

STAGE FIGHT RIGHT IN SENATE

ALA., Dec. 6.—(By Associated Press.) A flat encounter in a hall leading to the senate chamber of the legislature tonight followed the appearance in the chamber of Jose Alejandro, recently appointed senator by Governor General Wood and his acceptance by the senate, after some debate, as a duly authorized member of the chamber.

Alejandro appeared in the chamber today. When he attempted to explain his presence the senate refused to recognize him and Senator Soriano, a collectivist, chairman of the committee on elections and privileges, questioned his right to occupy a senate seat on the ground that no official notice of his appointment had been received. The senate, Soriano declared, had been provided only with a carbon copy of the letter of the governor general appointing Alejandro, whereas it should have been given the original.

The senators then adopted a resolution to investigate the appointment. After the session closed Alejandro said he had furnished the secretary of the senate with a copy of his appointment accompanying it with a communication requesting the extension to him of credentials for performance of his duties.

Tonight the senate recognized him as an appointee and formally accepted him as a senator. At the members left the chamber after the session, Alejandro met Senator V. De Vera elmin the hallway, upbraided him for criticizing the appointment and slapped his face.

A crowd gathered rapidly. For a time it appeared that the incident would result in a free-for-all fight but timely arrival of the police prevented serious trouble.

Several senators said they would offer resolutions suspending Alejandro tomorrow.

ENOUGH PORTLAND LIQUOR DESTROYED TO FLOAT A SHIP

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 6.—Enough liquor in which to float the proverbial ship was confiscated and destroyed by Portland police during the last year, according to a report covering activities for the twelve months, commencing December 1, 1922.

In those twelve months the police seized 18,695 pints of whiskey, 12,141 gallons of wine 3727 quarts of beer and 160 gallons of fermented grape juice and cider. In the same period 17,572 gallons of wine and whiskey mash also were seized and confiscated.

Violations of the liquor laws took 1563 persons to jail as bootleggers, moonshiners, persons caught manufacturing, selling, transporting or possessing liquor. Arrests for drunkenness were not included.

Use, possession and sales of narcotics sent 233 persons to jail.

LOVED TWO WOMEN, SO HE MARRIED THEM BOTH

DRY REINFORCEMENTS FOR SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 6.—Federal prohibition enforcement officers operating in Nevada were ordered to San Francisco today to remain until after the holidays to augment the force to prevent dry law violations by operating in downtown cafes, according to W. R. Paget, in charge of enforcement officers here.

3 Burned to Death.
BAY CITY, Mich., Dec. 6.—Three persons were burned to death and another escaped with serious burns when the farmhouse of Joseph DeLoach near Turner was destroyed by fire. The victims were Mrs. DeLoach, 50, her daughter Elsie, 20 and Miss Katherine Kilish, a school teacher.

Banker Found Guilty.
ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 6.—Donald W. Ross, former deputy state finance commissioner in charge of the liquidation of the defunct Night and Day bank, on trial in circuit court here, was found guilty late today of a charge of embezzling \$28,250 of the bank's funds and was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

JAPAN ALARMED BY RETURN JAPS FROM AMERICA

TOKIO, Dec. 6.—(By Associated Press.) Aroused by the return from the United States of large numbers of Japanese immigrants, various public organizations and vernacular newspapers of the empire are urging the foreign office to take some action which will offset the effect of the decision of the United States supreme court barring Japanese from American citizenship and sustaining anti-alien laws of California and Washington.

Thus far, beyond preparing instructions for the guidance of Ambassador Hanihara at Washington, the contents of which have not been disclosed, the government has taken no action.

Proposals for the abolition of dual Japanese and American nationality and for enforcement of the anti-alien land act passed by the diet ten years ago but never enforced, have been under consideration for a year, however.

Difficulty foreseen in government circles in enforcing of the anti-alien land act arises from the fact that restrictions on the ownership of land under the act would react against certain states of the United States which now permit Japanese to own land.

BIG SHIPMENT OF DRUGS AND PIPES SEIZED IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Dec. 6.—More than \$25,000 worth of narcotics and \$5000 worth of hand carved Chinese pipes were seized in a raid after midnight in the Chinese section here by federal agents, local police and one representative of the King county sheriff's office. The raid, which was said to be one of the largest ever made in the Chinese section was made by six men under the leadership of Harry V. Williamson, district narcotic director. The authorities leaped from a third story hotel window across an alleyway to a fire escape outside a Chinese social club, cut a screen and entered the club where the agents found over 100 Chinese.

After taking the prisoners to the city jail the authorities returned to the building, ripped up the floors and found approximately ten pounds of narcotics said to be valued at \$15,000 at retail prices.

KING BOOTLEGGER GETS 2 YRS. IN PEN

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—With the sentencing today of Emanuel D. (Mannie) Kessler, king of the bootleggers, and ten fellow conspirators, Major John H. Clark, assistant United States attorney who obtained the conviction, announced he had been offered a \$100,000 bribe to "lay off" the case. Kessler was sentenced by Federal Judge Winslow to two years in the Atlanta penitentiary with a fine of \$10,000. Three others received the same sentence.

GASOLINE WAR IN PORTLAND ENDED

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 5.—A gasoline price war here during the past week ended today when 75 independent filling stations and garages which had been selling at 15 to 17 cents a gallon went back to 18 cents, the regular price. The retail sellers association of Portland, organized last night, decided to eliminate price cutting.

Marshall Reappointed.
SALEM, Ore., Dec. 6.—William Marshall, who has been with the state industrial accident commission since its inception, has been appointed as commissioner for the fourth time. It was announced by the executive offices today.

French Aviator Guilty.
HOUSTON, Texas, Dec. 6.—George Vexnaat, French aviator, tried here for the murder of his sweetheart, Miss Louise Floquet, was found guilty this afternoon and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Kansas Governor to Throw Hat In.
TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 6.—Governor J. M. Davis is expected to announce his candidacy for president of the United States at tonight's "harmony meeting" of seventh district democrats at Great Bend, Kansas, according to the Topeka State Journal today.

HOLD EVIDENCE OF MRS. MORTIMER FOR VET BUREAU TRIALS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—In view of Attorney General Daugherty's announcement that the department of justice will investigate all charges of irregularities in the administration of the veterans' bureau, the senate veterans' committee will withhold from publication the testimony of Mrs. Katherine Mortimer of Philadelphia and other evidence adduced privately which may be useful in any criminal prosecution that may be undertaken. Also the committee has decided against granting a public hearing to Mrs. Mortimer, who is the wife of Elias H. Mortimer, chief witness before the committee against Charles R. Forbes, former director of the bureau.

After a recess of more than a week, the senate committee was called today for a public session for the admission to the public record of certain documentary evidence.

English Election All Samee Like Election, America

LONDON, Dec. 5.—(By the Associated Press.) Party headquarters dispensed optimism on this, the last day of the parliamentary election campaign.

The conservatives announced that their prospects were good and that they were confident.

The liberals said there were reports of great liberal enthusiasm from the whole country.

The labor spokesman said: "We shall certainly have 171 members returned and probably more. We shall still be his majesty's opposition." Premier Baldwin declared: "I believe from what I have seen that the results on Thursday will astonish our opponents."
