

## YANK TEETH OF OKLAHOMA BILL FOR KLAN NAMES

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Nov. 28.—Section one of the joint committee anti-Ku Klux bill which would have made names of all officers of secret orders available to the public officials was rejected today by the Oklahoma senate 20 to 15.

What was regarded as perhaps the last stand of the senate members who have been fighting for an efficient law to regulate secret orders was made immediately after the section was voted down, when Senator Chas. E. McPherson of Durant offered an amendment to require local officers of secret orders to keep lists of members which could be produced upon order of any competent court.

## CONVICTS ESCAPE ON WAY TO PRISON, CAUGHT IN WOODS

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., Nov. 28.—William Ernst Weeks, serving a ten year term for counterfeiting, escaped from a special car bringing twenty-seven prisoners from McNeil Island, Wash., to the federal prison. The escape was made as the train passed through Napier, Mo. Ester Feltz, who also attempted to escape was captured by guards on the train.

Liberty was gained for Weeks after he had filed loose from handcuffs and leg irons. It is believed the file had been smuggled to the prisoners. After filing the handcuffs, the prisoners pried loose the bars on the window and jumped through the closed window to the ground.

Their escape was discovered immediately and the train stopped. Feltz had been unable to free himself from one of the leg irons and was found lying along the right of way. Weeks escaped into the woods at the side of the track. J. E. Hamilton, deputy warden, and two guards are searching the woods for Weeks.

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., Nov. 28.—William Weeks has been captured near Napier, Mo., and will be brought to the federal penitentiary tonight. Warden W. E. Biddle, was notified this afternoon.

## SISTERS HELD FOR SHOOTING BOY

CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa, Nov. 28.—Dr. Saddle Morton and Dr. Alice Morton, chiropractors, were arraigned before Justice J. B. Travis today on charges of assault with intent to commit murder, filed by County Attorney W. J. Barngrover, as a result of the shooting Sunday night of 14-year-old Elsworth Jakube.

The sisters waived to the grand jury on advice of their attorneys.

## BROTHERS NAME GUNMEN SLAYERS. BROOKLYN HOLDUP

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Barlow Morris Diamond and his brother Joseph, have made important admissions concerning their part in the \$43,000 robbery and murder of the two West End bank messengers in a Brooklyn elevated station, November 14, District Attorney Dodd announced today after seven additional arrests had been made.

Both brothers denied firing the shots which killed the messengers from whom the money was stolen, but furnished the names of three gunmen alleged to have done the actual slaying, according to Mr. Dodd. He said that the descriptions of the trio had been flashed all over the country.

Mr. Dodd announced also that Anthony Pantano of Brooklyn, one of those arrested today, had agreed to make a confession of his part in the crime.

The holdup, according to the statements, was planned at a meeting in Manhattan attended by Barlow Diamond, Pantano and two of the gunmen, Mr. Dodd said. Arrangements were said to have been entered into to give Pantano ten per cent of the proceeds of the holdup.

Pantano was said to have lost his nerve and attempted to quit the plot, but remained when one of the gunmen threatened him with death. Barlow Diamond, it was said, received \$9,000 of the loot.

## Victim of Hunger Strike Not Allowed Christian Burial

LONDON, Nov. 28.—Bishop Cahan of Cork has refused to allow the religious exercises which constitute the Christian burial for the body of Commandant Dennis Barry, who died from the effects of a hunger strike at Newbridge, and whose body reached Cork last evening, says a Press Association dispatch from Cork today.

"Republicanism in Ireland," the message quotes the bishop as adding, "has for the last 12 months been a wicked and insidious attack on the church and the souls of the faithful committed to the church's care. By church law, anyone who deliberately takes his own life is deprived of Christian burial. I shall interpret the law of the church and refuse Christian burial, I feel bound to do it."

that the armory filled a long-felt need for the city and county and expressed rejoicing that the state and government had, by co-operating with them, made such a fine structure. The expense of the armory would more than pay for itself, they held, by providing a civic center, a home for the patriotic organizations, a headquarters for the local National Guard unit, and a general gathering place for the youth of military age where they could be given military and physical training.

The program was begun with two selections played by the famous Dokke band. Interspersed among the addresses were the following musical selections: Miss Victoria Andrews, vocal solo, "Down in the Forest." William E. Isaacs and George Maddox, duet, "Lost Prescribed," from Martha; Harry Scougall, solo, "Invictus," singing of "Old Glory" by the Crater Lake Quartet, and singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" by the audience. At the conclusion of Old Glory, during which the lights were dimmed, except on the dimly lighted stage an improvised soldiers at rest in two small tents, and other soldiers walking back and forth on sentry duty. The scene concluded with the bugler blowing taps.

After this program the big dance immediately followed with most of the audience remaining as dancers and spectators, and other citizens arriving from time to time to take part in the dance.

## PROGRESSIVE PLAN TO FIGHT SENATOR CUMMINS CONTROL

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Despite continuing conferences of republican leaders on the one hand and members of the progressive bloc on the other, organization problems in both the senate and house apparently were no nearer solution today than they have been for some weeks.

Expectations of the majority leaders in the senate that Senator Cummins of Iowa, would voluntarily give up one of his two places in the senate were upset by a decision of the senator to leave to his colleagues whether he should continue as president pro tem and chairman of the inter-state commerce committee.

Senator Lodge of Massachusetts and other republican leaders indicated their belief that Mr. Cummins would continue as president pro tem and that the selection of a candidate for that office would not even come before the republican conference Saturday.

Under a custom long prevailing in the senate, he automatically would be re-appointed to the committee chairmanship.

There has been strong sentiment, however, both among organization republicans and the progressive bloc that the Iowa senator should not retain both places and it would not be surprising if a fight should be made to prevent him from doing so.

The progressive bloc has hoped that he would retire from the chairmanship of the committee on which Senator La Follette of Wisconsin is the ranking member but leaders of the regular organization have desired that he continue as chairman.

House progressives are working out details of their legislative and organization program.

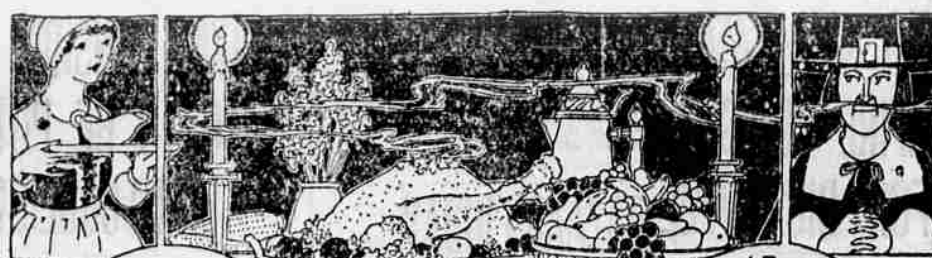
