CAMPAIGN IN ENGLAND ENDS VOTE TOMORROW

Most Puzzling Election in Yrs.
to Be Held Thursday—
Labor Victory Not Impos-
sible—Rowdism Continues
—Woman Beaten Up.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—(By the Associated Press)—This is the last day of speech making and canvassing preparatory to the casting of the ballots in the most puzzling general election of recent years. The energy thrown into the campaign by all parties in the last few days becomes even more intense as the drive for votes reaches its close and from this morning until midnight the output of words on platforms and the house to house solicitations will reach the maximum.

About 21,000,000 voters in England, Scotland, Wales and Ulster will go to the polls to choose 664 members of the house of commons.

The political experts still admit they are baffled by the apparent closeness of the campaign. Plenty of guesses are being made but all are more or less influenced by partisan predilections and nothing like an unbiased, reliable forecast is available. Practically all the prophecies concede the conservatives more candidates than either the liberals or the laborites, but doubt is widely expressed as to whether the number will prove large enough to give Mr. Baldwin's party a majority over the combined opposition. The expectation is general that the conservatives will lose several seats they held at the last session.

Women Vote a Puzzle.
How the vote of the women will be distributed continues to be one of the most puzzling features of the campaign. Another difficulty in estimating the result is caused by the inability of anyone to gauge the probable number of voters of both sexes who will not cast their ballots. It is estimated that about 6,000,000 persons did not vote at the last general election but the organizers and canvassers have failed to get an inkling of what will happen tomorrow. Reports from various sources say the electors are being more secretive than usual which is one of the reasons why the outcome of the many three-cornered contests is particularly difficult to foresee.

Some observers, perhaps because they are baffled by the absence of definite indications, venture the opinion that there will be some big surprises when the results are made known, some quarters suggesting the possibility of a labor landslide. The way the issues cut across one another as far as the liberals and conservatives are concerned, presents for those parties a difficulty from which the laborites, with their clean-cut extremes, are free. The capital levy is anathema to both liberals and conservatives. Herbert Asquith, while abating nothing of his hostility toward protection, said in an address last evening that as far as protection was the proposed capital levy would be even more fatal. It would multiply unemployment a hundred fold and undermine the whole fabric of British credit.

If Lord Birkenhead's opinion may be taken as that of the conservative party, it is apparent the latter thinks it is almost a question of "now or never" for protection.

The political thugs were again busy last evening. A series of fights occurred at a Bermondsey meeting. Mrs. Clarry, wife of the conservative candidate for Newport, was kicked and pelted with mud by members of a hostile mob.

MERCURY ENGINE EXPECTED TO BE ELECTRIC MARVEL

SCHENECTADY, Dec. 5.—Power from mercury vapor, making possible a double vapor power plant in which turbines for generating electricity are driven both by mercury vapor and water vapor from the same fuel source, resulting in a gain of about 50 per cent in power per pound of fuel, is the outstanding achievement of the new boiler perfected by the General Electric company.

W. L. R. Emmett, consulting engineer for the General Electric company and inventor of the new process estimates that if the mercury boiler comes up to all expectations, it will produce with 35 pounds of mercury pressure, when compared with a steam turbine generating plant which uses 200 pounds steam pressure, about 52 per cent more output in electricity per pound of fuel.

OREGON DAIRYMEN URGED TO ATTEND O. A. C. SHORT TERM

CORVALLIS, Dec. 4.—Oregon dairymen interested in the manufacture will have an opportunity to pick up the most up-to-date information in the short course at the agricultural college January 7 to February 2, 1924. Creamery operators will take into consideration the competition of today which cuts the profit to a narrow margin, and discuss the important problem of efficiency. "Increased Efficiency and Quality" is the short course slogan.

Practical work in buttermaking, ice-cream making, and cheese making will be given. The afternoon work will be spent in the creamery on work to demonstrate points brought out in the lectures. Lectures will also be given on factory management, judging dairy products, bacteriology and on testing dairy products.

The department formerly offered courses for inexperienced men.

NEW MECHANISM TO AID FLIERS AT HIGH ALTITUDES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Lieutenant John A. Macready, army aviator, will attempt on the first day practicable, it was announced today at the war department, to establish a new altitude record by use of an improved supercharger which will permit the engine of his plane to function efficiently at extreme heights.

The new mechanism was invented by Dr. S. M. Moss and is an improvement over the equipment used by Macready in 1921 when he established a world's record for altitude of 34,209.5 feet, which stood until October of this year, when Sadi Lecoq, a French flier, reached 35,554 feet. The new mechanism, it is said at an altitude of 25,000 feet "will increase the power of a Liberty motor by over 300 horsepower."

VICTIM CHINESE BANDITS TO TELL STORY AT CHURCH

One of the greatest privileges that has ever come to the people of Medford and vicinity and especially to those interested in foreign missions and the extension of the gospel into every land, will be the privilege of hearing Dr. and Mrs. F. Howard Taylor of the China Inland Mission on Friday night of this week at the Presbyterian church at 7:30 p. m. Their work is interdenominational and international. The ministers of the city are co-operating in urging their people to hear the addresses of these most gifted and inspiring missionary speakers as both Mr. Taylor and his wife will speak. The following facts tell the story of them and their work. Their only dates in Oregon are one of two dates in Portland, and one in Salem, Roseburg and Medford, going from here to San Francisco.

F. Howard Taylor, M. D., (London, Eng.) M. D. C. P., F. R. C. S. B. S. is the son of the late J. Hudson Taylor, founder of the China Inland Mission. He has served in regular appointments upon the mission field since 1896. Mrs. Howard Taylor is a daughter of the late H. Grattan Guinness, D. D., F. R. A. S., Evangelist, Bible teacher and prophetic writer, and she went to China as a missionary of the China Inland Mission first in 1888. She and Dr. Taylor both labored in the provinces of Honan for a number of years. Of late years they have given much time to literary work.

Mrs. Howard Taylor, who as Miss Geraldine Guinness, was well known both as a writer and speaker on this continent as well as in Great Britain, has contributed gifted service in the missionary cause. Together with Dr. Taylor she has written the "Life of Hudson Taylor," the two-volume biography of the founder of the China Inland Mission, which is as remarkable for its spiritual helpfulness and inspiration to the reader as for its interesting tracing of the personal experiences of Hudson Taylor and the "Growth of the Work of God"—the China Inland Mission—which he was privileged to found and direct.

Among the books by Mrs. Taylor is the story of "Pastor Hsi, Confucian Scholar and Christian," a man of North China, great in his generation and in his service to God. This book has been reprinted in many editions and translated into various languages. A recent book from Mrs. Taylor's pen, entitled "With Piu and His Brigands," relates the experiences she and her husband encountered among bandits in Yunnan at the end of their recent tour in China, when Dr. Taylor was held prisoner for thirty-eight days.

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MOVIE STARS IN L. ANGELES MAY MOVE TO N. YORK

Hollywood Colony Sick of Blue
Laws and Moral Squads—
Edict Closing Movie Ball at
Midnight Cause of Trouble
—Charity Games Squelched

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 5.—Los Angeles writhed on a bed of municipal pain today as opposing civic forces clashed in bitter combat over the permissibility of post-midnight dancing and the desirability of a little game of chance for charity.

While officers of the Western Motion Picture Advertiser's association looked about for some place outside of Los Angeles to hold their annual ball as a result of the police commission's refusal yesterday to grant them a permit sanctioning dancing after midnight and seven patrons of the Finniston Grotto's charity circus awaited trial on charges of participating in games of chance designed to raise money for the Masonic organization's Christmas fund, various organizations denounced what they called "unnecessary restrictions on the rights of citizens" and threatened retaliatory action against the city administration unless conditions were changed.

Resolutions adopted by the Screen Writers' Guild branded the twelve o'clock dancing ordinance under which the Motion Picture Directors' ball was halted by the police Thanksgiving eve and the Western Motion Picture Advertiser's request for a 3 a. m. permit denied, as "the midnight curfew law for adults," and heartily endorsed a proposal to organize the city's motion picture population into a political force capable of campaigning for "a metropolitan government by metropolitan minds."

Meanwhile members of the Los Angeles Advertising club who yesterday adopted similar resolutions, pondered over the words of an address by Sol Lesser, motion picture producer and theater operator, who reminded them that "the motion picture industry is not necessarily rooted here," and that producers have even "discussed plans for taking their entire plants to New York."
