PRESIDENT BRYAN TO SPEAK AT STATE TEACHER MEETING

BEND, Ore., Dec. 2.—(Special)—Dr. E. B. Bryan, president of the University of Ohio, one of the leading educators of the United States and well known as a brilliant platform orator, has been secured as lecturer for the annual session of the Oregon State Teachers' association by the president of the association, Superintendent G. W. Ager, of Bend.

The convention will be held in Portland at the Lincoln high school on December 27, 28, 29. For the general sessions efforts are being made to secure another speaker of equal rank with Dr. Bryan. The annual session will open at nine o'clock Tuesday, December 27, with a meeting of the representative council. The work of the council, which consists of acting upon all official reports of standing committees and of transacting all regular and special business of the association, will occupy all of the first day. Only accredited delegates have the right to speak and vote during the deliberations of the council, though the meetings are open to all visiting teachers.

The general session of the association convenes at nine o'clock Friday morning, December 28. The opening address will be given by Dr. Bryan. Reports already received by officers of the association, it is estimated that there will be more than two thousand teachers from all sections of Oregon in attendance at this session. Department meetings will be held Friday afternoon and Saturday morning, and the convention will close with a general assembly Saturday afternoon for which there has been provided an excellent program of special music and an address by one of the eastern speakers.

The Teachers' association is composed of twenty different departments. Programs of unusual merit have been prepared for these various divisions, the meetings of which will be held on Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. The chairmen of the sections are as follows: Agriculture, Forest Ryeart, Lebanon; Art, Miss Esther West, Portland; City Superintendents, Supt. A. Cannon, Hood River; Classroom Teachers, Miss Elsie M. Neave, Grants Pass; Commerce, R. D. Taylor, Portland; Higher Education, Dean Colin V. Dymont, University of Oregon, Eugene; History, P. E. Christensen, City High School, Eugene; Home Economics, Katherine Kooker, Girls' Polytechnic, Portland; Industrial Arts, Washington High, Portland; Librarians, Supt. Twila Ferguson, Klamath Falls; Modern Languages, P. A. Getz, Roosevelt High, Portland; Music, Miss Louise Woodruff, Marshfield; Oregon State Council of English Teachers, Miss Ida V. Turvey, University of Oregon, Eugene; Oregon State Council of Geography Teachers, Miss Jessie McGregor, Portland public schools; Physical Training, Dean J. F. Boyard, University of Oregon, Eugene; Psychology and Education, Superintendent M. S. Hamm, Roseburg; School Principals, Principal Austin Landreth, Pendleton; Vocational Education, A. R. Nichols, Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis; Rural Schools, J. Allen Thompson, Bend; Science and Mathematics, L. E. Griffin, Reed College.

WILL CHECK AUDITOR WHO CHECKED TITUS

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 2.—Charges of irregularities in the checking by the state inspector of the accounts of B. L. Titus, former city clerk at Ellensburg, who shot and killed himself in Seattle last Saturday will be investigated at once, C. W. Clausen, state auditor, stated this morning. The Ellensburg accounts have been inspected for several years by W. S. Shanks, for the department of municipal corporations. Mr. Clausen declared. Mr. Shanks is now east of the mountains engaged in work for the department. Mr. Clausen said and another inspector will be sent to Ellensburg to investigate charges made against the state department.

ASK LARGE SUM FOR RIVERS AND HARBORS, OREGON

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Work on the country's rivers, harbors and waterways will require \$63,328,065 during the year beginning July 1, 1924.

Recommendations for the various projects were made by the chief of engineers of the army, under whose direction this work is carried on, in his annual report submitted to congress today for the 1925 estimates. Appropriations for last year, including permanent annual appropriations, amounted to \$70,957,151, bringing the total appropriations since the work began to \$1,201,566,845, not including \$32,258,410 for Wilson dam (No. 2) at Muscle Shoals, Alabama.

For general river and harbor work for the fiscal year of 1925, the chief of engineers says \$45,428,065 can be profitably expended. Expenditures for the year which ended June 30, 1923, for this work were \$47,478,407 and appropriations for the present year were \$56,589,910, of which \$45,524,410 have been allotted.

The Mississippi river receives the largest share of recommended appropriations for this year, its total, including work of the Mississippi river commission aggregating \$13,530,000; Oakland harbor, California, \$245,000; Coos Bay, Oregon, \$909,000 and Columbia river \$910,000.

Recommendations for appropriations for the various projects by districts include: First, San Francisco district: harbor at San Francisco \$150,000; Oakland harbor \$245,000; Richmond harbor \$128,000; San Pablo Bay and Mare Island strait \$130,000; Suisun Bay channel \$13,000; Petaluma creek \$37,000; San Rafael creek \$30,000; Humboldt harbor and bay \$881,000; Crescent City harbor \$100,000.

Second, San Francisco district: San Joaquin river \$26,000; Steckton and Mormon channels \$5000; Mokelumne river \$300; Sacramento river \$95,000. First, Portland, Oregon district: Coquille river \$15,000; Coos bay \$209,000; Coos river \$2000; Yaquina bay and harbor \$90,215; Tillamook bay and harbor \$5000; Umpqua river \$61,500; Columbia river above Celilo Falls to mouth Snake river \$6000; Snake river, Oregon and Washington, \$14,000.

Second Portland district: Columbia and lower Willamette rivers, below Vancouver, Wash., and Portland, Ore., \$910,000; Clatskanie river \$7000; Willamette river above Portland and Yamhill river, Oregon, \$27,000; Skamokawa creek, Washington, \$2000; Grays river, Washington, \$2000.
