MAN ACQUITTED ON FORGERY CH'GE IS REARRESTED

C. E. Lloyd, an auto mechanic, was acquitted by a jury in the circuit court Tuesday afternoon on a charge of passing a forged check for \$18.20 on O. M. Selby last July, drawn against the Crator Lake Automotive company, and made payable to Elmer Walker.

With the reading of the verdict, the district attorney's office asked for a bench warrant for Lloyd's arrest on a charge of passing a \$2.50 check on Dobbin Irwin of Ashland, without any funds in the bank. Lloyd was remanded to the custody of the sheriff, and returned to the county jail.

The case of George Tucker, former county prohibition enforcement aide with possession of liquor, will not be tried until next week, his attorney, Porter J. Neff, asking for more time to prepare the case.

The civil action of the Citizens' Bank of Ashland against George G. Hewitt, former deputy income tax collector, with headquarters in this city, was begun upon completion of the Lloyd case. The amount involved is \$500, alleged to be due upon a note.

Hewitt, it is alleged purchased an automobile from E. J. Jones, an auto salesman, for \$700, giving a \$500 note for the balance. The bargain was for a Buick car, but Hewitt was given a Maxwell car, pending the delivery of the Buick. Jones, it is alleged, sold the Citizens' Bank the \$500 note, and departed with the Buick. In the meantime, a chattel lien against the Maxwell was served, and the car taken, leaving Hewitt, autoless. On these

The Vining was packed for the show and about seventy-five people from Medford and other neighboring places also attended it. A great amount of the praise and credit for the entertainment belongs to Carl Loveland who directed the show. This has been considered by all who attended to be a wonderful success, which is also true from a financial standpoint.

A. S. Dudley, manager of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce addressed the chamber of commerce Tuesday noon at one of the largest forum luncheons that has been held in Ashland this season. Mr. Dudley gave a very interesting talk on the resources and business prospects of Oregon. Mr. Dudley stated that Oregon had the greatest amount of undeveloped resources of possibly any state in the union. He also pointed out that Oregon was not first in line in different industries, at least running a close second to the rest of the states. He called attention to the lumbering, dairying, milling of Oregon as compared with other places. Mr. Dudley stressed the point of fixing up the auto camps and the cities so that tourists will be anxious to stay for a few days and possibly to locate. The statement was made that thirty-two thousand tourists went thru Oregon this year and twice that many will pass thru here next year. He said that the only thing to do was to enlarge and improve your camp ground to such an extent that people will be more interested to stop in your town and state than in any other. As many of the Oregon camp grounds are being enlarged, it is quite necessary that Ashland enlarge hers, although it is a very creditable and beautiful park as it is. After the luncheon Mr. Dudley was taken to the shale oil fields by Mr. Porozzi, accompanied by Mr. Irving Vining and Mr. Watson.
