to word received from Dr. W. F. Albright, director of the American School of Oriental research in Jerusalem. Dr. James Allen Montgomery, president of the school, announced today.

"The tomb contained more than a score of ossuaries," Dr. Albright wrote. "A dozen of these bore names and genealogies of the occupants. All the dead apparently belonged to one family, which flourished about the time of Christ. The slowly increasing number of such inscription groups is already beginning to provide me with valuable material for the reconstruction and eventually for the history of the New Testament period."

Dr. Albright also reported the finding of a sarcophagus, said to be the finest yet unearthed in Palestine.

"The most reliable date proposed is the second century after Christ," the letter said. "The beautiful sarcophagus is distinctly pre-classical and cannot be compared with the Alexander sarcophagus despite its undoubted excellence in workmanship."

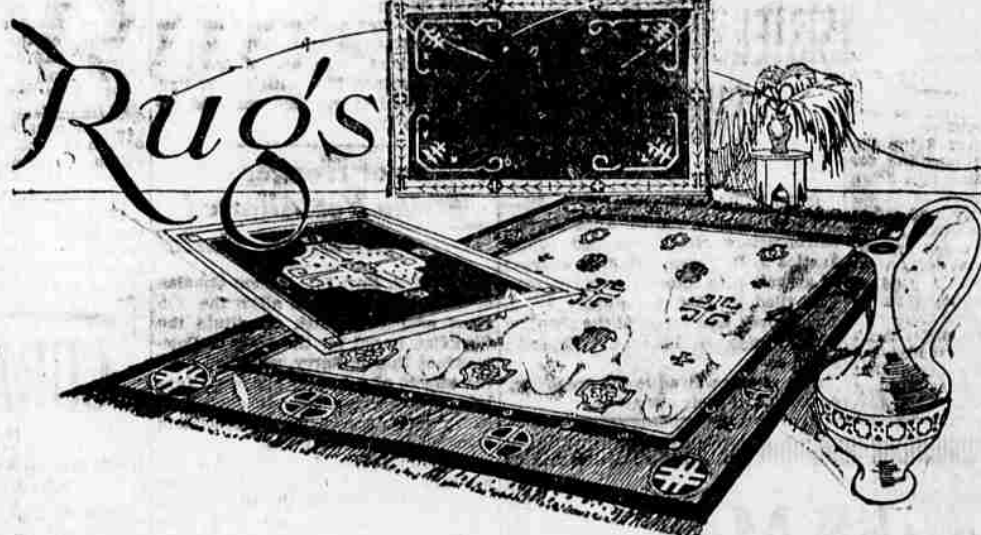
