## SCOUTS ENJOY A FINE OUTING AT ROXY ANNE

The threatening skies did not dampen the ardor of the scouts who gathered yesterday morning for the first general outing of the season. A good representation from the troops was on hand with three scout masters to direct the expedition. The uncertainty of the weather delayed the start nearly two hours, but the time was profitably utilized in placing the Christmas seal posters through the business district. As the day brightened the spirits of the scouts responded and a very interesting and profitable day was enjoyed.

A brief snow storm about noon while in the foothills added to the interest of the trip. The boys encircled Roxy Anne from the east to the west ridge well up on the slopes of the hill. A number of features altogether unexpected added zest to the occasion. An orchardist at the edge of the foothills supplied the boys with a box of fine large apples.
