Sports WEST VIRGINIA BEATEN BY W. & J. BROWN BY LEHIGH

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—Three upsets, one of which eliminated the previously undefeated West Virginia eleven from eastern championship consideration, featured the most brilliant Thanksgiving day football program ever offered in the east.

The upsets came in the 7 to 2 defeat of West Virginia by Washington and Jefferson; the 20 to 3 trouncing of Penn State by Pittsburg and in Lehigh's 12 to 6 victory over Brown.

Bordering on an upset was Pennsylvania's great stand against Cornell. Fourteen to seven proved the final score of this contest which left Cornell with its smallest score of the season.

One eastern game that fulfilled general predictions was that at the Polo grounds, where Dartmouth triumphed, 31 to 6 over Columbia.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—Frankie Genaro of New York, American flyweight champion, won an uninteresting match with Carl Tremaine of Cleveland, a leading bantamweight, at Madison Square Garden last night. Genaro weighed four pounds less than his opponent, who tipped the beam at 114 1/2 pounds. The decision was mildly applauded. Neither boxer was aggressive and they passed a good part of the evening in each other's arms.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass.—Al Shubert of this city was given the judge's decision over Johnny Dundee, feather weight champion of the world, in their ten round match last night. The title was not at stake.

PHILADELPHIA.—Danny Kramer Philadelphia featherweight, won over Basil Galino of New Orleans in their eight round bout last night. Alex Hart of Pennsylvania outboxed Sillor Freedman of Chicago, according to newspapermen.

FIND SECRET OF PROLONGING LIFE HORSES, MULES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Army experts believe they have discovered the secret of animal longevity. Old horses and mules in "active service" today have an average age of 14 years, while in the normal civil service 11-year-old animals are regarded as beyond the age of usefulness.

The secret, the experts believe, lies in regularity of diet, exercise, rest, grooming and all the other cares with which the army surrounds its animals in time of peace. They estimate that a five-year average increase in the useful life period of horses and mules in the service has already been proved, figuring that the 14-year-olds of today will still be fit for active service two years from now.

DESPOUDENT WOMAN FALLS TO DEATH

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30.—Miss Louis Banks, 45, who came here two weeks ago for hospital treatment for a nervous disorder, jumped or fell to her death today from her room on the fifth floor of the Salvation Army home for girls. In falling the woman went through the glass roof of the dining room at the home and was dead before a physician could reach her.
